Background and methodology



Equity-deserving communities

Calgary’s Equity-Deserving Communities (EDCs) are defined as groups of people who generally have less access to opportunities, resources, and systems of power because of their actual or perceived identity or identities. EDCs often experience social and financial disadvantages because of systems of oppression, which take many forms including, but not limited to, racism, sexism, and ableism.

The City aims to better understand the perspectives of equity-deserving communities through the lens of the annual Spring and Fall Surveys of Calgarians. The data in this report are from the 2026 Spring Survey of Calgarians. Inclusion in EDC groups is determined by self-reported demographic data from the general population survey. Both seasonal surveys are conducted in English to manage time and cost constraints. The City acknowledges that the ability to speak English may be a barrier for potential participants.

This report represents one of nine reports on equity-deserving communities, each focusing on a different EDC. The EDCs and their demographic variables are as follows, with the EDC category noted in bold text below:

Methodology

The telephone survey was conducted by Ipsos Public Affairs from February 17, 2026 to March 16, 2026 with 2,500 Calgarians. The average time to complete the survey was 29 minutes.

The survey was conducted using numbers from both cell phones (70%) and landlines (30%) to obtain a random and statistically-representative sample of Calgarians.

To ensure the data were gathered from a representative group of Calgarians, sample quotas were set by age, gender, and ward of the general population aged 18 and older.

Data were weighted based on the 2019 Municipal and 2021 Federal Census data for age, gender and quadrant to ensure the composition reflects that of the actual Calgary population aged 18 or older. Although the results are weighted, the sample size shown for each question represents the number of actual respondents (i.e. unweighted n).

The margin of error (MOE) for the total sample of 2,500 is ± 2.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error for the Disability sub-group of 564 is ± 4.13 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error for each question will vary slightly depending on the total number of respondents who answered the question.

Interpreting results

Interpreting results

Not all questions asked within the Spring Survey of Calgarians are represented within this report.

In this report, we compare results between two groups:

1. Calgarians who have a disability and/or live in the same household as someone with a disability
2. Calgarians from households without someone with a disability

To avoid repeating the lengthy description "Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability" throughout the report, we will use the shortened term "Calgarians from households with PWD" where PWD is an acronym for person(s) with disability.

As such, please note that the "Calgarians from households with PWD" or "with PWD" group encompasses two sub-groups:

- Calgarians who have a disability themselves
- Calgarians who live with someone else in their household who has a disability

Statistically significant differences are noted throughout the report:

- ↑ indicates number is significantly higher than the other group.
- ↓ indicates number is significantly lower than the other group.
- * Some results in this report are subject to rounding adjustments.

Significant differences are an indication that a difference is not due to chance. A mathematical formula is used to calculate each difference independently. Whether or not a difference is considered significant depends on a few factors including the total sample size and the variability of responses. Larger sample sizes mean that smaller differences are significant. Additionally, variability of responses means that the more alike the responses are the more significant a change will be.



2026 Spring key findings

2026 Spring highlights (1 of 5)

Quality of life

Quality of life ratings vary among Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability. Many rate their overall quality of life as good and agree Calgary is a great place to make a life. Agreement drops on making a living in Calgary, and fewer than half agree Calgary is heading in the right direction to be a better city by the next decade.

Across all quality of life measures there are statistical **differences** between the two groups. A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD:

- Consider the overall quality of life in Calgary to be 'good' (63% with PWD vs. 80% without PWD)
- Agree that Calgary is a great place to make a life (60% vs. 79%)
- Agree that Calgary is a great place to make a living (53% vs. 72%)
- Agree that Calgary is on the right track to be a better city 10 years from now (45% vs. 56%)

Overall satisfaction with City services

City services and programs receive mixed reviews from Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability.

There is a statistical **difference** between the two groups, with a lower proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD who are satisfied with the overall level and quality of services and programs provided by The City (52% vs. 65% without PWD).

2026 Spring highlights (2 of 5)

Satisfaction with City services

Calgarians from households with someone with a disability are just as happy with essential City services as their counterparts. However, a lower proportion of this group than their counterparts are satisfied with services that pertain to public access and community life, such as Parks, Community & Culture Services, Recreation Services, Police Services, and Housing Services, among others.

Satisfaction with City services is *similar* between Calgarians from households with a PWD and those from households without PWD, including satisfaction with:

- Fire Services (87% with PWD and 91% without PWD)
- Waste and Recycling Services (75% and 79%)
- 311 Services (69% and 72%)
- Water Services (50% and 52%)
- Transit Services (45% and 46%)
- Planning & Development Services (42% and 46%)
- Roads (37% and 40%)

For the remaining City services, *differences* exist between the two groups, with a lower proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD who are satisfied with:

- Parks (71% with PWD vs. 78% without PWD)
- Emergency Management Services (70% vs. 76%)
- Community & Culture Services (69% vs. 76%)
- Recreation Services (66% vs. 73%)
- Police Services (63% vs. 71%)
- Bylaw Services (51% vs. 59%)
- Business Licensing & Support (49% vs. 55%)
- Housing Services (21% vs. 29%)

2026 Spring highlights (3 of 5)

Usage of City services

For half of the City services evaluated, usage does not vary much between Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability and their counterparts. However, they do have higher usage of Emergency Management Services, Police Services, and Housing Services. This group has lower usage of Recreation Services and Business Licensing & Support.

Usage of City services is *similar* between Calgarians from households with PWD and those from households without PWD for:

- Parks (81% with PWD and 85% without PWD)
- Community & Culture Services (72% and 76%)
- Transit Services (68% and 67%)
- 311 Services (58% and 55%)
- Bylaw Services (36% and 31%)
- Planning & Development Services (19% and 22%)
- Fire Services (17% and 14%)

There are also some statistical *differences* in usage of City services between the two groups, including:

- A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD used Recreation Services (56% vs. 68% without PWD)
- A higher proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD used Emergency Management Services (42% vs. 29%)
- A higher proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD used Police Services (37% vs. 31%)
- A higher proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD used Housing Services (13% vs. 7%)
- A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD used Business Licensing & Support (12% vs. 16%)

2026 Spring highlights (4 of 5)

Taxation

Fewer than half of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability see good value for their tax dollars. When it comes to balancing The City budget, many prefer tax increases to maintain services or expand them, while some prefer cuts to services.

Calgarians from households with PWD and Calgarians from households without PWD share *similar* opinions about all taxation measures, including:

- Prefer increasing taxes at the current inflation rate to maintain or expand services (57% with PWD and 56% without PWD)
- Perceived good value from municipal tax dollars (47% and 52%)
- Prefer cutting services to maintain current tax level or reduce taxes (35% and 38%)

Customer service

Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability are divided on whether the quality of customer service provided from The City is consistently high. Fewer than half agree that The City meets their customer service expectations, makes customer service a priority, or responds quickly to concerns.

There are statistical *differences* between the two groups on all customer service attributes. A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD agree that:

- The quality of customer service from The City is consistently high (55% with PWD vs. 62% without PWD)
- The City of Calgary meets their customer service expectations (47% vs. 57%)
- The City of Calgary makes customer service a priority (45% vs. 52%)
- The City responds quickly to requests and concerns (42% vs. 51%)

2026 Spring highlights (5 of 5)

Trust and transparency

Fewer than half of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability trust The City of Calgary. Even fewer agree The City is open and accessible, and only some feel there are enough opportunities for input into City decisions.

For all trust and transparency measures, there are statistical *differences* between the two groups. A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD:

- Trust in The City of Calgary (45% with PWD vs. 57% without PWD)
- Agree that The City of Calgary practices open and accessible government (42% vs. 51%)
- Agree that Calgarians have enough opportunities to provide input into decision making about City projects and services (37% vs. 47%)



