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Background and Methodology

Background

The City of Calgary surveys citizens about their opinions, preferences, and attitudes in order to help support data-driven City decision-making. The Citizen Perspectives Survey is one of the ways by which data are collected, and this survey is conducted multiple times throughout the year. Since April 2020, The City has used the Citizen Perspectives Survey to better understand Calgarians' opinions, beliefs, and concerns about the COVID-19 pandemic. This report presents the results of The City's seventeenth COVID-19 Snapshot survey.

Methodology

The survey was conducted by Advanis May 9 -19, 2022 with 500 Calgarians (aged 18 years or older) via phone using random digit dialing (RDD). The survey was conducted using numbers from both landlines (16% of completed surveys) and cell phones (84%) to obtain a random and statistically representative sample of Calgarians. The survey averaged 14 minutes in duration. The margin of error (MOE) for the total sample of n=500 is ± 4.4 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

To ensure the data were gathered from a representative group of Calgarians, sample quotas were set by age, gender, and city quadrant of the general population aged 18 and older. Data were then weighted to the 2019 Civic Census for age and gender.

Where applicable, results from the previous sixteen Snapshots are shown for comparison purposes. Where a difference from the previous Snapshot is statistically significant, it is noted with an arrow: ↓ or ↑

Key Findings



Key Findings

Most results have remained stable since March of this year.

- Measures that have remained stable since March are:
 - Satisfaction with The City's pandemic response (73% satisfied).
 - Trust in The City regarding its pandemic response (53% trust).
 - Trust in The City to make the right decisions about providing its services safely during a pandemic (72% trust).
 - Perceptions of the threat level (major, minor or no threat) of the pandemic to:
 - Calgary's economy (58%, 32% and 6%, respectively),
 - One's physical health (28%, 47% and 24%),
 - One's mental health (34%, 43%, and 22%) and
 - Day-to-day life in their community (28%, 50% and 22%).
 - Concern for oneself, household members and other family/friends becoming ill from COVID-19 (47%, 57% and 72%, respectively).
 - The pandemic has worsened their physical health (32%), mental health (46%) and financial situation (33%).
 - A negative impact on one's capacity to pay bills on time, mortgage/rent and property taxes (26%, 25% and 15%, respectively).
 - Being in public since the lifting of most pandemic restrictions on March 1st is stressful (38%).
 - Being comfortable attending outdoor events (71%) and indoor events (59%) with a large crowd, as well as attending events such as City in-person public engagement or a research focus group (70%).
 - Agreement with the statements "The worst of the COVID-19 pandemic is behind us" (72%) and "We should move past COVID-19 being treated as a pandemic and instead treat it as part of everyday life" (72%).
 - Wearing a face mask/shield (62%) and/or washing/sanitizing one's hands frequently (40%) in order to protect against COVID-19.

Key Findings – cont'd

- Measures that have changed since March are:
 - The proportion of Calgarians saying the pandemic is a major threat to their personal financial situation (18%, down from 24% in March) and to the overall health of Calgary's population (45%, up from 35%).
 - The pandemic has improved their physical health (13%, up from 9%).
 - The proportion of Calgarians avoiding being around other people/in crowded places (34%, up from 27%).
 - The proportion of Calgarians who say they always wear a face mask where not required (23%, down from 30%) and those who say they sometimes wear one (29%, up from 20%).

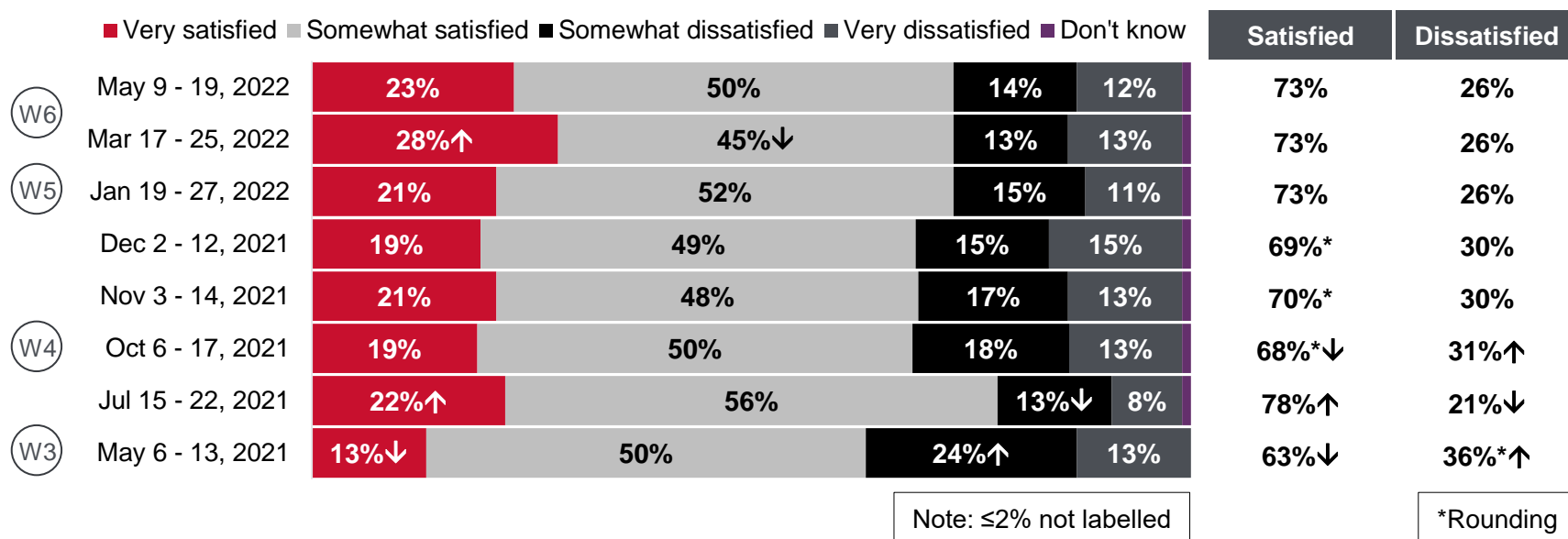


Opinions about The City's COVID-19 Response

Satisfaction with The City's COVID-19 Response

Satisfaction with The City's COVID-19 response remains unchanged from March, with 73% of Calgarians saying they are satisfied. Females are more likely than males to be satisfied (79% vs. 68%, respectively).

