## Project overview

This Is My Neighbourhood was created to provide an opportunity for residents to partner with The City of Calgary to identify ways to help make their neighbourhood an even better place to live, work and play.

In 2016, The City of Calgary delivered more than 100 programs, services and small-scale improvement projects to a first group of 14 neighbourhoods.

In 2017, The City of Calgary is working with a new group of 14 neighbourhoods. The City will work with the neighbourhoods to first identify a neighbourhood vision. From that vision, participants, working with City staff, will come up with creative ideas (programs, services and small-scale infrastructure improvements) that support their neighbourhood vision as identified in the engagement. In 2018 those programs, services and infrastructure projects will be implemented.



## Engagement overview

This report covers what we heard during the visioning phase for Banff Trail. This is the first step in the engagement for the This is My Neighbourhood program.

## What we asked

Residents in Banff Trail were asked:

What would make Banff Trail a better place to live, work and play? They were then asked to choose their top three vision words from a list (see below), or add their own, and explain why they chose that word.

## How we connected

There were three different ways citizens could provide feedback:

1. Everyone in the neighbourhood was mailed a postcard with the vision question and could drop it off at the Banff Trail Community Hall, Weeds Café or the Higher Ground Café. The postcards were sent to 1453 residents.
2. The vision survey was available online through the [engage.calgary.ca/myNeighbourhood/banfftrail](http://engage.calgary.ca/myNeighbourhood/banfftrail) portal page from July 10 to October 31, 2017. The survey was promoted on road signs, through Facebook and in the community newsletter. We received 38 online submissions for Banff Trail, and one comment through Facebook.
3. City staff attended various community events to gather feedback. In total, we received 33 postcard submissions. The table below summarizes the events we attended and how many people we reached at each event.

## What we heard

This is a short overview of what citizens of Banff Trail told us this summer and fall. Of the eleven vision words provided, **Safe, Family-friendly, Clean** and **Active** were chosen the most often.

**Safe:** Safety is top-of-mind for many Banff Trail residents. There are multiple concerns around speeding and the need for safer street crossings (especially for children), and there is a perception that crime in the neighbourhood may be on the rise. While some residents share that they feel very safe, others cite examples of break-ins, loitering and concerns stemming from close proximity to the Banff Trail LRT station.

Other areas mentioned within this vision word include – need for safety throughout the neighbourhood (including in parks), safe walking conditions (re: snow/ice), panhandling, more trees to reduce traffic noise, and the need for a compassionate response to homelessness and rough sleeping.

**Family-friendly:** The residents of Banff Trail love the family-friendly nature of the community, and celebrate the number of children and families in the area. There appears to be significant interest in continuing to

support the families that live there and encouraging connection and community cohesion through enhanced amenities (especially playgrounds), more activities for youth and teens, and more community events.

Other areas mentioned within this vision word include – the importance of community, the need for benches in some green spaces, better oversight of rental properties and maintenance/upkeep, an updated play area at the community centre and the suggestion of greater enforcement to address “rowdies and troublemakers”.

**Clean:** The desire to clean up Banff Trail comes through loud and clear in the comments. There are many comments about what is considered to be an unacceptable level of garbage and litter in the schoolyards, alleyways and yards. The comments indicate that a cleaner environment would lead to an increase in community pride, a increased desire to walk around the community, and an enhanced sense of safety and security.

Other areas mentioned within this vision word include – an annual community dump run, desire for more garbage cans, concern around the impact of transit riders and football fans, need for increased enforcement, desire for paved back alleys, concern around private vehicles and their impact on air quality, and concerns around unkempt rental properties.

**Active:** The comments provided around the vision of an active Banff Trail reflect an understanding of the importance and potential benefits of activity, an appreciation for the active opportunities currently available in the community, and multiple suggestions for further improvement.

Specific suggestions and areas mentioned within this vision word include – more active opportunities for all ages, need for on-going support, more bike paths, easy access to green spaces, more sporting events and updating the pedestrian bridge over 16<sup>th</sup> Avenue.

### Selected 10 times

### Answers to “why” below

- Close to downtown, Crowchild Trail, 16th Ave, the University of Calgary and so much more.
- So close to downtown, university hospital and north hill mall
- We live in the area and do not own a car. We can bike walk or bus anywhere we need to.
- Bike friendly, family friendly
- Reduce out of neighborhood vehicles from clogging streets and limiting parking for residents and their guests.
- So you transit rider ship is down 2%? Why am i not surprised...
- Useless bus service for elderly and other non-drivers.. An excellent route and schedule (30 mins) on #10 is now an appalling route and schedule on #65 - clearly serving the convenience of calgary transit over the needs and wants of the community. What used to be packed buses in rush hour now carry less than a dozen passengers...and what used to be 12 - 20 passengers on every bus during off peak - mainly seniors, mobility challenged, mentally challenged and mothers with strollers - has reduced to two to three passengers - and quite often, i'm the lone passenger.  
The reasons  
- bus no longer goes to city hall (it stops at 11 st se - who in [inappropriate word removed] wants to go to 11 st se?)  
Bus no longer goes along brentwood road nw so misses coop, five restaurants, a church, two banks ....and provides no service to four