Detailed findings



Quality of life

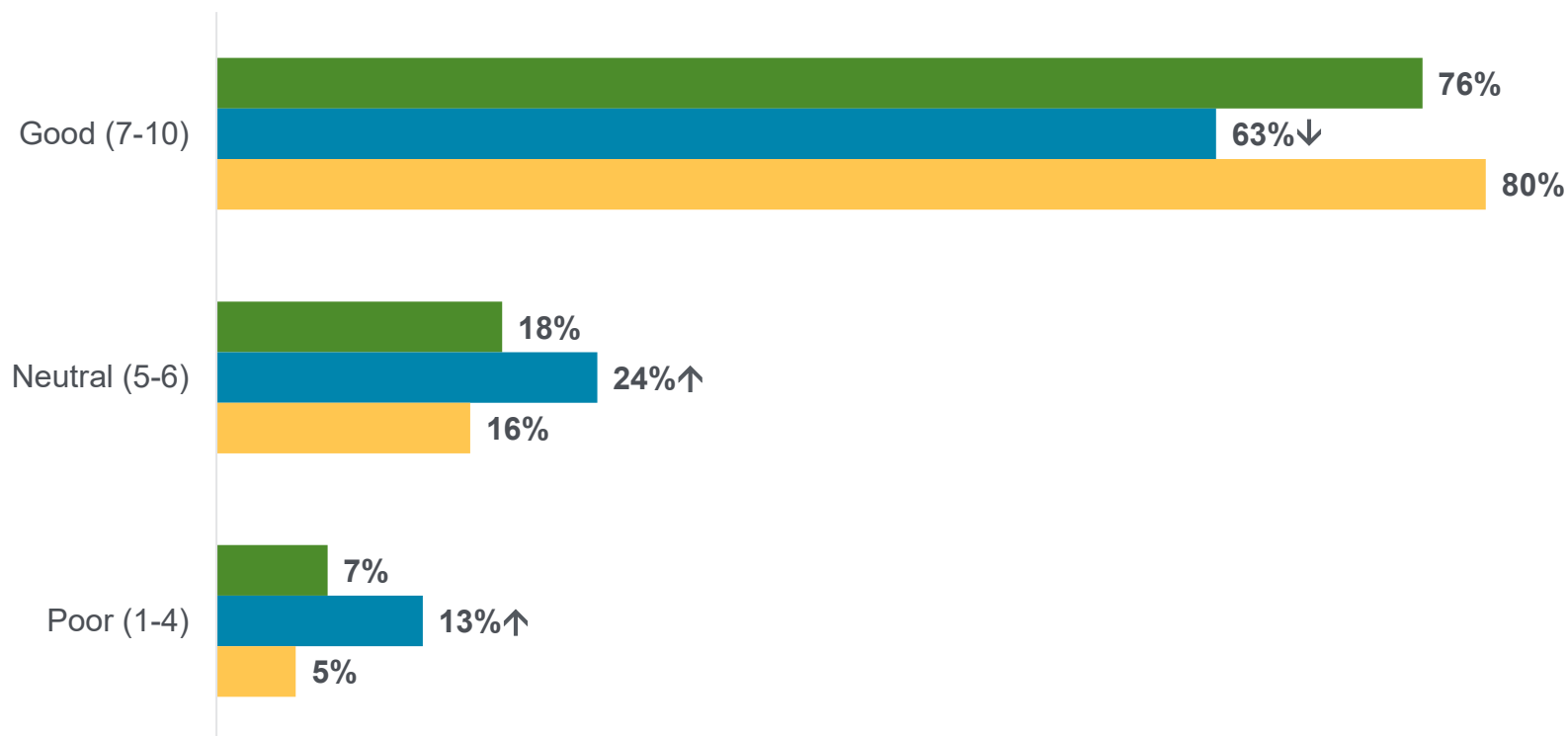


Overall quality of life in Calgary

Three-quarters (76%) of Calgarians rate the overall quality of life in Calgary as good. Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (63%) are less inclined to rate the overall quality of life as good compared to those from households without someone with a disability (80%). Correspondingly, Calgarians from households with someone with a disability are more inclined to be neutral than those without (24% vs. 16%, respectively) or say that their quality of life is poor (13% vs. 5%).

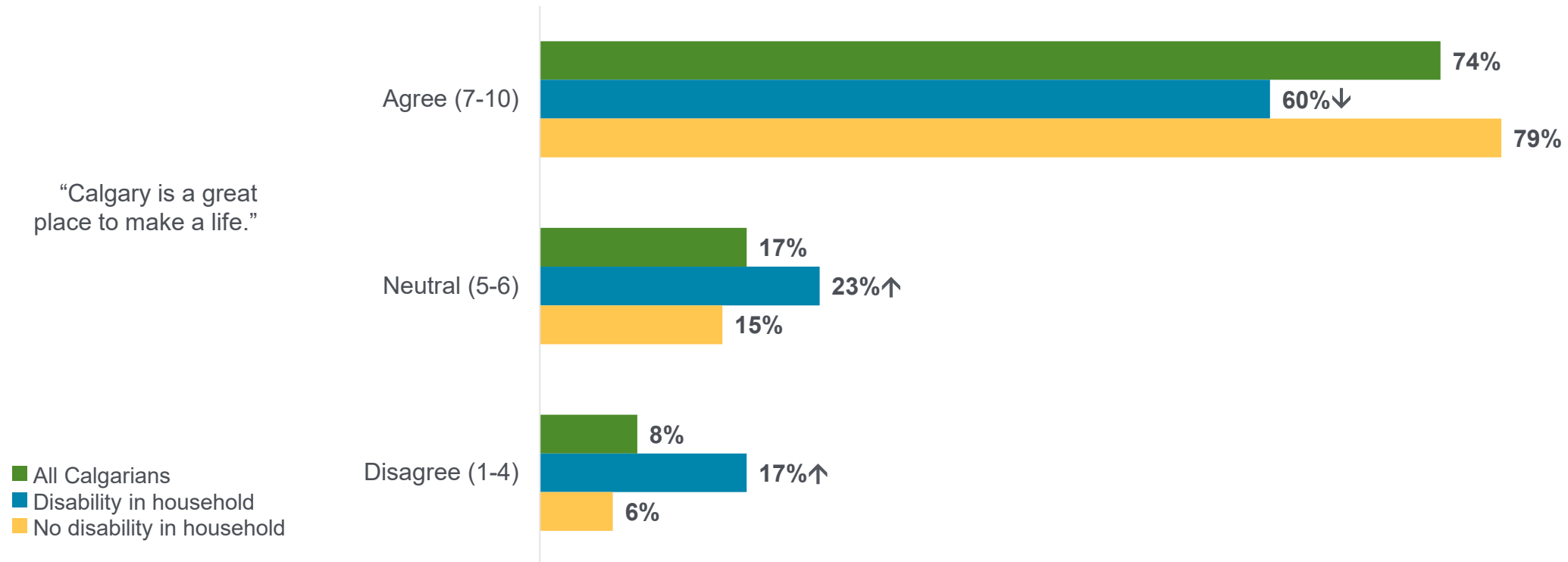

Great place to make a life

Three-quarters (74%) of Calgarians agree that Calgary is a great place to make a life. Agreement that Calgary is a great place to make a life is lower among Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (60%) than among those from households without someone with a disability (79%). In turn, both neutral ratings (23% vs. 15%, respectively) and disagreement ratings (17% vs. 6%) are higher among Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability.

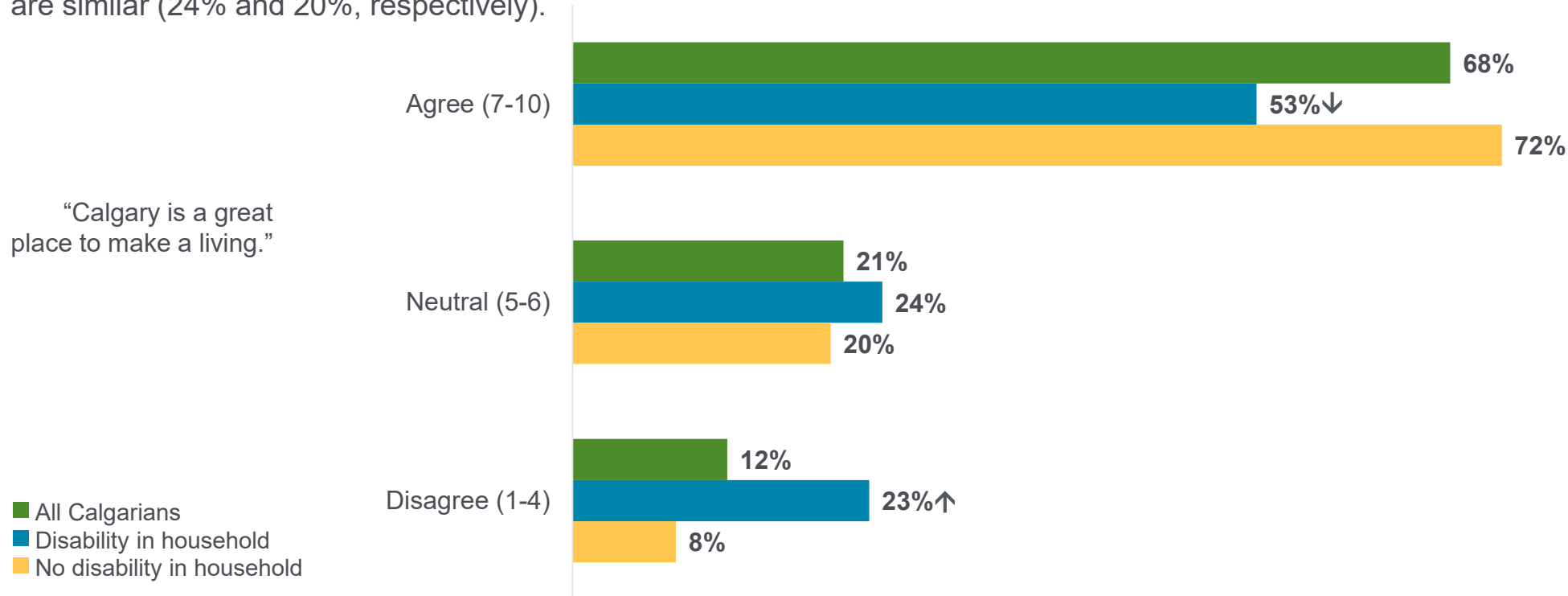

Great place to make a living

Around two-thirds (68%) of Calgarians agree that Calgary is a great place to make a living. A lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (53%) agree that Calgary is a great place to make a living than those from households without someone with a disability (72%). Conversely, a higher proportion of Calgarians from households with someone with a disability disagree (23% vs. 8% of those from households without someone with a disability). Meanwhile, neutral ratings among the two groups are similar (24% and 20%, respectively).

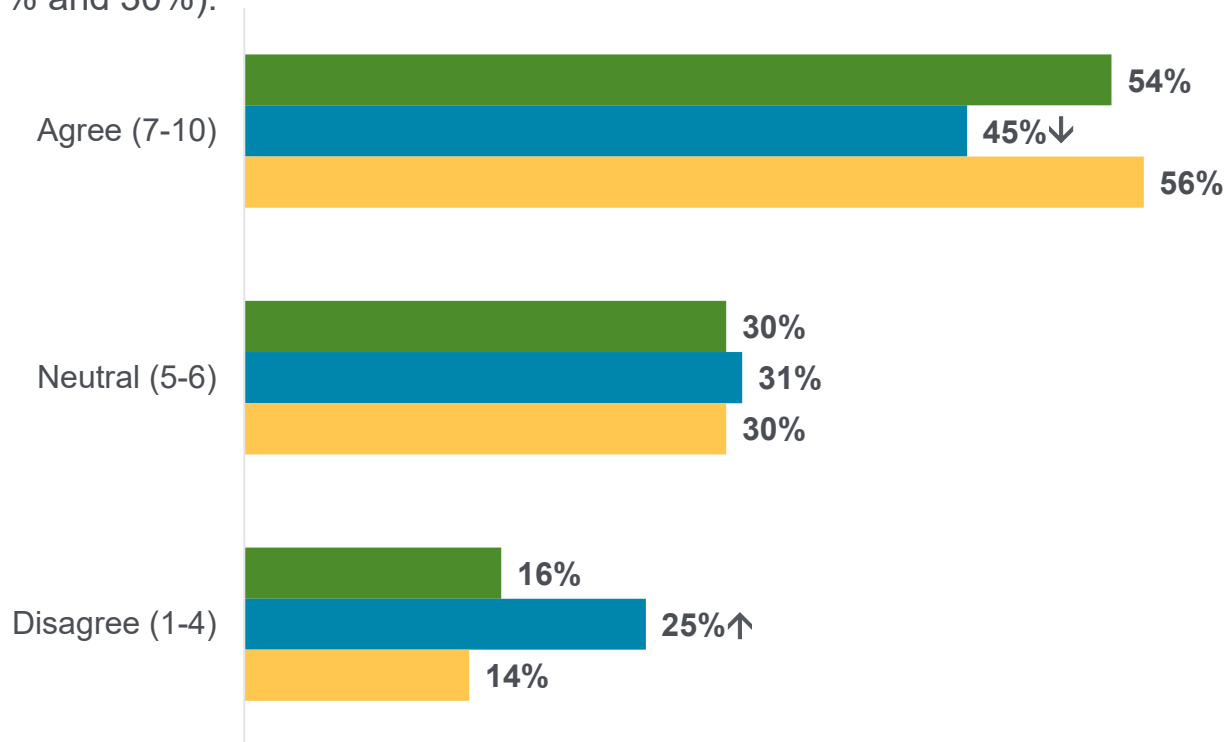


On the right track to be a better city

Around one-half (54%) of Calgarians agree that Calgary is on the right track to be a better city 10 years from now. Perceptions about the city being on the right track are lower among Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability compared to those from households without someone with a disability (45% vs. 56%, respectively). In turn, disagreement is higher among Calgarians from households with someone with a disability than those without someone with a disability (25% vs. 14%). Neutral ratings are nearly identical between the two groups (31% and 30%).

