Background and methodology



Equity-deserving communities

Calgary’s Equity-Deserving Communities (EDCs) are defined as groups of people who generally have less access to opportunities, resources, and systems of power because of their actual or perceived identity or identities. EDCs often experience social and financial disadvantages because of systems of oppression, which takes many forms including, but not limited to, racism, sexism, and ableism.

The City aims to better understand the perspectives of equity-deserving communities through the lens of the annual Spring and Fall Surveys of Calgarians. The data in this report are from the 2023 Fall Survey of Calgarians. Inclusion in EDC groups is determined by self-reported demographic data from the general population survey. Both seasonal surveys are conducted in English to manage time and cost restraints. The City acknowledges that the ability to speak English may be a barrier for potential participants.

This is one of nine reports on Equity-Deserving Communities, each focusing on a different EDC. The EDCs and their demographic variables are as follows, with the EDC category noted in bold text below:

Methodology

- The survey was conducted by Ipsos Public Affairs from August 2, 2023 to September 4, 2023 with a randomly-selected sample of 2,500 Calgarians, via telephone survey.
- The survey was conducted using random digit dialing with numbers from both landlines (60%) and cell phones (40%) to obtain a random and statistically-representative sample of Calgarians.
- To ensure the data was gathered from a representative group of Calgarians, sample quotas were set by age, gender, and city ward of the general population aged 18 and older.
- Data were weighted based on the 2019 Municipal and 2021 Federal Census data for age, gender and city ward to ensure composition reflects that of the actual Calgary population aged 18 or older. Although the results are weighted, sample size for each question represents the number of actual respondents (i.e., unweighted n).
- The margin of error (MOE) for the total sample of 2,500 is ± 1.96 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error for the person/people with disability (PWD) in household sub-group of 530 is ± 4.26 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, and the margin of error for the without PWD in household sub-group of 1,950 is ± 2.22 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error of each question will vary slightly depending on the total number of respondents who answered the question.

Interpreting results

Interpreting results

Not all questions asked within the Fall Survey of Calgarians are represented within this report.

In this report, we compare results between two groups:

1. Calgarians who have a disability and/or live in the same household as someone with a disability
2. Calgarians from households without someone with a disability

To avoid repeating the lengthy description "Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability" throughout the report, we will use the shortened term "Calgarians from households with PWD" where PWD is an acronym for person(s) with disability.

As such, please note that the "Calgarians from households with PWD" or "with PWD" group encompasses two sub-groups:

- Calgarians who have a disability themselves
- Calgarians who live with someone else in their household who has a disability

Statistically significant differences are noted throughout the report:

- ↑ indicates number is significantly higher than the other group.
- ↓ indicates number is significantly lower than the other group.
- * Some results in this report are subject to rounding adjustments.

Significant differences are an indication that a difference is not due to chance. A mathematical formula is used to calculate each difference independently. Whether or not a difference is considered significant depends on a few factors including the total sample size and the variability of responses. Larger sample sizes mean that smaller differences are significant. Additionally, variability of responses means that the more alike the responses are the more significant a change will be.



2023 Fall key findings

2023 Fall key findings (1 of 6)

Quality of life

Calgarians from households where either they or another person is living with a disability (PWD), hold positive views on Calgary's quality of life, its potential for making a life and living, and its future direction.

There are statistical **differences** between Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) and Calgarians from households without a person living with a disability. Statistically fewer with PWD:

- Rate the overall quality of life as 'good' (66% with PWD vs. 79% without PWD)
- Agree that Calgary is a great place to make a life (66% with PWD vs. 78% without)
- Believe that Calgary is a great place to make a living (60% vs. 72%, respectively)

The outlook on Calgary's future is **similar** among the two groups:

- Belief that Calgary is on the right track to be a better city 10 years from now (68% of Calgarians from households with a PWD and 71% of Calgarians from households without).

Inclusivity

The City's efforts toward inclusivity are acknowledged to some extent by those who have a disability or are living with someone who has a disability, yet opinions are mixed regarding City programs and services designed to remove barriers for those in need.