Satisfaction with The City's COVID-19 Response



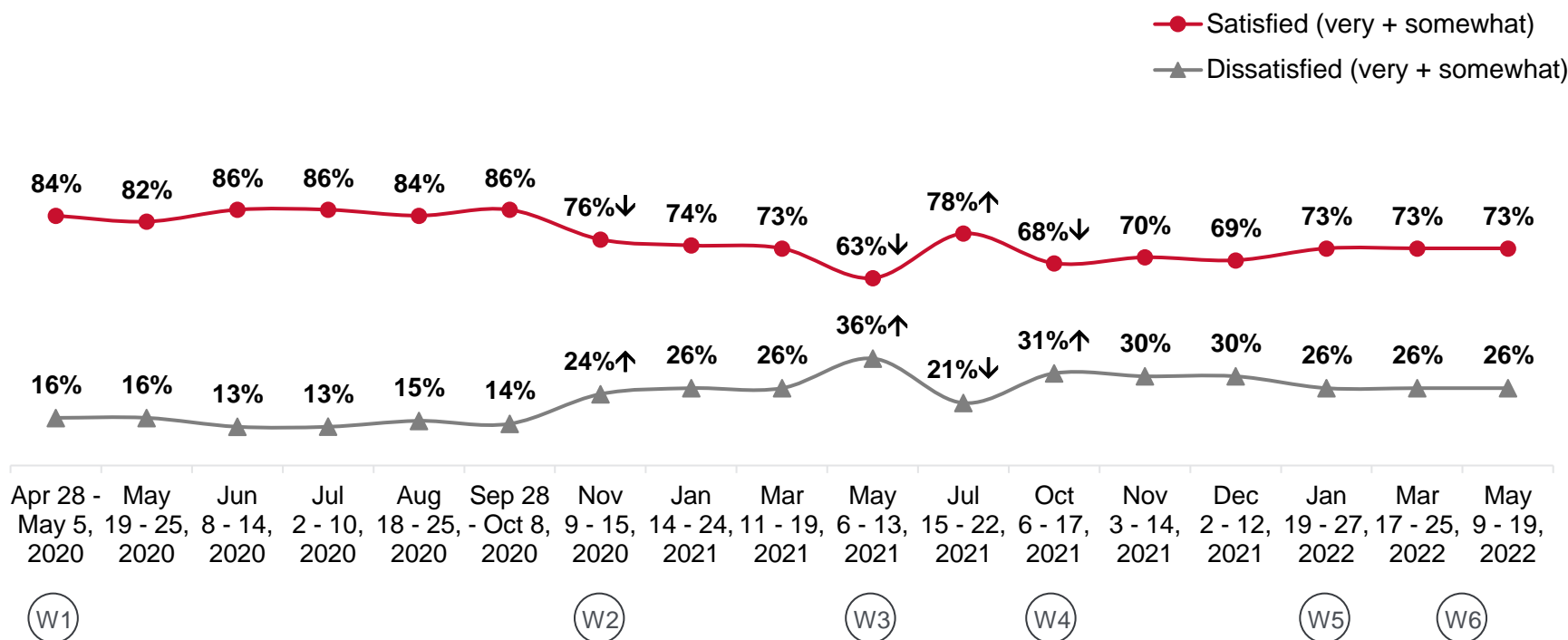

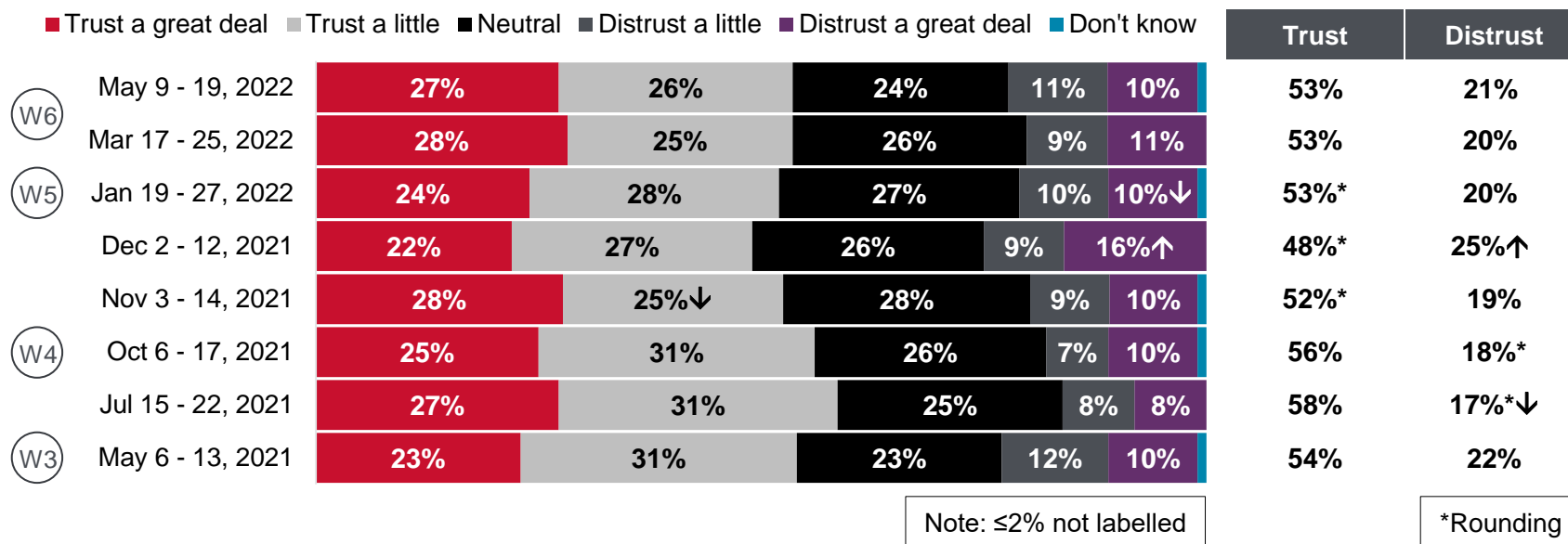

Trust in The City's COVID-19 Response

As with satisfaction with The City's COVID-19 response, trust in The City's response remains unchanged from March. Around one-half (53%) of Calgarians say they trust The City regarding its response over the past two years. Females are more likely than males to trust The City (60% vs. 48%, respectively) while males are more likely than females to say they distrust The City in terms of its pandemic response (26% vs. 16%, respectively). Those with children in the household are more likely than those without to trust The City regarding its pandemic response (61% vs. 49%, respectively). Calgarians 35 to 64 years of age are more likely than those 65 or older to trust The City (58% vs. 44%, respectively). SE residents are more likely than other Calgarians to distrust The City (31% vs. 18% SW, 19% NW and 17% NE).

Trust in The City Regarding COVID-19 Response



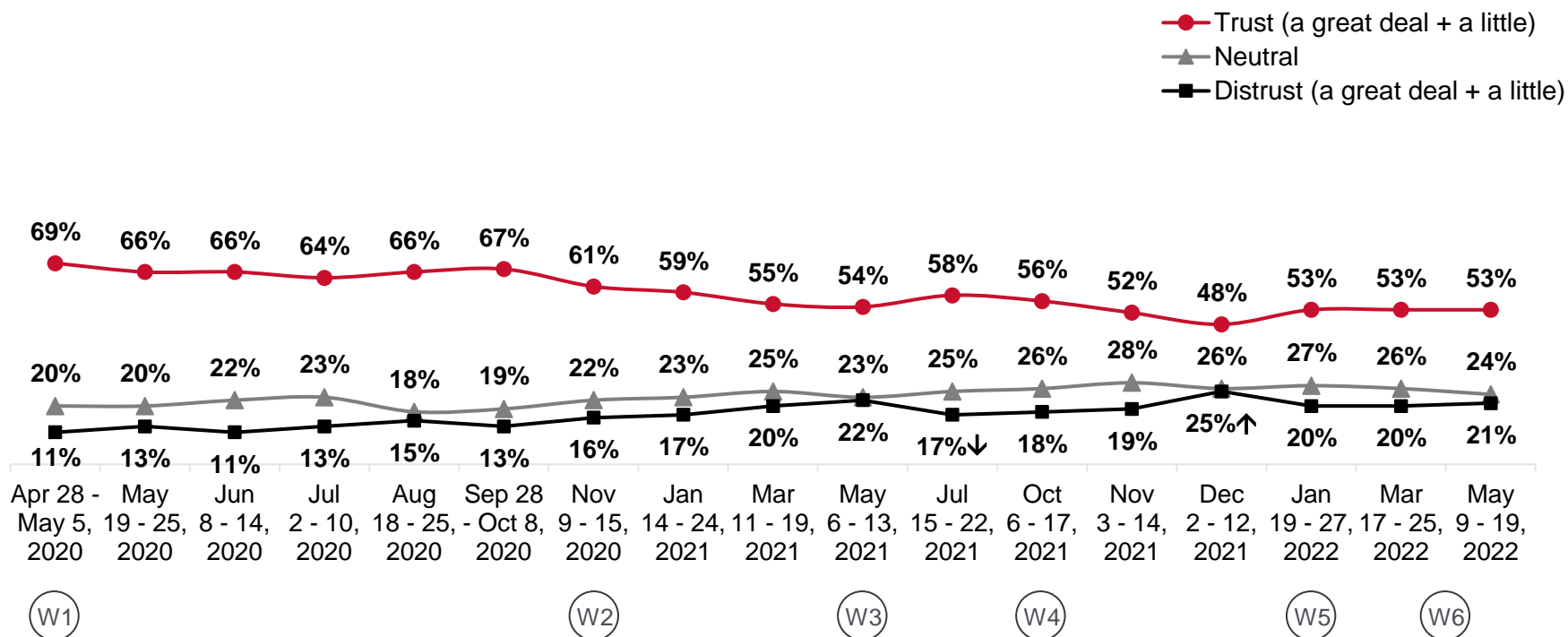

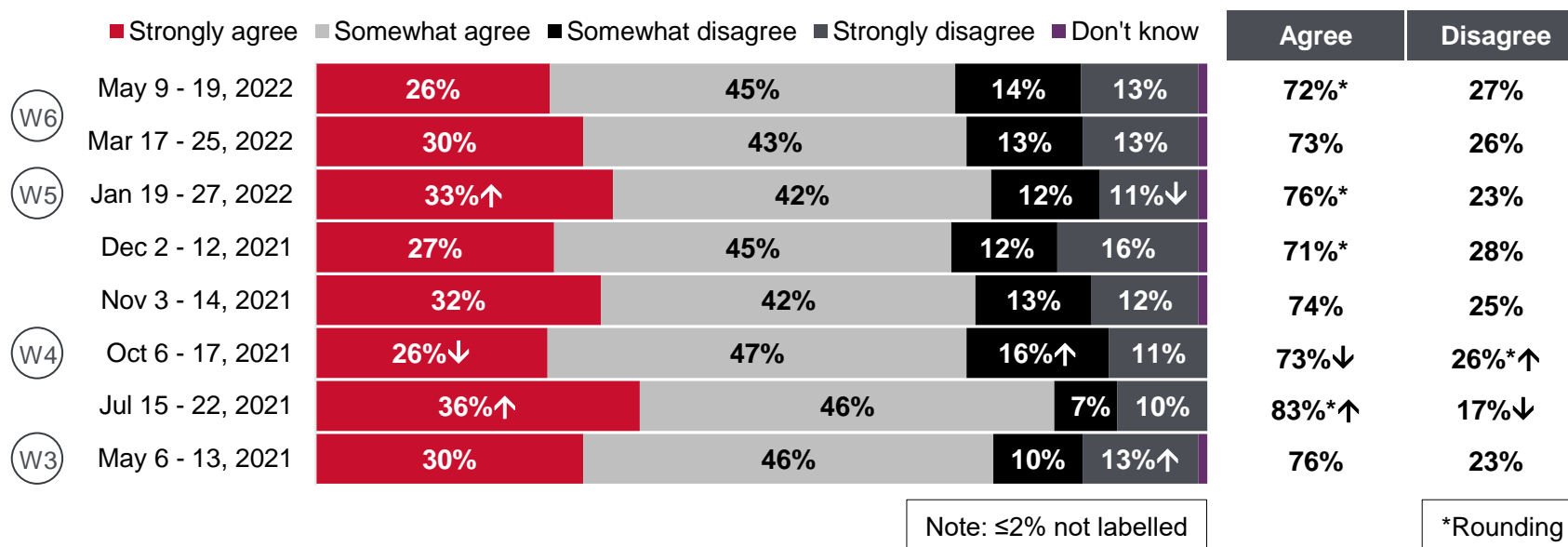

Around seven-in-ten (72%) Calgarians trust The City to make the right decisions about providing its services safely during a pandemic, on par with results in March. Females are more likely than males to trust The City in this regard (77% vs. 68%, respectively).

