

**Engagement Summary: Renaming Fort Calgary***Prepared by The Fort Calgary Preservation Society***Acknowledging our place on a long journey**

The Fort Calgary Preservation Society (the Society) is committed to building relationships with community members with diverse stories about this land. In 2015, we launched the Fort Calgary Indigenous Advisory Council, comprised of representatives from the Treaty 7 Nations. With their input, and guidance from former Society leaders, we set a new direction and began discussions about renaming this historical site.

**Formal Engagement Process**

In 2023, the Society partnered with Stormy Lake Consulting (Stormy Lake) on a formal engagement project. We sought to gain understanding about what the Fort Calgary site means to Calgarians and how it can evolve to better meet community needs. Through surveys, dialogic sessions, cocreation sessions, one-to-one conversations and group discussions, Stormy Lake gathered valuable information from a broad swath of the community about how the Society and Fort Calgary can become a more relevant part of the community.

## What We heard

### Summary of Survey Feedback

- 380,000 people think Fort Calgary is important (extrapolated from collected data).
- Calgarians want varied histories from Fort Calgary.
- The history of Indigenous peoples is the most popular emphasis across generations.
- Fort Calgary is more than the building — only half of visitors to Fort Calgary see the inside of the museum. Whether or not they entered the building, they consider themselves to have visited “Fort Calgary.”
- Calgarians want Fort Calgary to do more:
  - Tell more than one story
  - Advance Truth and Reconciliation
  - Reconnect to the land
  - Go deeper with Calgary’s story
  - Build community
  - Make history relevant today
  - Elevate the experience
  - Be a gathering space and a gathering place

### Session, Workshop and Conversation Feedback

*Sample of qualitative feedback from the 2023 Fort Calgary Engagement Project:*

“If you leave the name as is, you are living in the past.”

“I like The Confluence – the confluence of people coming together, the confluence of ideas.”

“I think the name is good – I googled confluence and it means the merging of two things together and I think that is perfect for what Fort Calgary is trying to do.”

“[The Confluence is] definitely a more welcoming and feminine shift.”

“There’s so many labels and separations and things that divide us, so what can connect us? And that’s the love for the rivers.”

“Confluence is about the coming together of separate entities, separate energies. It’s about exchange and, ultimately, unification.”

“Where the rivers come together is kind of a tangled mess for a while, and then it comes together and unites. That’s like the history that’s messy.”

"I remember coming in here over the years as a young person, and it always reminded me of that song 'Which One Doesn't Belong?' and I always felt like I was the part that didn't belong. I didn't want other kids to come here and feel that way."

"My first impression walking in as somebody that had no idea what the history was, it did seem to be an Indigenized space that I felt comfortable being in."

"I feel like it's haunted here. It has a very violent history and was very unwelcoming towards Indigenous people.... There's a lot of reclamation that has to be done in these types of places."

"Fort Calgary needs to become more relevant to today than it has ever been. It needs to connect the past with the present and, in doing so, lead us into a better future."

"When I came last summer, there was a room with a shovel and the exhibits were still very creepy and outdated. I saw that Ahkoinnimakia Star Crop Eared Wolf is now a curator here so that's really interesting. She's one of my favourite artists. So, I've seen that there's lots of shifts happening within this short time that's changing a lot."

"Fort Calgary can provide the missing context that communities need to reconcile the truth of other experiences beyond their own."

"There is a desire for Fort Calgary to be more engaging and energetic – emotionally, physically, mentally."

"Fort Calgary will need to build credibility as the place where these stories are shared, which it can do by being transparent with its process of investigating and showcasing many voices."

"Fort Calgary's role is to share the truth, offer hope and create intentions to move forward in a good way."

"As a student, a lot of people I know who aren't Indigenous don't know the full story. For example, there's a lot of people from other countries who live here but don't know anything about Indigenous culture and history. I feel like we really need to get a bigger voice and share the bigger story to everyone because what I'm learning in social studies is the same thing I've learned since I was a little kid — it's always the same story that was written by a white person."

"I think this place should be fun in the sense that there's heavy material, but there's also [safety], which creates a sense of fun to it. You can play with the information and feel not overwhelmed."

"I firmly believe kids as young as five aren't ready for the stories of Indigenous people, they need to fall in love with Indigenous people first and their cultures. And then at the age of nine, tell them. And then you're ready to process the challenges out there."

"There's this myth that Calgary was born of ranchers. There's a myth of identity."

"There's just so much masculine energy here. I always noticed it's not a circle. They created walls for their forts while we were in circles. We based our life off circles."

"I don't want my story told by anyone but me. Even if there are interesting and rich stories but if it's not our story to tell we have to recognize that."