There are statistical **differences** in views on inclusivity. A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD):

- Agree that The City fosters a city that is inclusive and accepting of all (62% with PWD vs. 69% without)
- Confirm The City delivers programs and services that remove barriers to participation for Calgarians who need it the most (43% with PWD vs. 49% without)

2023 Fall key findings (2 of 6)

Safety

While opinions are mixed among Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) on whether Calgary is safe overall, fewer believe it is safe and welcoming for everyone. Similarly, while belief that The City is working to ensure transit is safe is split in this group, many avoid transit because of safety concerns.

When it comes to the safety of Calgary, statistical *differences* are evident. A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability:

- Think Calgary is safe overall (58% with PWD vs. 72% without PWD)
- Agree Calgary is safe for all residents and visitors regardless of ethnicity, race, religion, income or sexual identity (41% with PWD vs. 48% without PWD)

When it comes to Calgary Transit safety and concerns around its use, the two groups share *similar* views:

- Agreement that The City is taking sufficient steps to ensure Calgary Transit is a safe travel option (58% with PWD and 57% without PWD)
- Avoidance of taking transit in Calgary because of personal safety concerns (54% with PWD and 53% without)

The environment

Many Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) recognize the need for urgent climate action. However, awareness of current City programs and services designed to mitigate environmental impact is relatively lower.

Both groups share *similar* views on the need to act now to address climate change (60% with PWD and 62% without).

There are statistical *differences* in perceptions of what The City is doing for the environment, with a lower proportion of Calgarians from households with PWD being aware that The City has programs and services aimed at helping Calgarians reduce their environmental impact (42% vs. 48% without PWD).

2023 Fall key findings (3 of 6)

Services and programs

Many Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) hold a positive view of the overall level and quality of The City's services and programs.

Perceptions of the overall level and quality of services and programs provided by The City are *similar* between those from households with PWD and those from households without PWD (66% satisfied and 70% satisfied, respectively).

Taxation

Opinions are divided among Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) on whether they receive good value for their municipal tax dollars.

Both groups share *similar* perceptions of receiving 'good value' for their municipal tax dollars (49% of Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability and 51% of Calgarians from households without PWD).

Customer service

The City of Calgary's customer service meets the expectations of many Calgarians who either have a disability or live in a household with someone who does.

There is a statistical *difference* in the perception of customer service. A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability agree that The City meets their customer service expectations. While they are generally satisfied, it is less pronounced than those from households without a PWD (69% vs. 74%, respectively).

Input from Calgarians

When it comes to The City's responsiveness and efforts to include Calgarians in decision making, Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) hold a somewhat mixed view, and many feel they lack sufficient opportunities to provide input.

Both groups share *similar* views that:

- The City is responsive to the needs and expectations of Calgarians (58% with PWD agree and 62% of Calgarians from households without a disability agree)
- They are confident The City is working to improve how it includes Calgarians' input into important decisions (55% with PWD and 60% of Calgarians from households without a disability)

A statistical *difference* also exists, with a lower proportion of people from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) agreeing that Calgarians have enough opportunities to provide input into decision making (45% with PWD vs. 54% without).

Reputation and performance

A majority of Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) are satisfied with the jobs that City Administration and The City as a whole are doing to run the city, but satisfaction levels decline for City Council, and trust in The City is even lower.

There are statistical *differences* in trust and performance ratings. A lower proportion of Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD):

- Have trust in The City of Calgary (42% with PWD vs. 48% of Calgarians from households without)
- Agree The City, including Council and Administration as a whole is doing a good job (58% vs. 63% without PWD)
- Agree City Administration, excluding City Council is doing a good job (64% vs. 71% without PWD)
- Agree City Council, excluding City Administration is doing a good job (49% vs. 56% without PWD)

2023 Fall key findings (5 of 6)

Council focus areas

A majority of Calgarians from households where someone has a disability believe that The City is working to promote Calgary's cultural heritage and diversity and to foster positive relationships with Indigenous partners. However, awareness is mixed about The City working toward addressing social issues.

Both groups share *similar* positive views that The City is doing a good job at:

- Working to ensure Calgary is seen as a city that celebrates culture, heritage, and diversity (88% with PWD and 87% without PWD)
- Working to build meaningful relationships with Indigenous partners (79% with PWD and 82% without PWD)

There is a statistical *difference* in the perception of The City's work on social issues, with a lower proportion of Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) agreeing that The City is working with community partners to address social issues like mental health and addiction (52% vs. 59% without PWD).