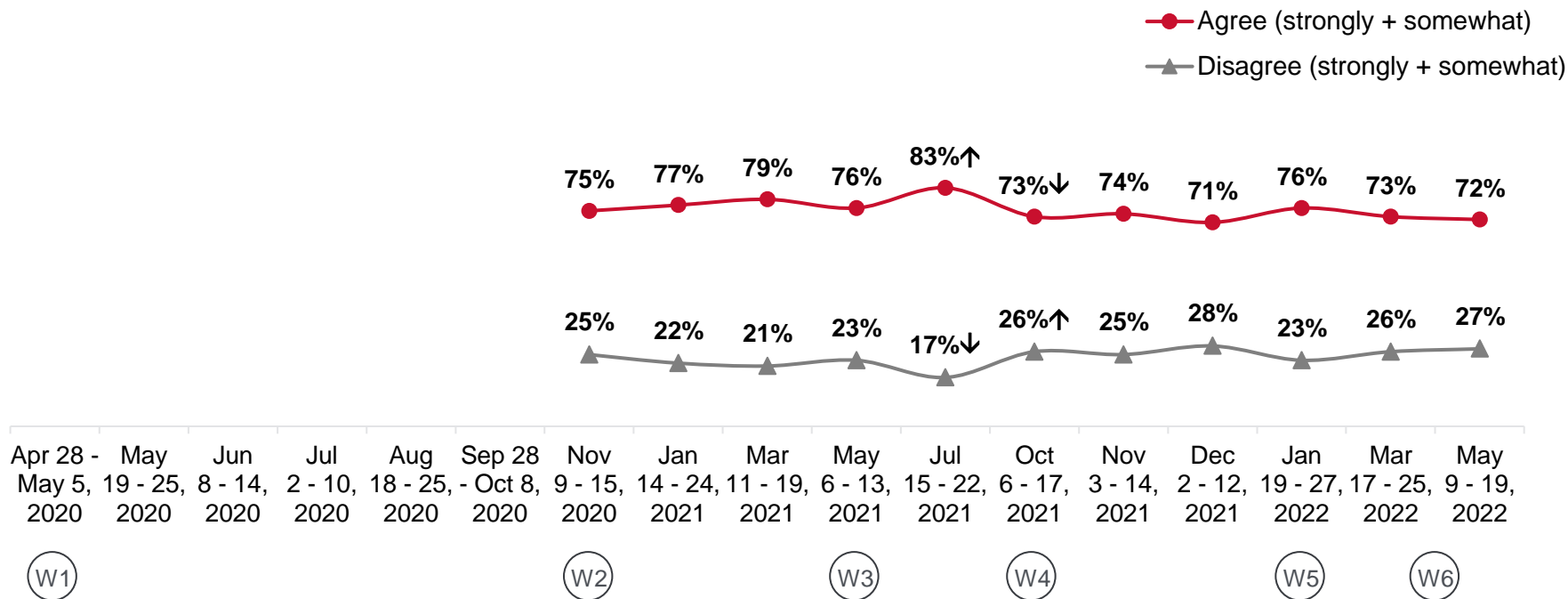

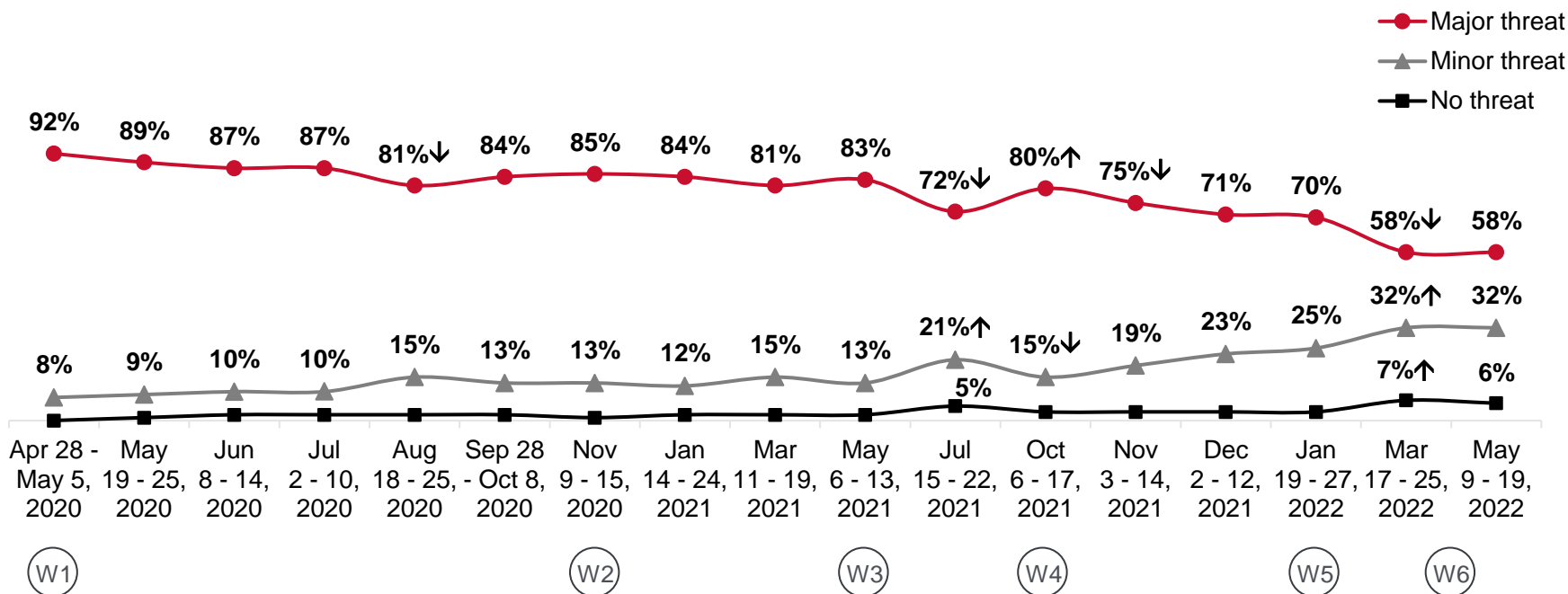


Concern about COVID-19 and the Pandemic

Perceived Threat Level of COVID-19

Consistent with results in March, nearly three-fifths (58%) of Calgarians view the pandemic as a major threat to the city's economy and one-third (32%) see it as a minor threat.

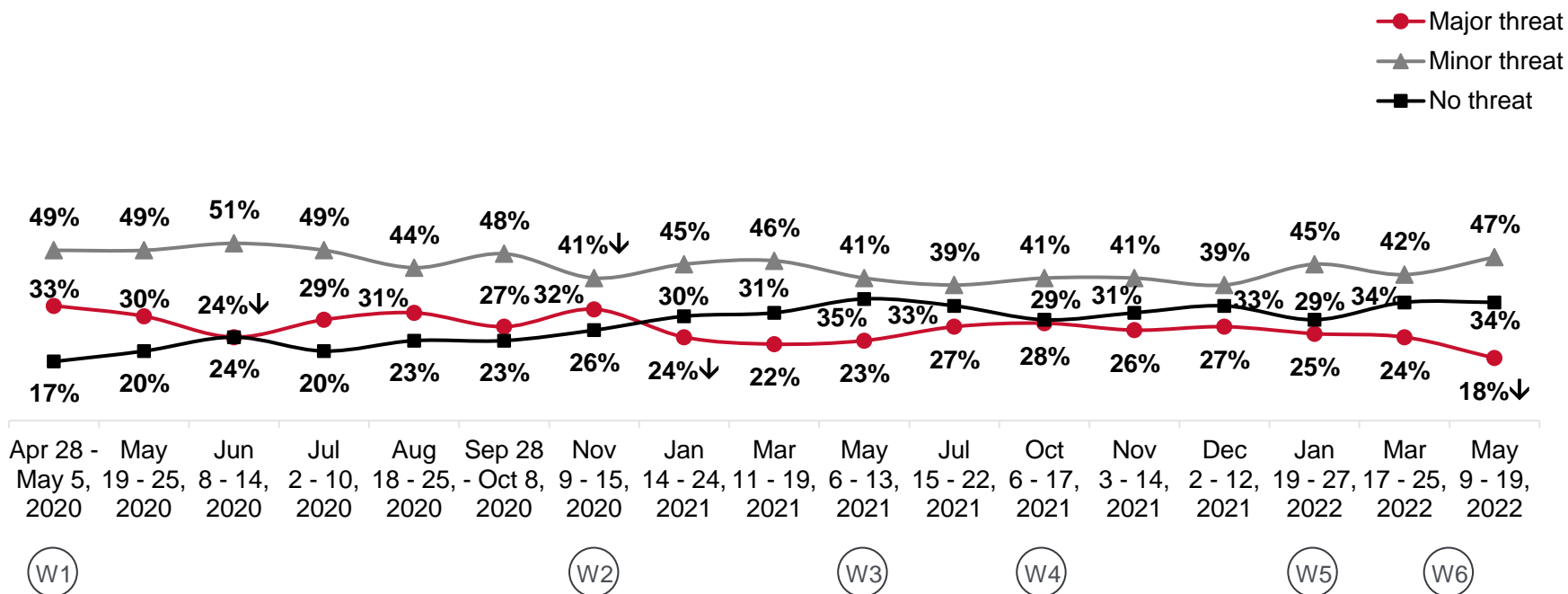

Perceived Threat Level of COVID-19 – cont'd

Nearly one-fifth (18%) of Calgarians view the pandemic as a major threat to their personal financial situation, down from one-quarter (24%) in March. Nearly one-half (47%) perceive it as a minor threat and one-third (34%) see no threat to their personal financial situation from the pandemic, on par with results in March. Those 35 years of age or older are more likely than those 18 to 34 to say the pandemic is no threat to their personal financial situation (36% 35 to 64 and 46% 65 or older vs. 24% 18 to 34).