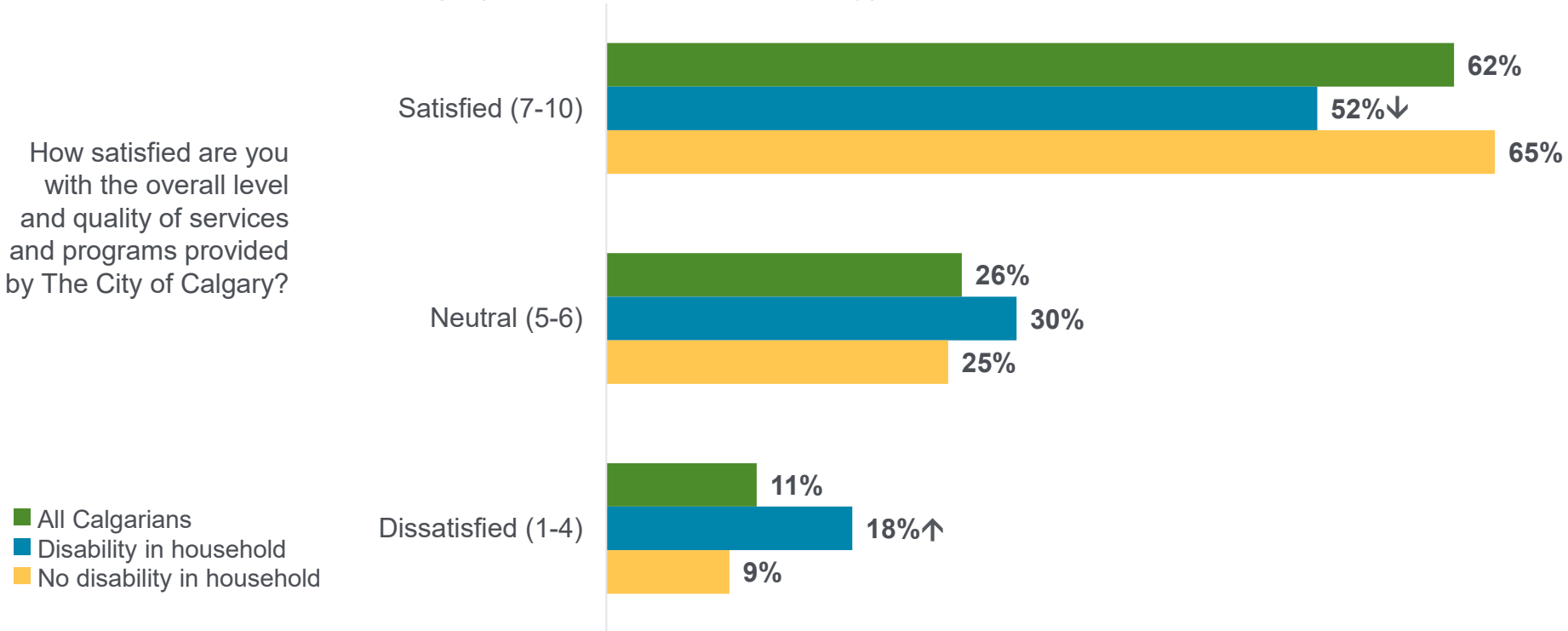


Satisfaction with City services



Satisfaction with the overall level and quality of City services and programs

More than three-fifths (62%) of Calgarians are satisfied with the overall level and quality of services and programs provided by The City of Calgary. Fewer Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (52%) are satisfied with City services and programs than those from households without someone with a disability (65%). Conversely, more Calgarians from households with a disability are dissatisfied (18% vs. 9% of those from households without someone with a disability). However, the two groups are consistent in their neutral ratings (30% and 25%, respectively).