- recently built high rises which have reduced parking (so the residents who had intended to take the bus now have cars - and guess where they are parked).  
A number of us seniors used to use #10 bus to meet for lunch at one of the pubs on brentwood road. We still meet, still drink as much ...but now we no choice but to drive  
See below for potential fixes..  
Want to reverse the trend and return to a money making service?  
Re route the #65 s to calgary tower...a ""no transfer"" (this is the #1 want of all transit riders) access to downtown offices and city hall.  
Re route the #65 n along brentwood road ...access to coop, five restaurants, a church, two banks and four high rises  
Re route the #65 n & s to lions park c-train station...access to c-train, shopping centre, medical facilities, groceries, drugstores etc  
Reschedule #65 n & s to a 30 min service ...will now connect with other, regular timed buses"
- I want my back alley paved, so I can access to my garage without having rock chips on my vehicle and also not on vehicles parked in back.
- I value being able to walk to nearby services ie. Grocery store health clinic, pharmacy, shopping, parks

**Answers to “why” below**

- An active community has Neighbours wanting to be outside interacting with each other. Local friends with support and strong mental health.

- Rental Properties - Many tenants are not keeping up with yard work. Overgrown grass + weeds and junk yards
- Neglected lawn and garbage on back alley on rental units

**Answers to "why" below**

- Sign on 22nd Street NW to SLOW DOWN, Children Are Playing
- We need safe streets where cars aren't speeding so people can pick up their kids. We need parks that are safe for kids to play in and neighbourhoods that are safe so things and animals don't go missing.
- For example: speed bumps on Canmore Rd, patrolling the parks, keeping parks clean, etc."
- This includes being walkable ie. Snow free and ice free sidewalks.
- Break Ins & Transients
- No one wants o feel unsafe in their home. Someone tried to break in to our garage 4 times in the last 18 months. Their have been multiple car robberies on our street in the last year.
- Sometimes there are hecklers and pan handlers that are aggressive. I don't feel too secure or safe taking the Banff Trail LRT at night.
- Crime is increasing, and we never imagined it like that.
- I think everybody here needs safety and they want to be care-free.
- I am scare to cross the 24 Ave (by the church) crosswalk. Many times the cars came off the Crowchild and they don't stop for pedestrians. There should be flashing lights that walkers can press, might help.
- I would love to have another crosswalk on 24 Ave, 17 St at Capitol Hill.
- Braton School at 18th & 20 Ave do not have lights -> occasionally kids have to stop for cars!
- "24 Ave NW is a nightmare for crossing the street. Cars are speeding, blowing through

crosswalks daily while parent and small children try to cross the street. Lower the speed limit or put in speed bumps. This is obviously being used as a major route for motorists."

- Put lights and make cross walks visible. My kids risk their lives every day to get to school and I am surprised no one has been seriously hurt on 24 ave yet. The entire route from 14 st to crowchild is a death trap.
- Due to some tree dead, the noise from crow child is big, for the dafe concern, it would be great if plant more and high tree beside crow child.
- Promote safety
- We develop compassionate responses to homelessness and rough sleeping.
- Safety is paramount for all calgarians
- In this neighborhood I feel that there are really kind people everywhere and that I can rely on the people around me. I feel that not only is Banff Trail a safe neighborhood for me but for the environment as well. The parks and streets here are clean and litter free because the people here are environmentally aware and clean up after themselves and others.
- Crosswalk @ Cochrane Rd + Canmore Rd (already in progress)
- I believe it is due to the proximity to the C-Train Station and 16th, but there seem to be quite a bit of drug abusers hanging around the Home Depot and generally in the neighbourhood. So far this summer, we have noticed 2 car break-ins as well.

**Answers to “why” below**

- More traffic enforcement + speed bumps  
Pedestrians commuting or using transit often have to dodge distracted vehicle drivers
- Library and mall and playgrounds nearby and walkable
- I want Banff Trail to be walkable because there are lots of kids walking to and from school, so I think that a safe walking environment should be available to everyone. Also, activity is important so I think everybody should feel safe walking in their community.
- Being on foot is better for health, community + environment
- Greater enforcement on vehicular traffic and enforcement of parking rules to ensure that pedestrians can be seen easily by motorists.
- Remove some of the unnecessary physical barriers to walking this neighbourhood. For example, the park between Louise Riley Library and the C-train tracks does not need to be fenced on every side. Removing the fence on the 16 Ave side would make it easier to walk through.
- Reduce car traffic, get people walking and cycling
- There's no "cycle-able" on the list, so this was closest :) but also because we enjoy getting around as much as possible by "not the car".
- We need areas to be walkable, the more walkable a community the better chance of having people interact
- 
- People can enjoy going places a connecting with others
- Lack of visible crosswalks make it almost impossible to cross the street. Every day I see cars run through as I am halfway across the road and or cars nearly rear ended due to excessive speeds
- Encourage more density in infrastructure within the community. Make streets safer to cross to children. Lots of kids in the area walk to school and more crosswalks are needed. It really is quite walkable already which is one of the reason we choose this neighbourhood.
- Things are most accessible when places are walkable. As well, walkable communities are closer communities.
- Banff Trail does not have a grocery store super close to it and also, there isn't a very big mall near the neighborhood.
- I want walkable sidewalk on my block. A sidewalk with no cracks that people trip on, strollers get stuck on, . I want a walkable sidewalk for the elders to use when they go for walks with their walkers and it's super nice and smooth for them, and children with there scooters and brand New bikes. I want a walkable sidewalk on my block.
- So important...keep pedestrian access & bike access.