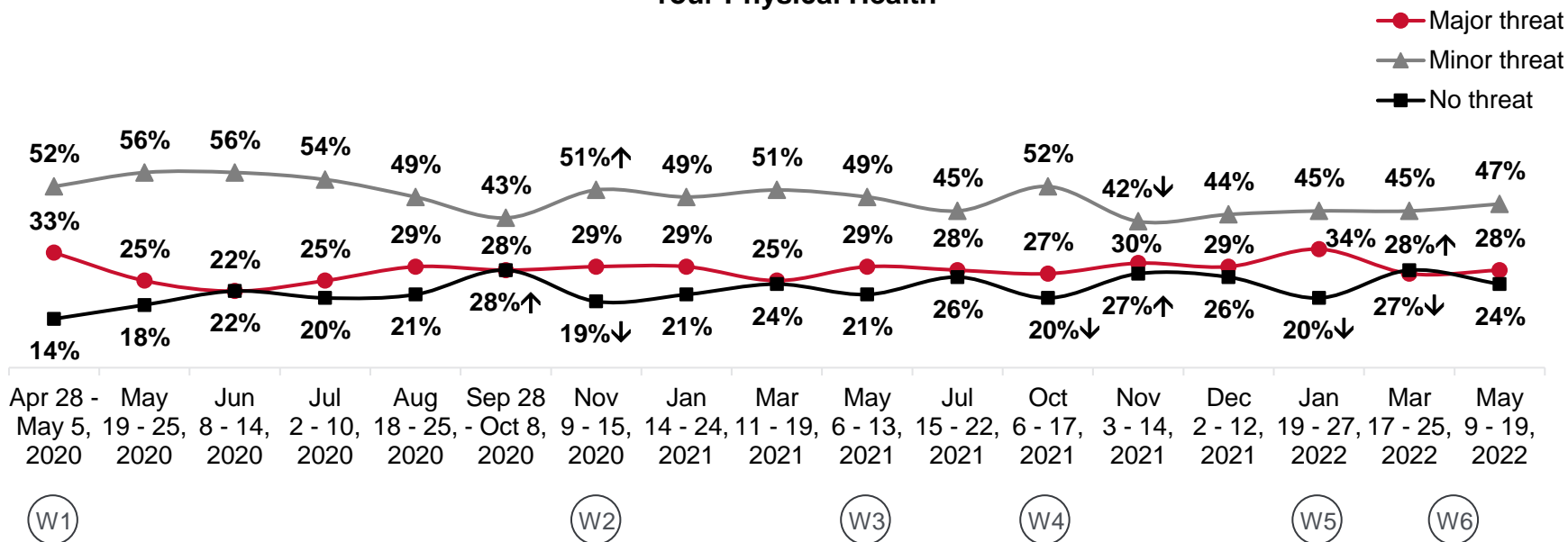

Perceived Threat Level of COVID-19 – cont'd

Nearly three-in-ten (28%) Calgarians say the pandemic is a major threat to their physical health while nearly one-half (47%) see it as a minor threat and one-quarter (24%) say it is no threat. Females are more likely than males to perceive the pandemic to be a major threat to their physical health (34% vs. 22%, respectively) while males are more likely than females to say it is no threat (28% vs. 20%, respectively).

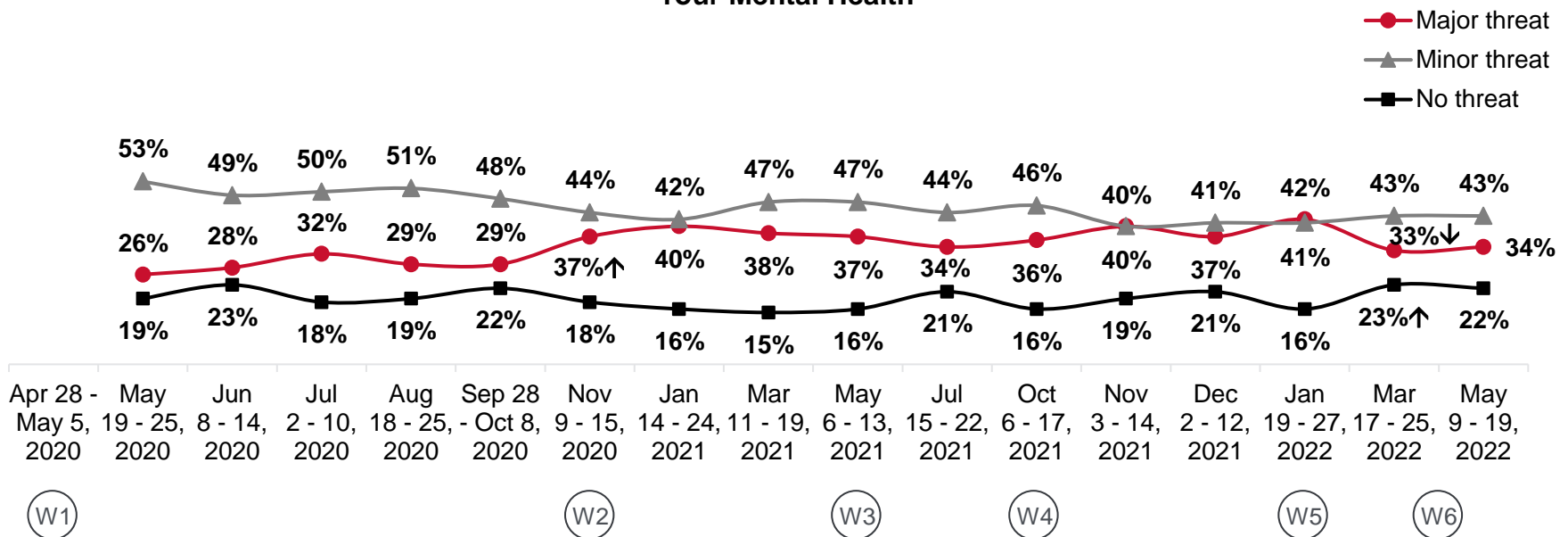

Perceived Threat Level of COVID-19 – cont'd

Perceptions of the threat level of the pandemic to one's mental health remains unchanged since March. One-third (34%) of Calgarians see the pandemic as a major threat, more than two-fifths (43%) say it is a minor threat and around one-fifth (22%) perceive no threat to their mental health. Those 18 to 34 years of age are more likely than older Calgarians to view the pandemic as a major threat to their mental health (43% vs. 32% 35 to 64 and 26% 65 or older). Seniors (65 or older) are more likely than those 18 to 64 to say the pandemic is no threat (34% vs. 16% 18 to 34 and 22% 35 to 64). Males are more likely than females to say the pandemic is no threat to their mental health (29% vs. 16%, respectively).

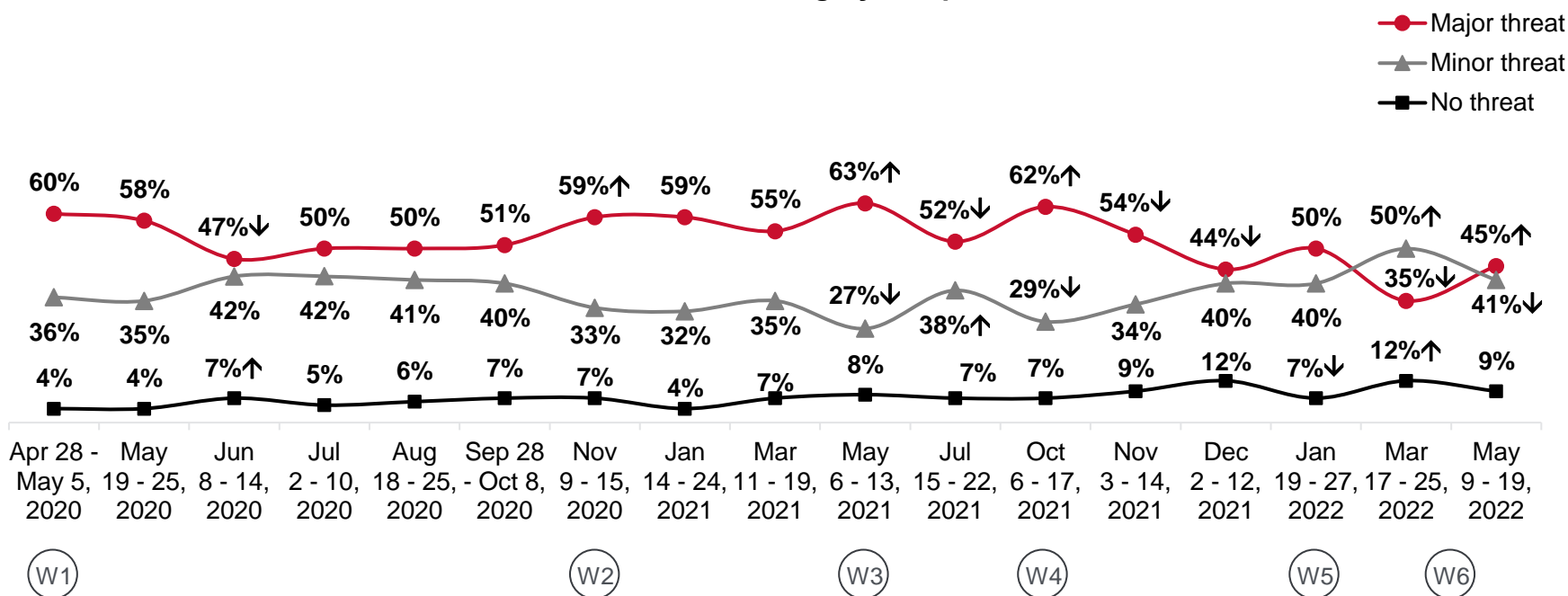

Perceived Threat Level of COVID-19 – cont'd

More than two-fifths (45%) of Calgarians say the pandemic is a major threat to the overall health of the city's population, up from 35% in March. Two-fifths (41%) view the pandemic as minor threat, down from a high of 50% in March. One-in-ten (9%) say the pandemic poses no threat to the overall health of Calgary's population, on par with results in March. Females are more likely than males to say the pandemic is a major threat (50% vs. 40%, respectively) while males are more likely than females to view it as a minor threat (46% vs. 35%, respectively).