Housing and affordability

A large majority of Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability agree that The City should invest more in affordable housing programs for low-income Calgarians, as very few believe that all Calgarians currently have access to adequate housing.

The two groups are in *similar* agreement that The City should invest more into affordable housing programs for low-income Calgarians (91% with PWD and 90% without PWD). Of note, 'strong' agreement is statistically higher among households where someone has a disability (74%) compared to households without PWD (66%).

There is a statistical *difference* in the perception that all Calgarians have access to adequate housing that meets their needs. Specifically, fewer Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) agree this is the case (25% vs. 32% without PWD).

2023 Fall key findings (6 of 6)

Downtown Calgary

There is a desire among a vast majority of Calgarians with a disability or live in a household where someone has a disability for The City to improve safety in Calgary's downtown. Infrastructure investment is of interest to a majority, but seems to be less of a priority than safety.

When it comes to downtown investment, the two groups show similar as well as differing perspectives.

- The **similar** viewpoint between the two groups is the belief that The City should be doing more to address safety issues in Calgary's downtown (93% with PWD and 94% without PWD)
- And there is a statistical **difference** with fewer Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) in agreement about The City investing more into infrastructure in Calgary's downtown (64% vs. 71% without PWD)

Quality of life




Overall quality of life in Calgary

Three-quarters (76%) of Calgarians consider the overall quality of life in the city of Calgary as ‘good.’ A statistically lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability feel the quality of life is ‘good’ (66%) compared to households without someone with a disability (79%).

Q. On a scale of “1” to “10” where “1” is “very poor” and “10” is “very good,” how would you rate the overall quality of life in the city of Calgary today?



Great place to make a life

Three-quarters (75%) of Calgarians think Calgary is a great place to make a life. This opinion is held by a statistically lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (66%) compared to households without someone with a disability (78%).



Great place to make a living

Seven-in-ten (70%) Calgarians feel Calgary is a great place to make a living. Statistically fewer Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (60%) feel this way than those from households without someone with a disability (72%).



On track to be a better city

Seven-in-ten (70%) Calgarians believe Calgary is heading in the right direction to become a better city in the next 10 years. Similar proportions of those from a household with a person living with disability (PWD) and those from households without PWD share this optimism for the future (68% and 71%, respectively).




Inclusivity



Perceptions of inclusion

Two-thirds (67%) of Calgarians agree that The City fosters a city that is inclusive and accepting of all. A statistically lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability agree (62%) compared to households without someone with a disability (69%).



Removes barriers to participation

Nearly one-half (48%) of all Calgarians confirm that The City delivers programs and services that remove barriers to participation for Calgarians who need it the most. This sentiment is held by a significantly smaller proportion of Calgarians who agree and have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (43%) compared to households without someone with a disability (49%).




Safety



Overall perceived safety of the city of Calgary

In general, seven-in-ten (69%) Calgarians think the city of Calgary is ‘safe.’ A statistically smaller proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability think Calgary is ‘safe’ (58%) compared to those from households without someone with a disability (72%).




Safe for all residents and visitors

Around one-half (47%) of all Calgarians believe that Calgary is safe for all residents and visitors, regardless of things like ethnicity, race, religion, income, or sexual identity. Statistically fewer Calgarians from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) share this belief (41%) compared to households without PWD (48%).



Ensuring Calgary Transit safety

More than one-half (57%) of all Calgarians agree that The City is taking sufficient steps to ensure Calgary Transit is a safe travel option. There are no statistically significant differences by subgroup (58% with person/people with disability and 57% of those without PWD).




Avoiding transit due to personal safety concerns

Around one-half (54%) of Calgarians say they tend to avoid taking transit in Calgary because of concerns for their personal safety. This sentiment is shared by similar proportions of those from households with a person living with a disability (PWD) and without PWD (54% agree and 53% agree, respectively).




The environment



Climate change

Three-fifths (61%) of all Calgarians think we need to act now to address climate change. There are no statistically significant differences between the subgroups (60% with PWD and 62% without PWD).




City programs to reduce environmental impact

Around one-half (47%) of Calgarians believe The City has programs and services aimed at helping Calgarians reduce their environmental impact. A significantly lower proportion of Calgarians with a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability believe there are such programs and services (42%) compared to households without someone with a disability (48%).