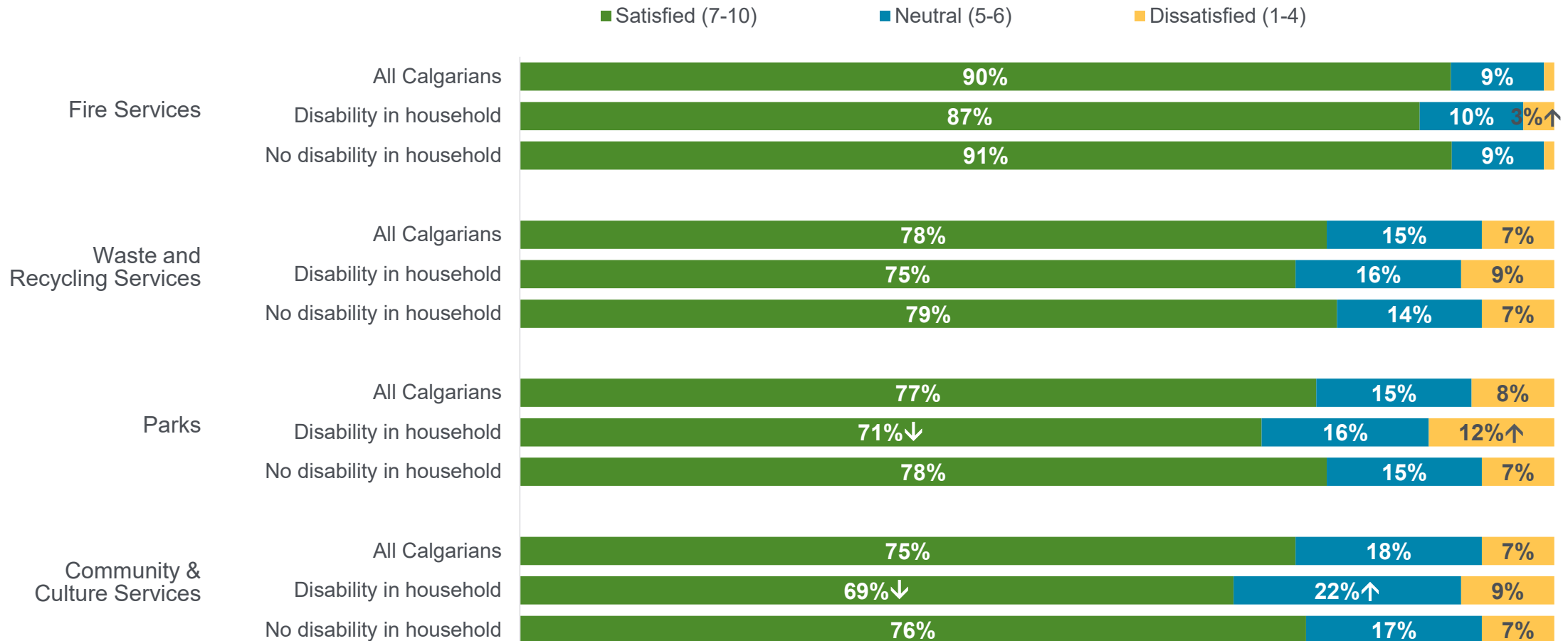

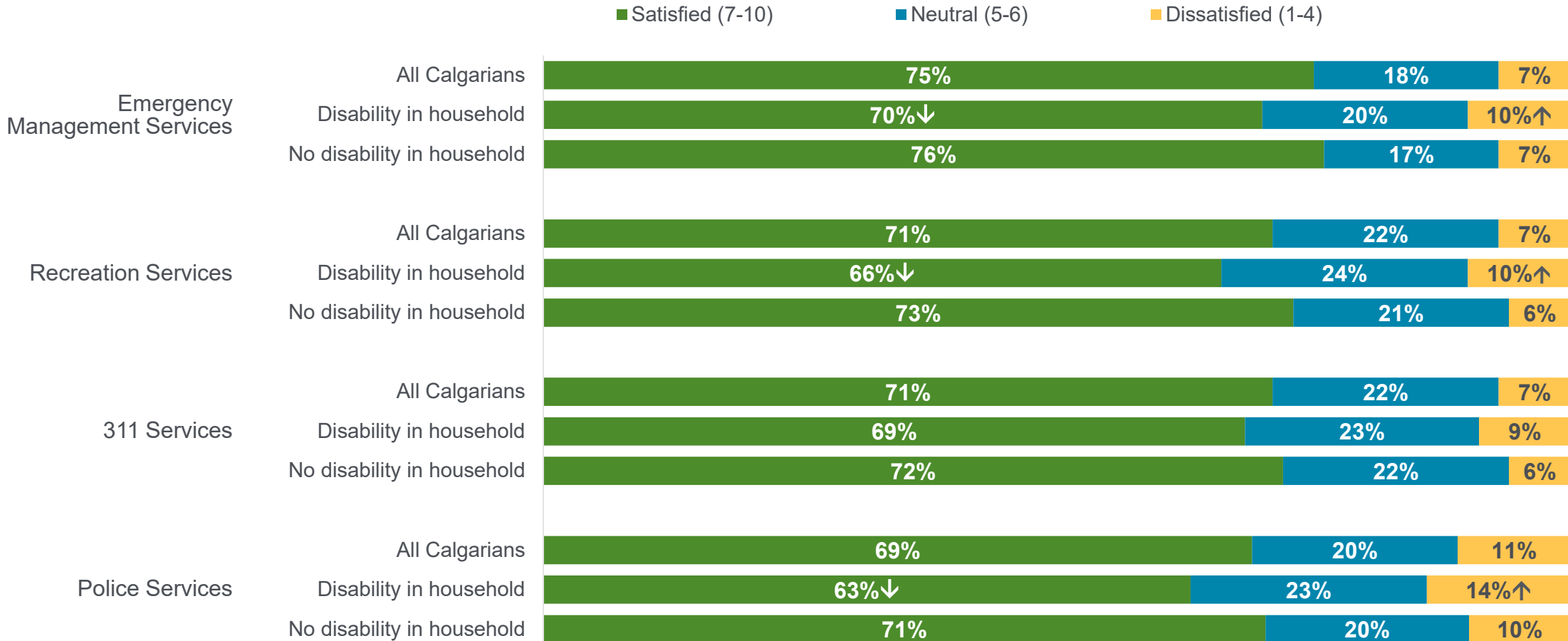

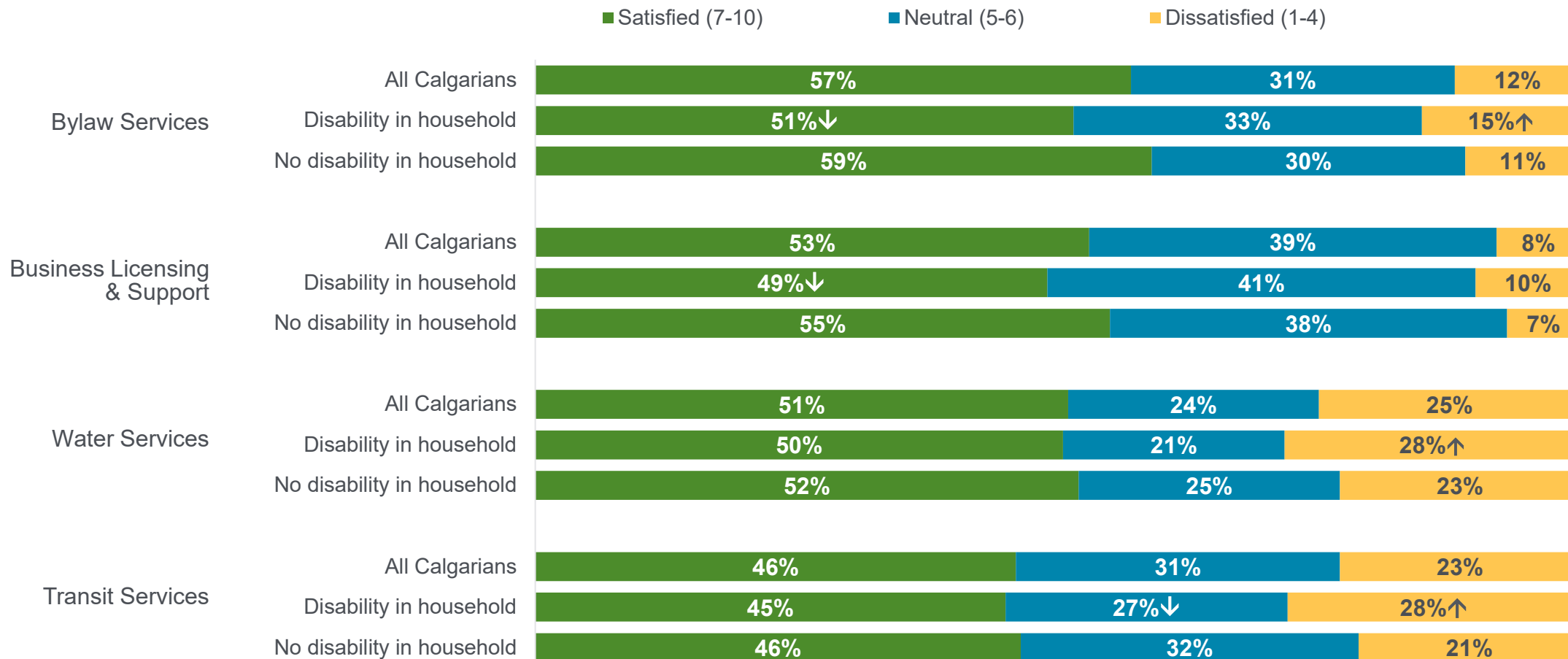

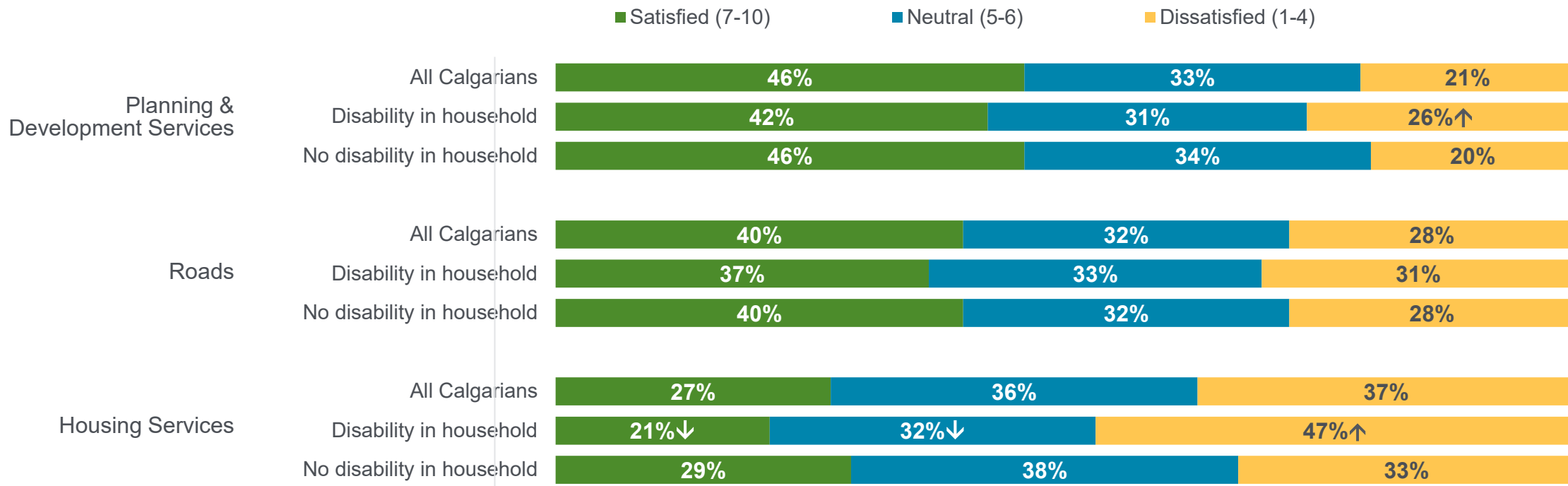

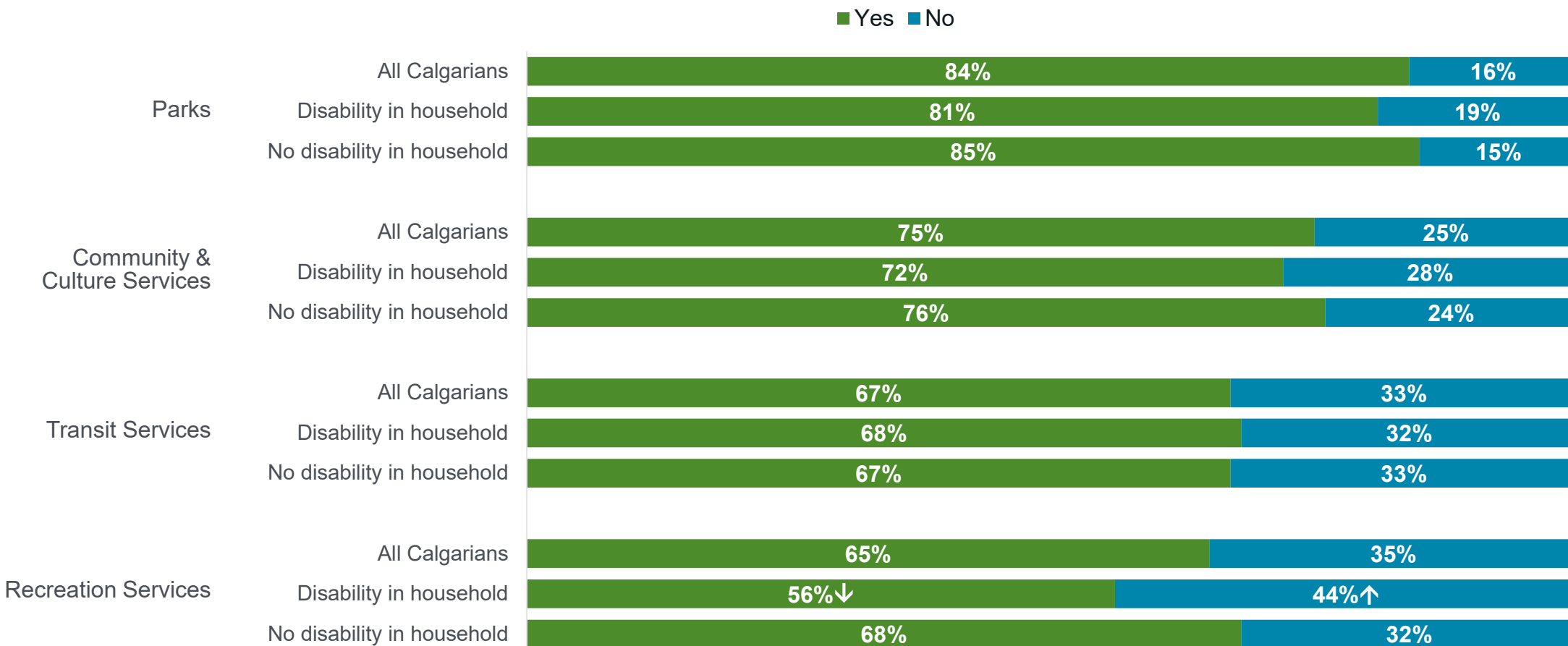

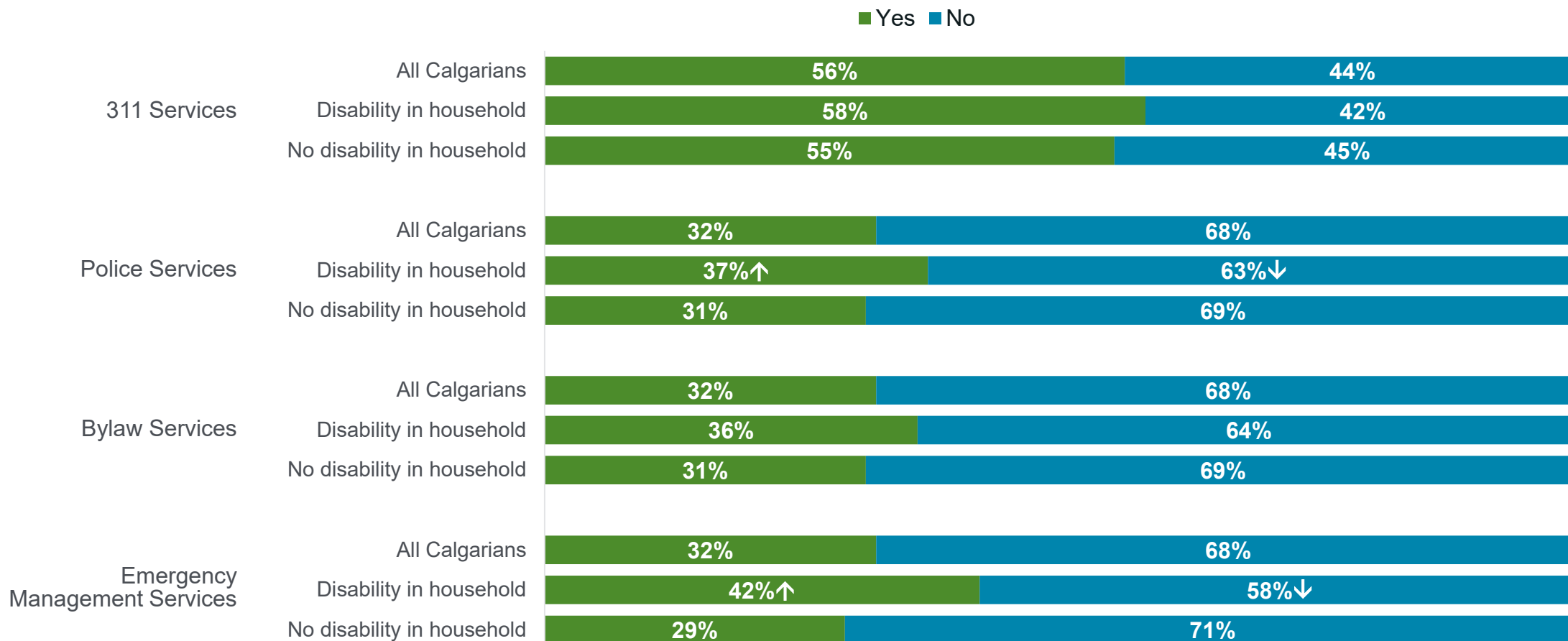

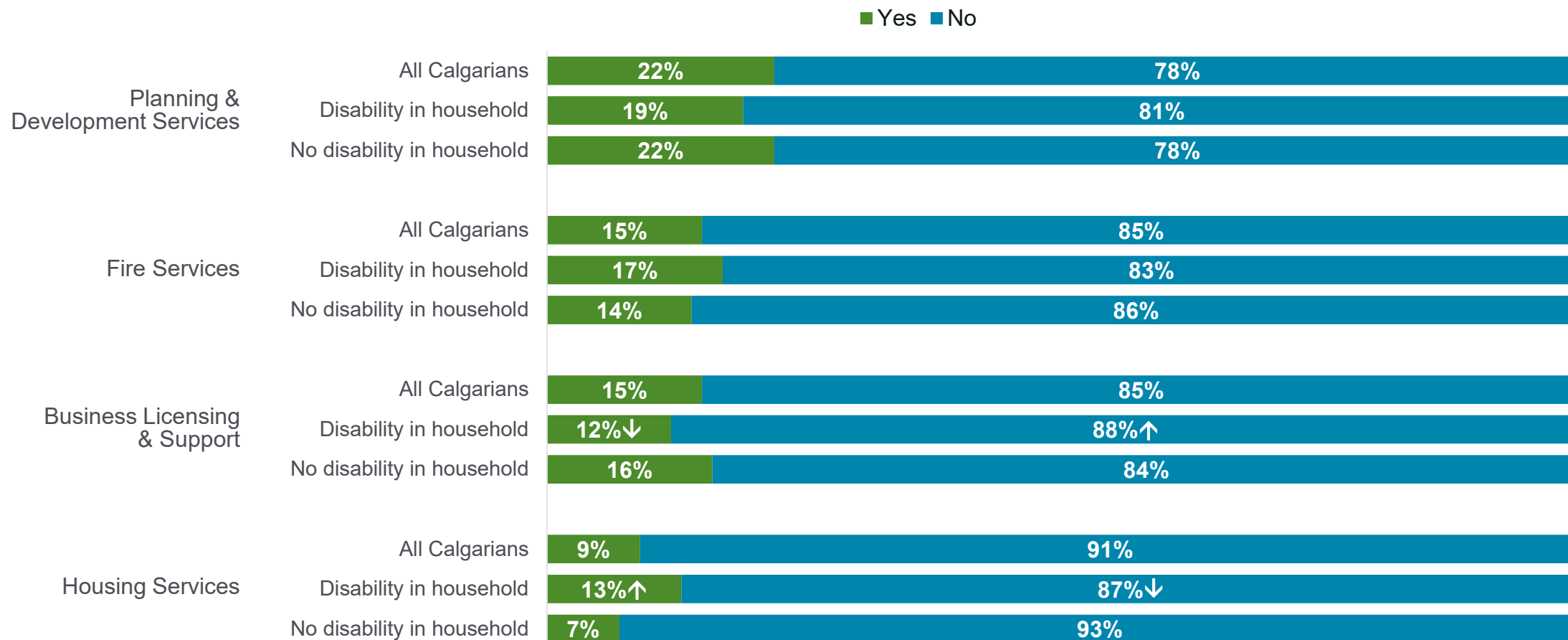

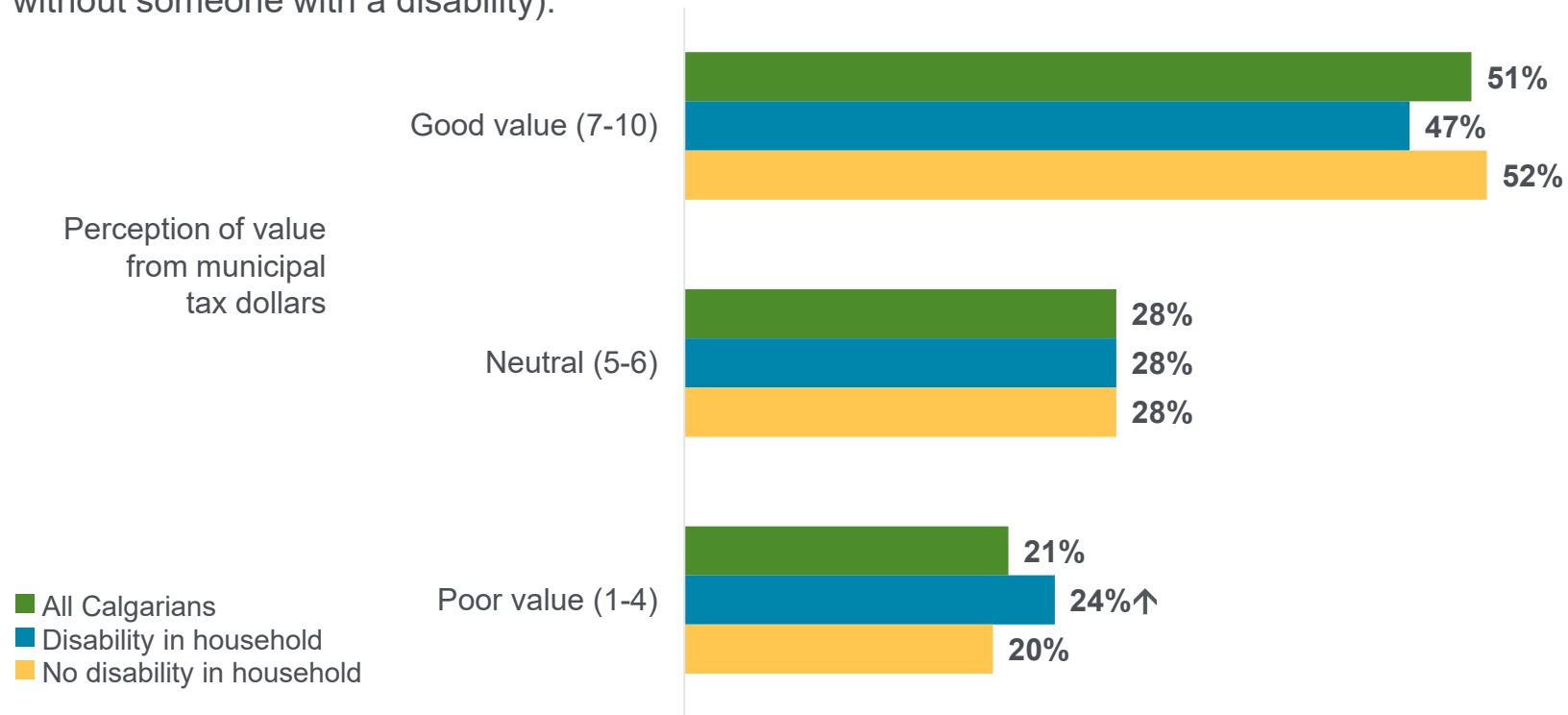


Taxation



Perceived value of property taxes

One-half (51%) of Calgarians feel they receive good value from their municipal tax dollars. Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (47%) and those from households without someone with a disability (52%) similarly consider the value they receive from taxes to be 'good'. Further, both groups share identical neutral ratings (28% for each group). However, perceptions of receiving poor value is higher among Calgarians from households with someone with a disability (24% vs. 20% of those from households without someone with a disability).