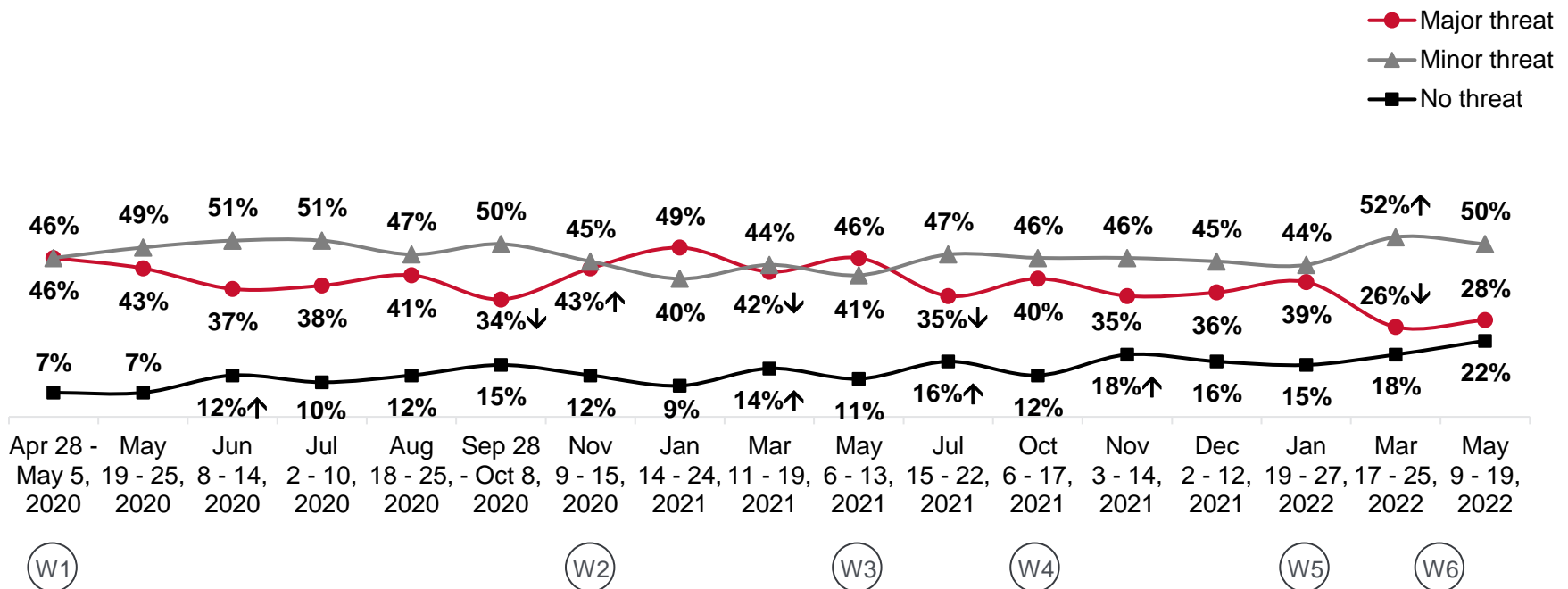

Perceived Threat Level of COVID-19 – cont'd

On par with results in March, nearly three-in-ten (28%) Calgarians see the pandemic as a major threat to day-to-day life in their community, one-half (50%) say it is a minor threat and around one-fifth (22%) perceive it to be no threat. Calgarians living with a senior (65 or older) are more likely than those not living with a senior to say it is a major threat to day-to-day life in their community (39% vs. 25%, respectively).

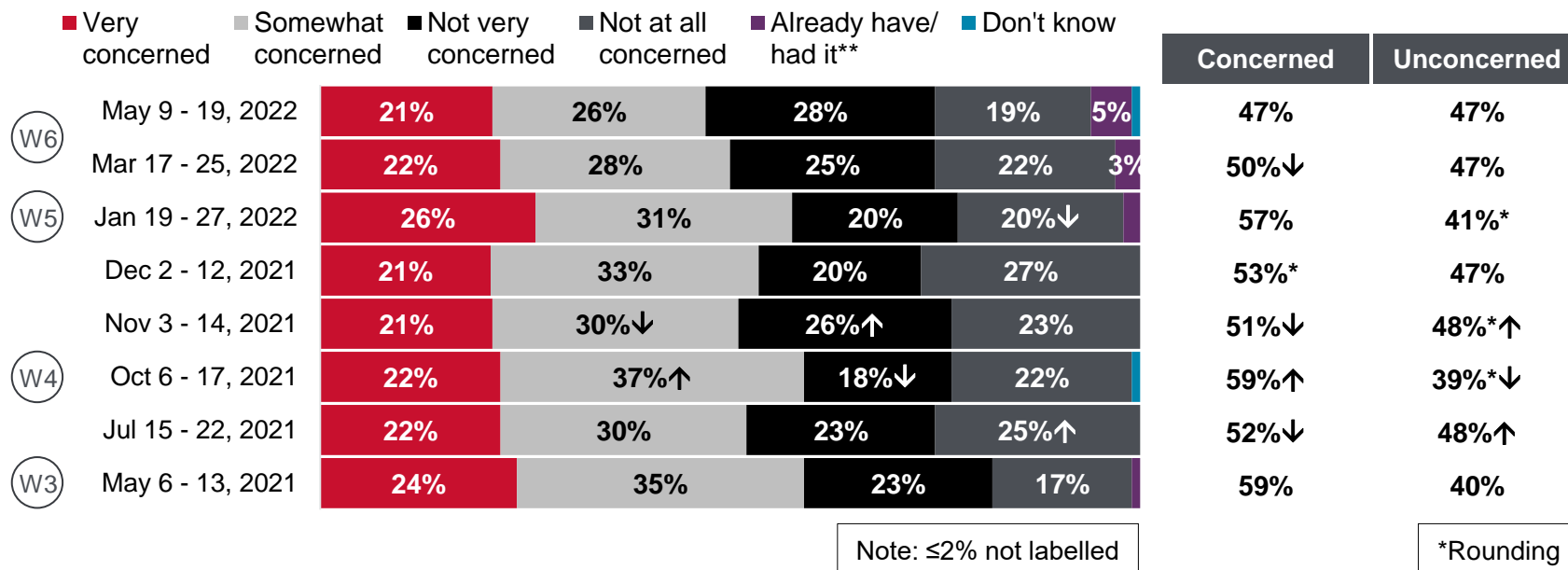

Concern about Self Becoming Ill

Nearly one-half (47%) of Calgarians are concerned about becoming ill from COVID-19, consistent with results in March. Females are more likely than males to be concerned with this (54% vs. 40%, respectively), as are seniors compared to younger Calgarians (56% 65 or older vs. 41% 18 to 34).