City services and programs



Satisfaction with the overall level and quality of City services and programs

Seven-in-ten (69%) Calgarians say they are satisfied with the overall level and quality of services and programs provided by The City. Similar proportions of those with a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability and those from households without someone with a disability report they are satisfied (66% and 70%, respectively).




Taxation



Perceived value of property taxes

One-half (50%) of all Calgarians perceive the value they receive from their tax dollars to be ‘good.’ Perception of good value for tax dollars is similar between Calgarians from households where someone has a disability and households without someone who has a disability (49% and 51%, respectively).




Customer service



Meets customer service expectations

Nearly three-quarters (73%) of all Calgarians say that The City of Calgary meets their expectations from customer service. A significantly lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability agree (69%) compared to households without someone with a disability (74%).

Input from Calgarians




Enough opportunities to provide input

Around one-half (52%) of all Calgarians have the impression that they have enough opportunities to provide input into decision making about City projects and services. Statistically fewer Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability feel they have enough opportunity to provide input (45%) compared to households without someone with a disability (54%). While a higher proportion disagree (55% vs. 46%, respectively).



Responsive to Calgarians

Three-fifths (61%) of all Calgarians confirm that The City of Calgary is responsive to the needs and expectations of Calgarians. Agreement is similar between the subgroups (58% of those with someone with a disability in their household and 62% of those without someone with a disability in their household).





Including Calgarians' input

Three-fifths (59%) of all Calgarians are confident The City of Calgary is working to improve how it includes Calgarians' input into important decisions. There are no statistically significant differences in confidence between those from households with someone with a disability (55%) and those from households without (60%).




Trust in The City of Calgary

Around one-half (46%) of Calgarians trust The City of Calgary. Statistically more of those from households with someone who has a disability (28%) distrust The City than households without a disability (21%), even though overall trust levels are lower among those with someone with a disability in the household (42% vs. 48% among those without).



Satisfaction with The City as a whole

Around three-fifths (62%) of all Calgarians are satisfied with how The City, including Council and Administration is running the city. A statistically smaller proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability are satisfied (58%) with The City compared to households without someone with a disability (63%).




Q. Taking everything into account, how satisfied or dissatisfied are you with the way The City of Calgary – including Council and Administration as a whole - is going about running our city?

Satisfaction with Administration

Seven-in-ten (69%) Calgarians express satisfaction with how City Administration (excluding City Council) is running the city. Satisfaction is statistically lower among Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability (64%) compared to households without someone with a disability (71%).




Q. Thinking about Calgary’s City Administration (excluding Council), how satisfied or dissatisfied are you with the way City Administration is going about running our city?

Satisfaction with Council

Around one-half (55%) of all Calgarians are satisfied with the way City Council (excluding City Administration) is running the city. A statistically lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability are satisfied with the Council (49%) compared to households without someone with a disability (56%).



Promoting Calgary as a city of culture, heritage, and diversity

A large majority (87%) of Calgarians feel The City is doing a good job at working to ensure Calgary is seen as a city that celebrates culture, heritage, and diversity. There are no statistically significant differences by subgroup (88% of those with someone with a disability in their household and 87% of those without someone with a disability in their household).





Four-fifths (81%) of all Calgarians believe The City of Calgary is doing a good job at working to build meaningful relationships with Indigenous partners. 


Working with community partners to address social issues

More than one-half (57%) of all Calgarians say that The City is doing a good job working with community partners to address social issues such as mental health and addiction. Statistically fewer Calgarians from households with someone with a disability (52%) feel The City is doing well compared to those from households without someone with a disability (59%).



Affordable housing

Nine-in-ten (90%) Calgarians agree (strongly or somewhat) that The City should invest more into affordable housing programs for low-income Calgarians. While both subgroups agree in similar proportions (91% and 90%, respectively), there is disparity in the degree of agreement. A higher proportion of Calgarians from households with someone with a disability 'strongly' agree (74%) than those from households without someone with a disability (66%).





A statistically lower proportion of Calgarians who have a disability or live in the same household as someone with a disability agree with this (25%) compared to households without someone with a disability (32%).




Downtown Calgary