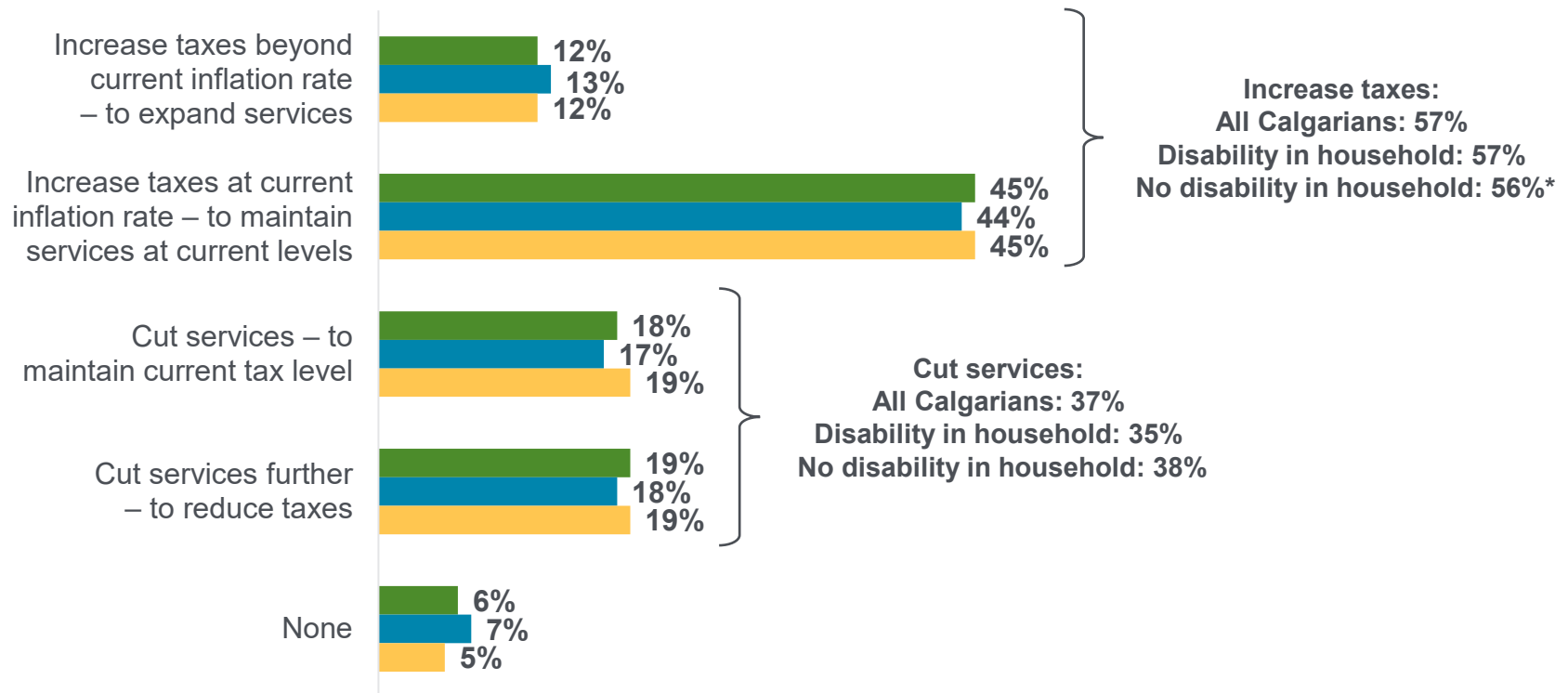

Balancing taxation and service delivery levels

More than one-half (57%) of Calgarians prefer increasing taxes to maintain or expand services, while fewer than two-fifths (37%) prefer cutting services to maintain or reduce taxes. Preferences for tax increases are nearly identical between Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability and those from households without someone with a disability (57% and 56%, respectively). Similarly, preferences for cutting services are also similar between the two groups (35% and 38%).

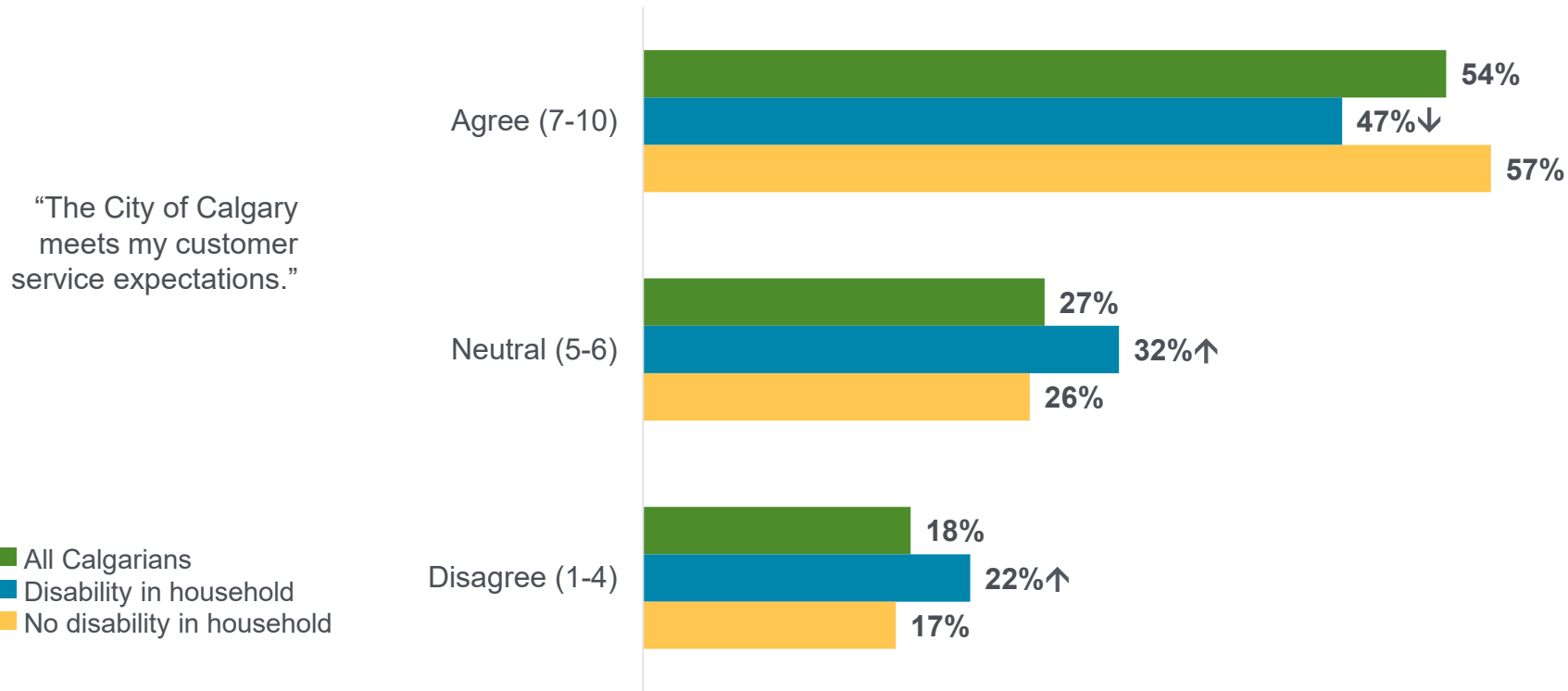


Customer service



Meets customer service expectations

Around one-half (54%) of Calgarians agree that The City of Calgary meets their customer service expectations. A lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (47%) agree that their customer service expectations are met compared to those from households without someone with a disability (57%). Correspondingly, a higher proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability are neutral (32% vs. 26% of those from households without someone with a disability) or disagree (22% vs. 17%, respectively).

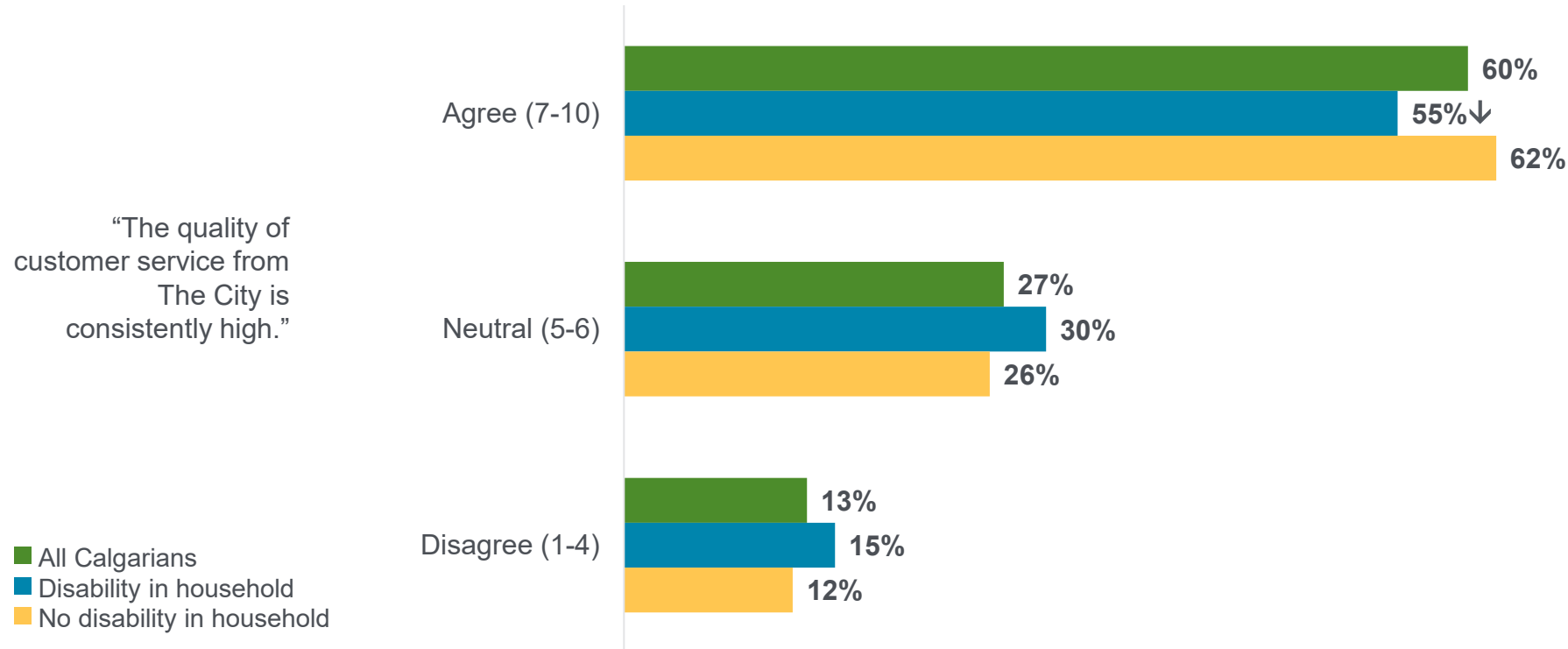

Quality of customer service

Three-fifths (60%) of Calgarians agree that the quality of customer service from The City is consistently high. The two groups differ when it comes to agreement about The City’s customer service being consistently high (55% for Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability vs. 62% for those from households without someone with a disability). However, both groups are similar when it comes to being neutral (30% and 26%, respectively) and disagreeing with this statement (15% and 12%).