Concern about Oneself Becoming Ill from COVID-19



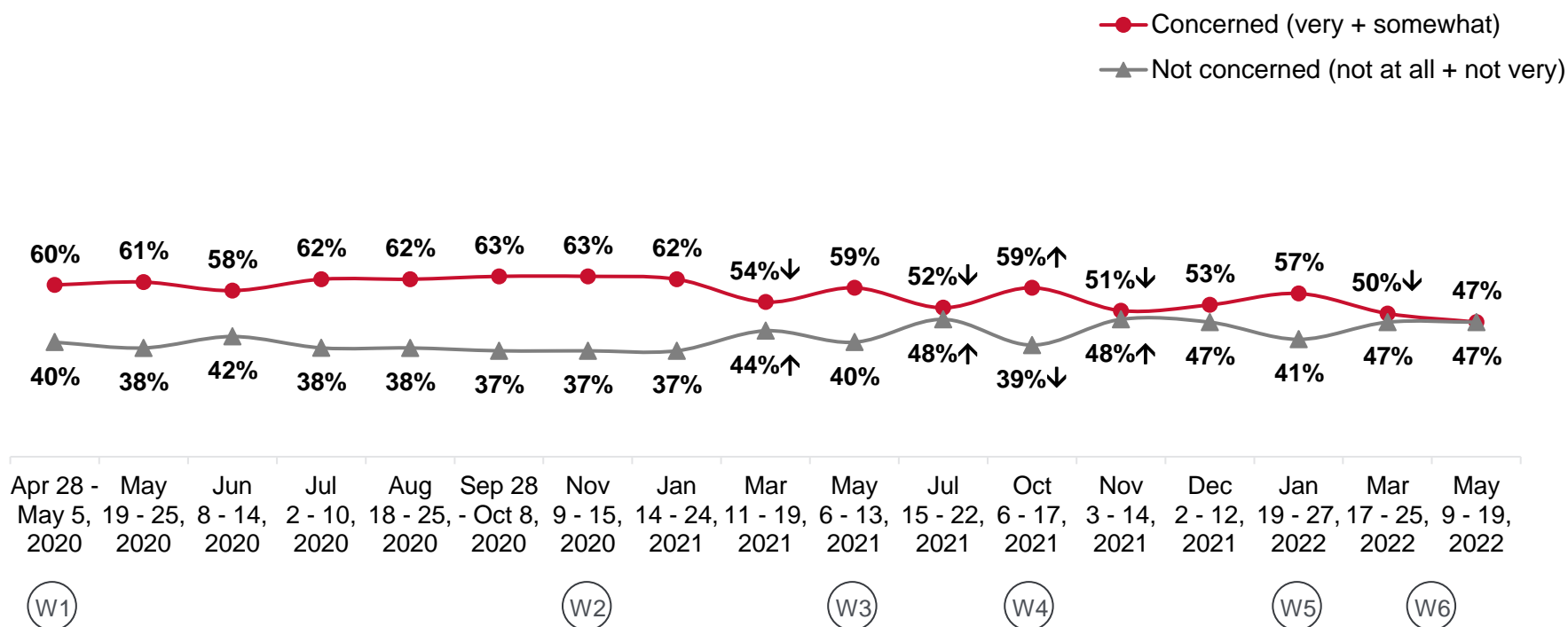

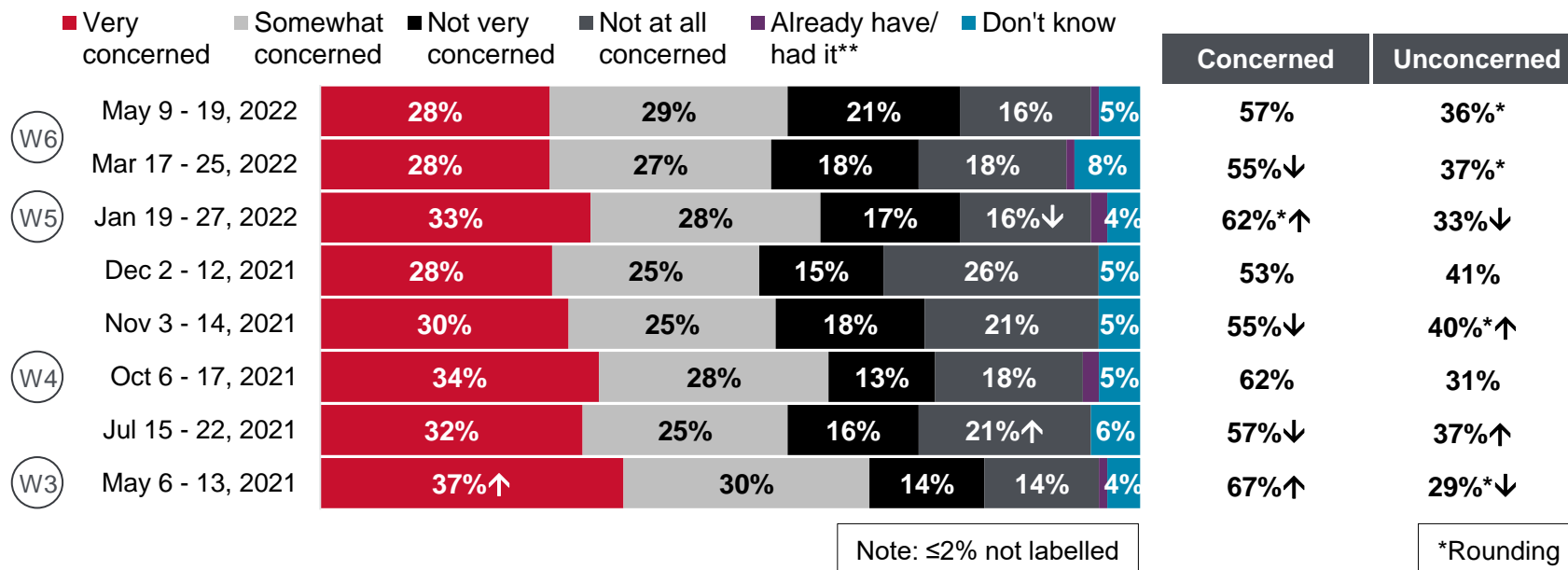

Concern about Household Member Becoming Ill

More than one-half (57%) of Calgarians are concerned about a household member becoming ill from COVID-19, consistent with results in March. Those living with a senior (65 or older) are more likely than others to be concerned about this (76% vs. 54%, respectively), as are those with children under the age of 18 in the household compared to those without (64% vs. 53%, respectively). Males are more likely than females to say they are not concerned about a household member becoming ill from COVID-19 (42% vs. 31%, respectively).

Concern about a Household Member Becoming Ill from COVID-19



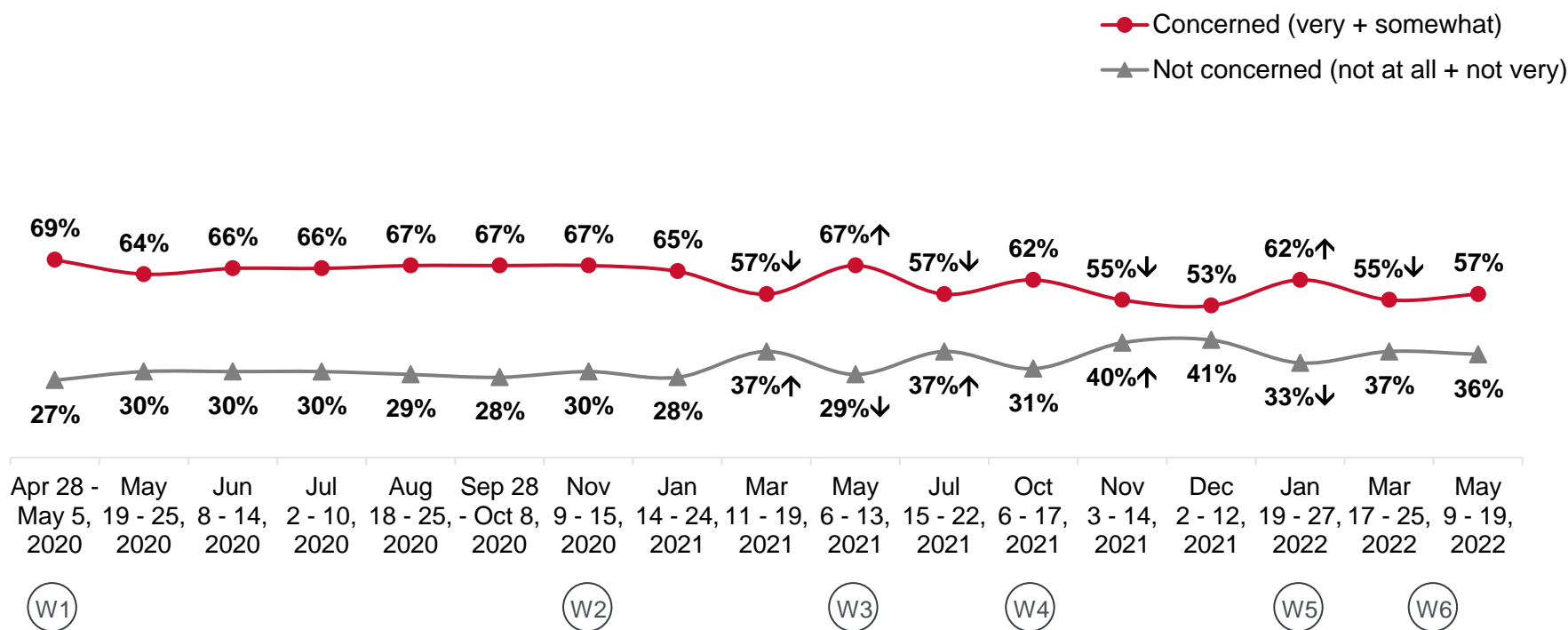

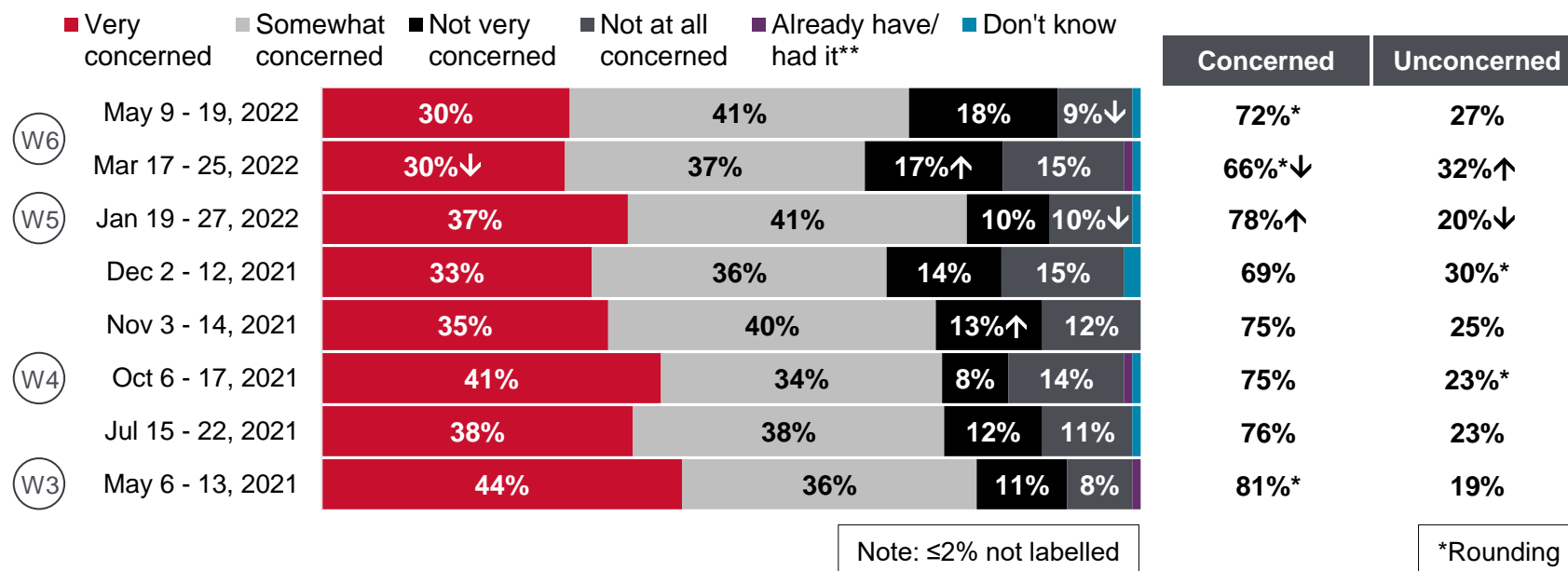

Around seven-in-ten (72%) Calgarians are concerned about family and/or friends outside of their household becoming ill from COVID-19, on par with results in March. Females are more likely than males to be concerned about this (78% vs. 65%, respectively).