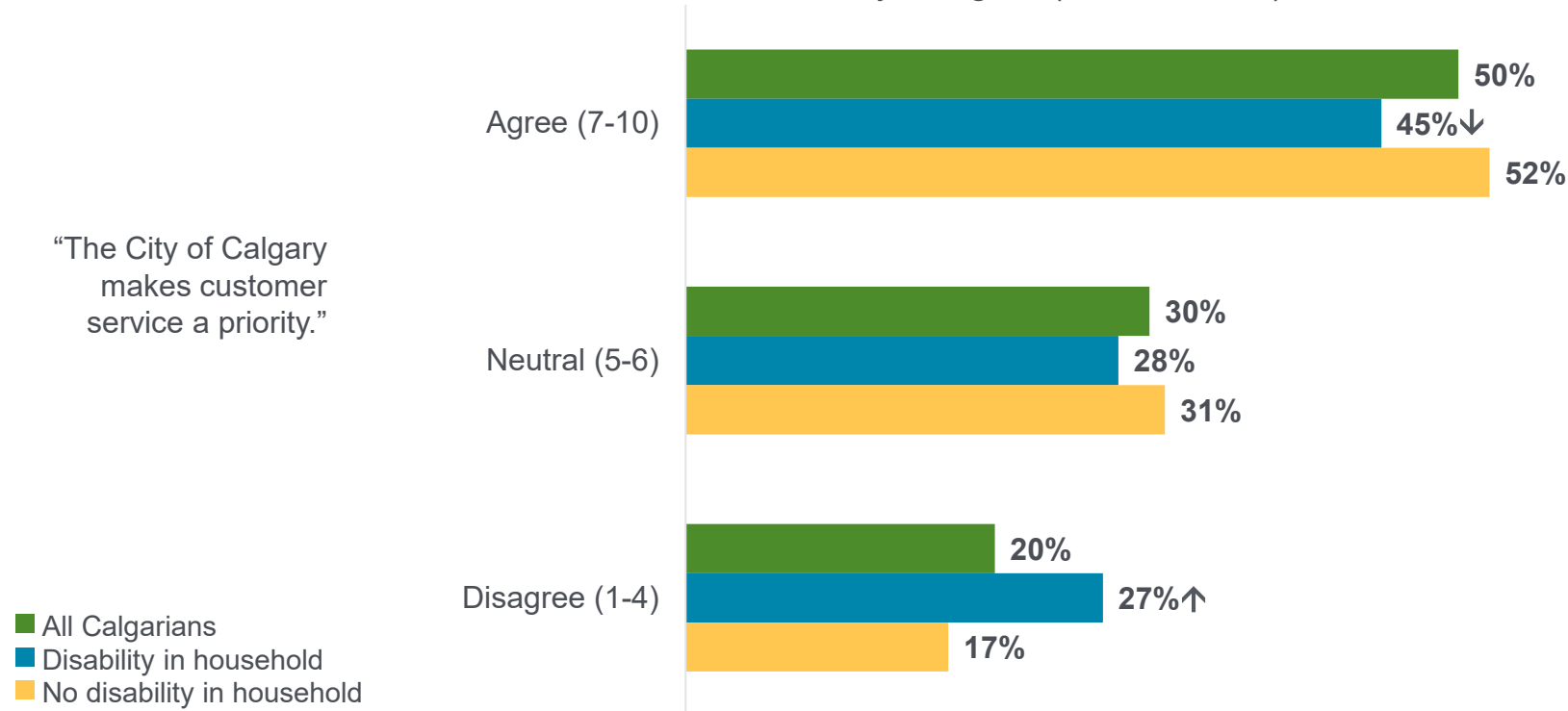

Makes customer service a priority

One-half (50%) of Calgarians agree that The City of Calgary makes customer service a priority. A lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability agree that The City prioritizes customer service than those from households without someone with a disability (45% vs. 52%, respectively). In turn, a higher proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability disagree (27% vs. 17%).

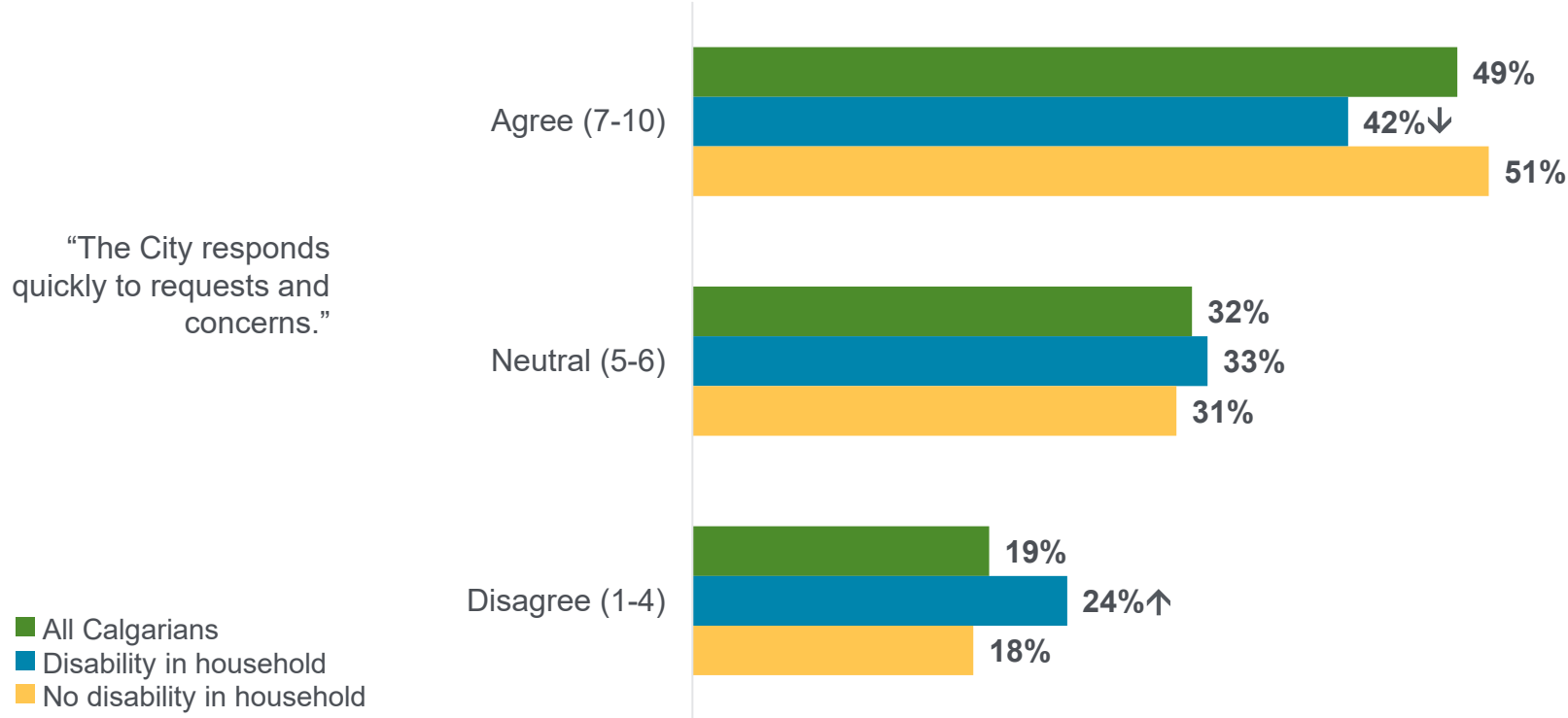

Quickly responds to requests and concerns

One-half (49%) of Calgarians agree that The City responds quickly to requests and concerns. Fewer Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability agree that The City responds quickly to concerns (42%) than those from households without someone with a disability (51%). Conversely, more Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability disagree (24% vs. 18%, respectively). Meanwhile, neutral ratings are similar between the two groups (33% and 31%).

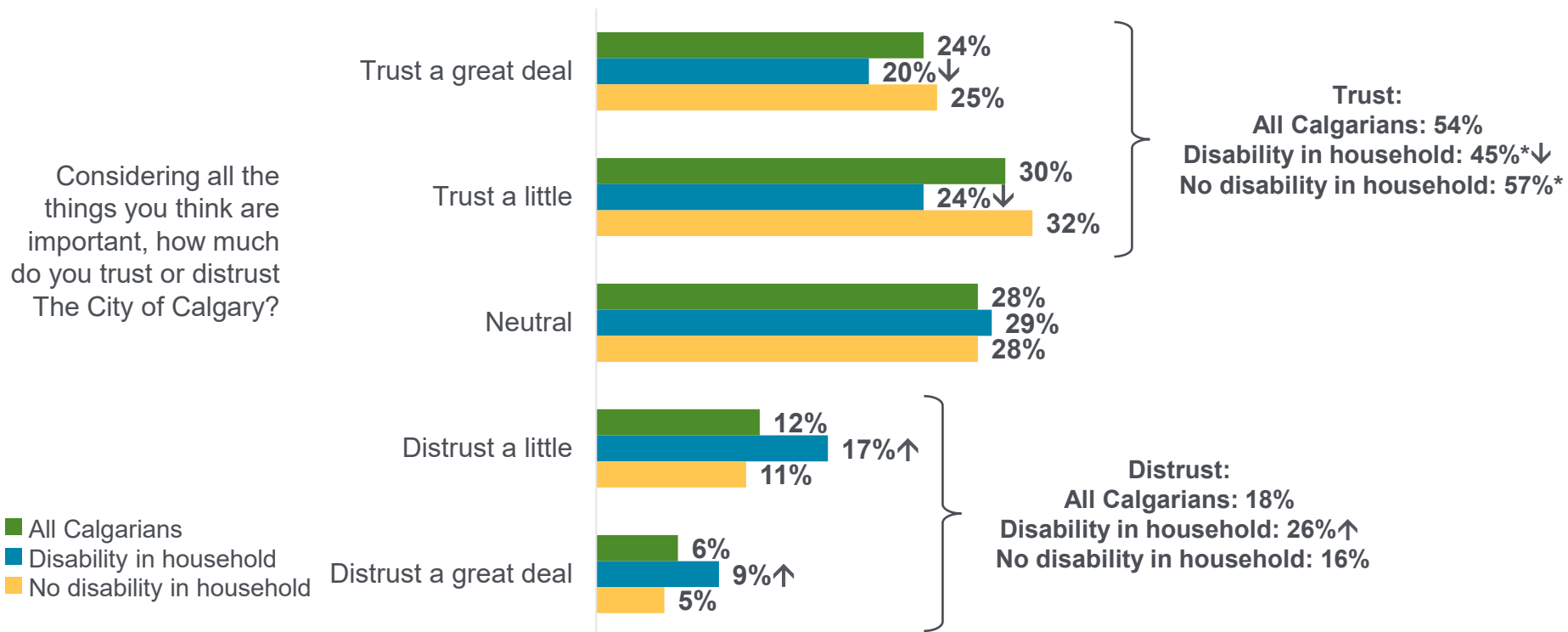


Trust and transparency



Trust in The City of Calgary

Around one-half (54%) of Calgarians trust The City of Calgary. A lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability have trust in The City of Calgary (45%) compared to those from households without someone with a disability (57%). Correspondingly, a higher proportion of those who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability distrust The City (26% vs. 16%). Neutral ratings, however, are nearly identical between the two groups (29% and 28%, respectively).



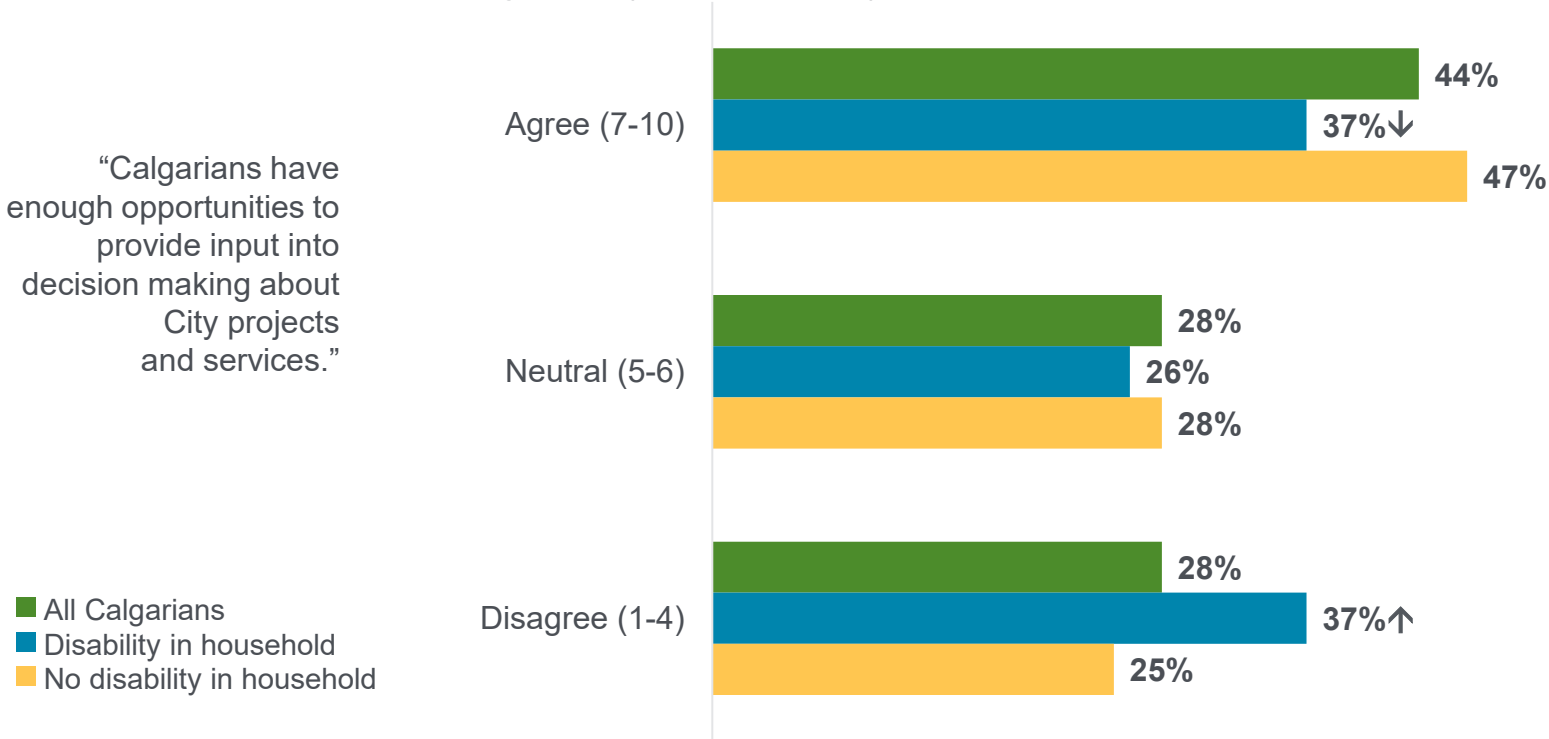
Q. Considering all the things you think are important, how much do you trust or distrust The City of Calgary?

Enough opportunities to provide input

More than two-fifths (44%) of Calgarians agree they have enough opportunities to provide input into decision making about City projects and services. The two groups differ when it comes to agreement that they have enough opportunities to provide input (37% for Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability vs. 47% for those from households without someone with a disability). In turn, a higher proportion of those from households with a disability disagree (37% vs. 25%, respectively). Meanwhile, neutral ratings are comparable between the two groups (26% and 28%).

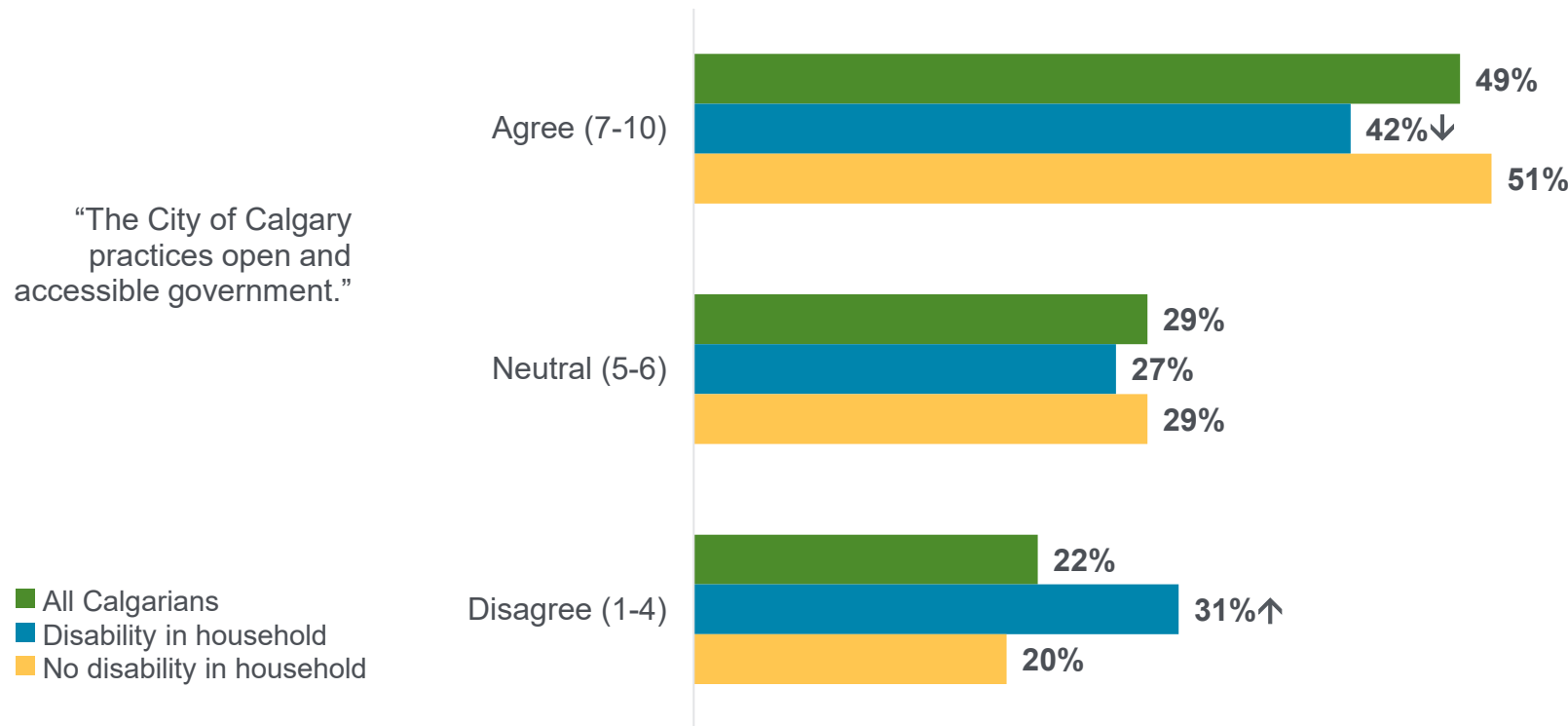

Open and accessible government

One-half (49%) of Calgarians agree that The City of Calgary practices open and accessible government. A lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability agree that The City practices open and accessible government compared to those from households without someone with a disability (42% vs. 51%, respectively). Conversely, a higher proportion of those from households with someone with a disability disagree (31% vs. 20%). Neutral ratings are similar between the two groups (27% and 29%).