Concern about Family/Friends (not in the household) Becoming Ill from COVID-19



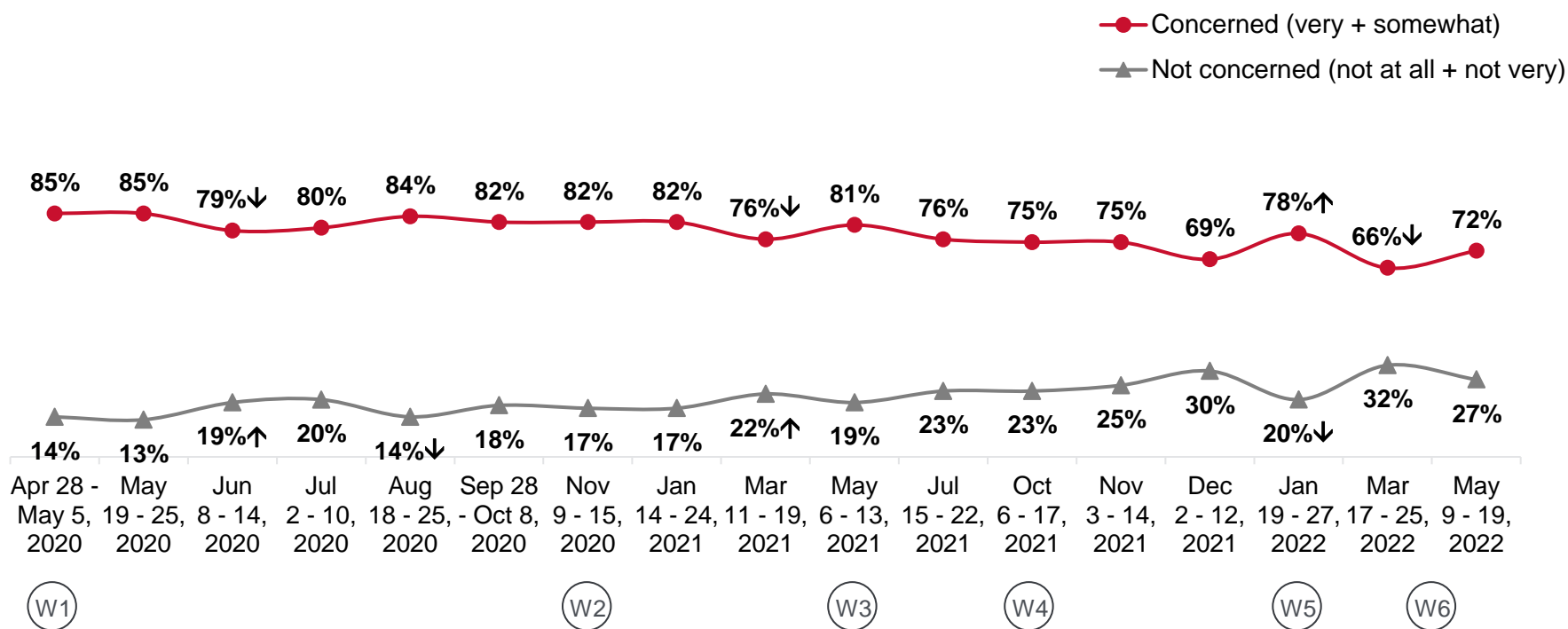

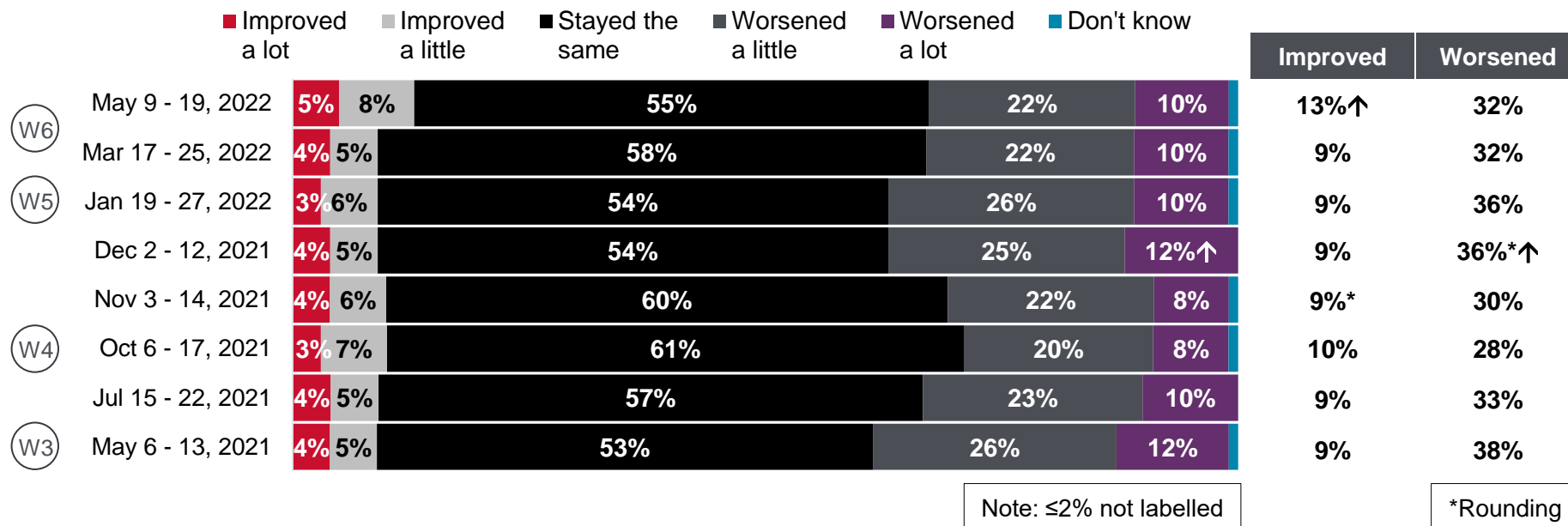


Impacts of the COVID-19 Pandemic

Changes in Physical Health

More than one-in-ten (13%) Calgarians say their physical health has improved as a result of the pandemic, up from 9% in March, while one-third (32%) say it has worsened. Males are more likely than females to say their physical health has improved (17% vs. 9%, respectively) while females are more likely than males to say it has worsened (37% vs. 26%, respectively). Those 18 to 64 years of age are more likely than older Calgarians to say their physical health has improved as a result of the pandemic (14% 18 to 34 and 14% 35 to 64 vs. 6% 65 or older).

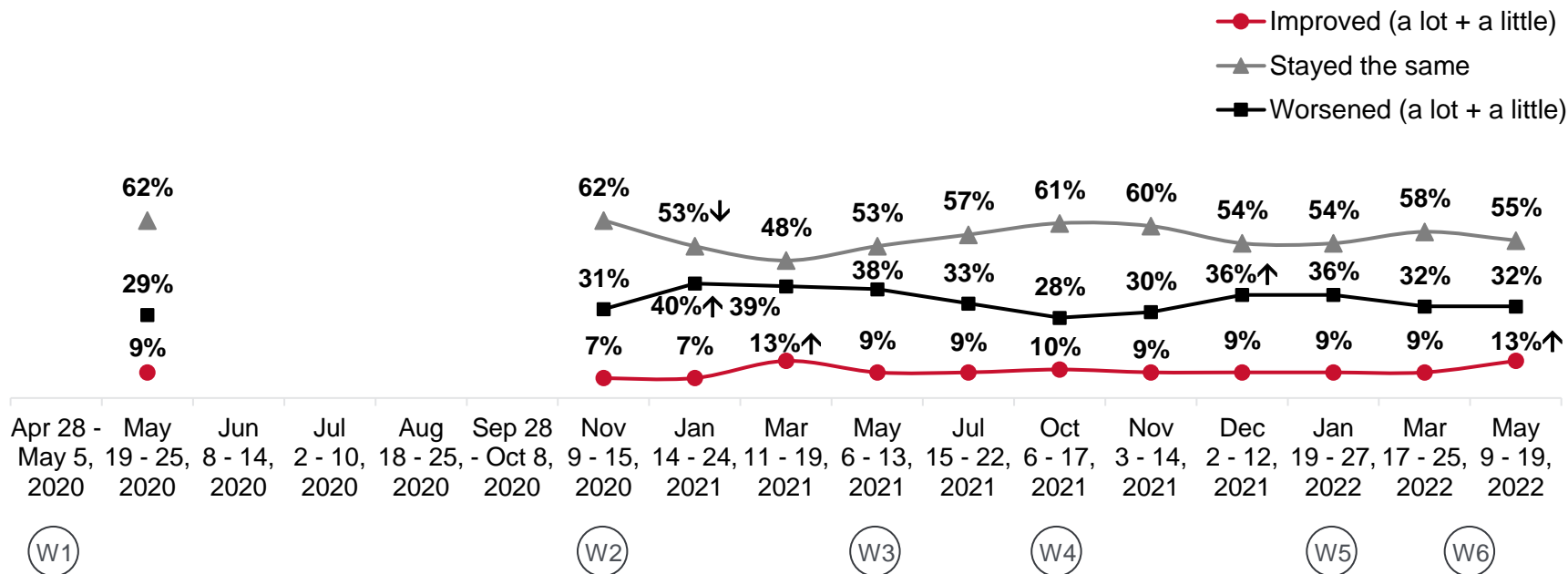
Change in Physical Health as a Result of the Pandemic

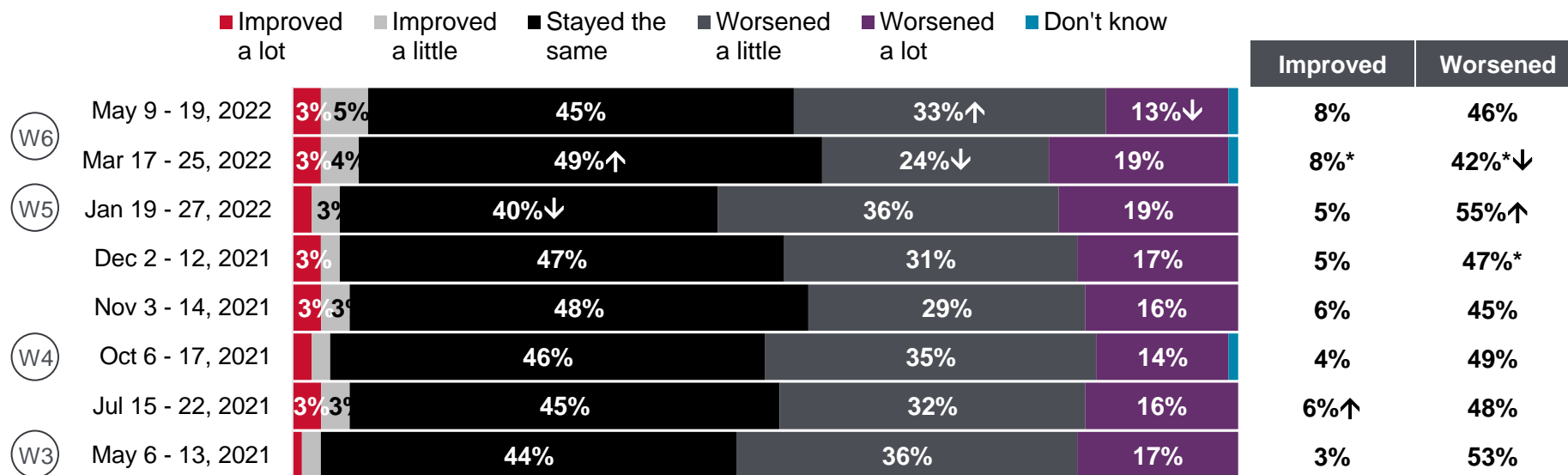

Changes in Mental Health

Nearly one-in-ten (8%) Calgarians say their mental health has improved because of the pandemic and nearly one-half (46%) say it has worsened, on par with results in March. Females are more likely than males to say their mental health has worsened as a result of the pandemic (53% vs. 38%, respectively), as are those 18 to 34 years of age compared to older Calgarians (58% vs. 41% 35 to 64 and 41% 65 or older). Residents of the NE are more likely than other Calgarians to say their mental health has improved (17% vs. 5% SW, 7% SE and 7% NW).

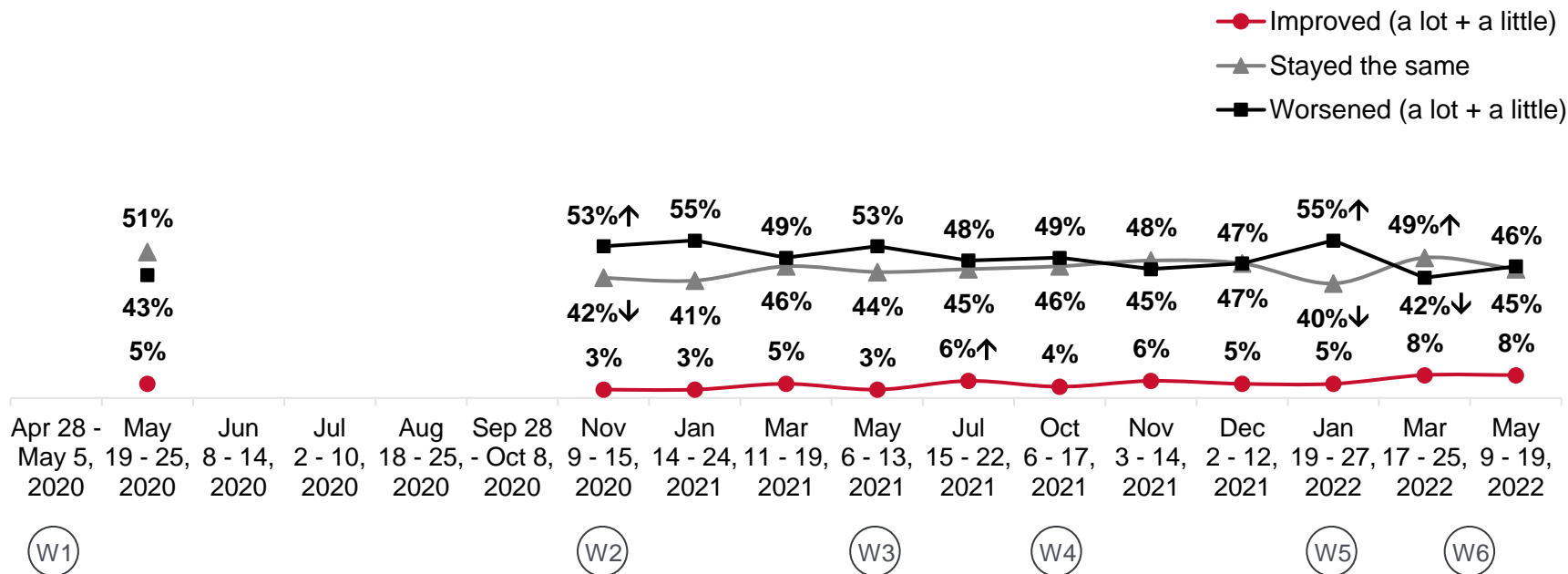

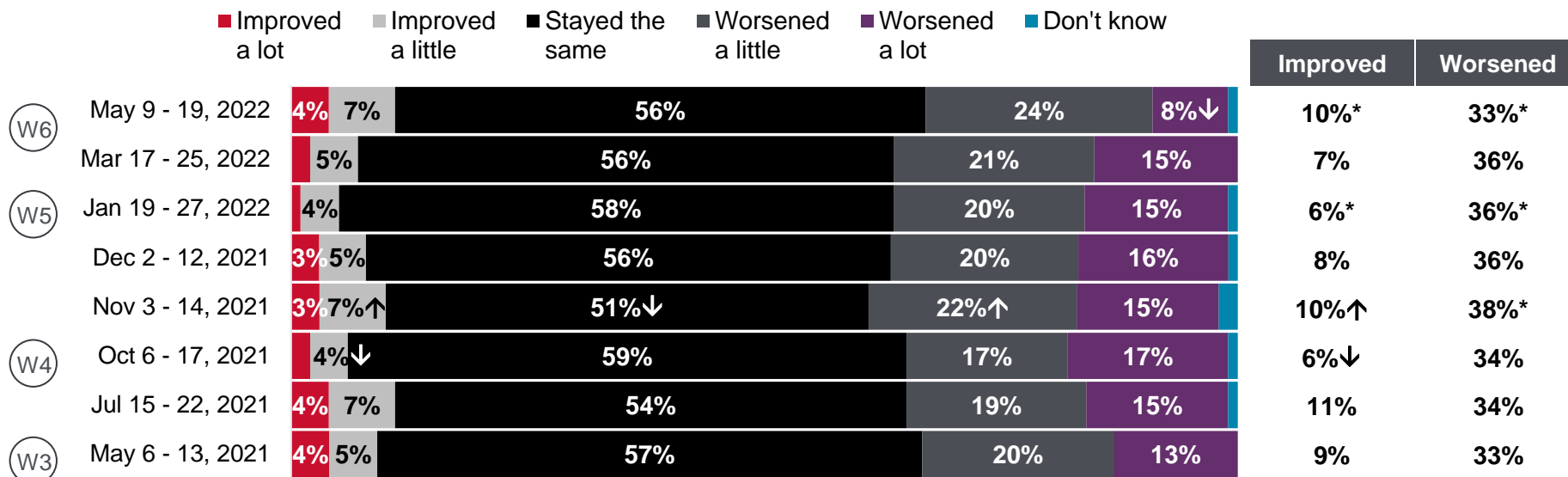

Changes in Personal Financial Situation

On par with results in March, one-in-ten (10%) Calgarians say their personal financial situation has improved as a result of the pandemic while one-third (33%) say it has worsened. Males are more likely than females to say their personal situation has worsened (37% vs. 28%, respectively). Those 18 to 64 years of age are more likely than seniors to say their personal financial situation has improved as a result of the pandemic (12% 18 to 34 and 12% 35 to 64 vs. 4% 65 or older). Calgarians with children under the age of 18 in the household are more likely than others to say their financial situation has improved (17% vs. 6%, respectively), as are those not living with a senior (65 or older) compared to those who are (12% vs. 3%, respectively). Calgarians with a lower household income are more likely than those with a higher income to say their financial situation has worsened as a result of the pandemic (50% <\$45,000 vs. 23% \$105,000 to <\$135,000 and 27% \$135,000 or more).

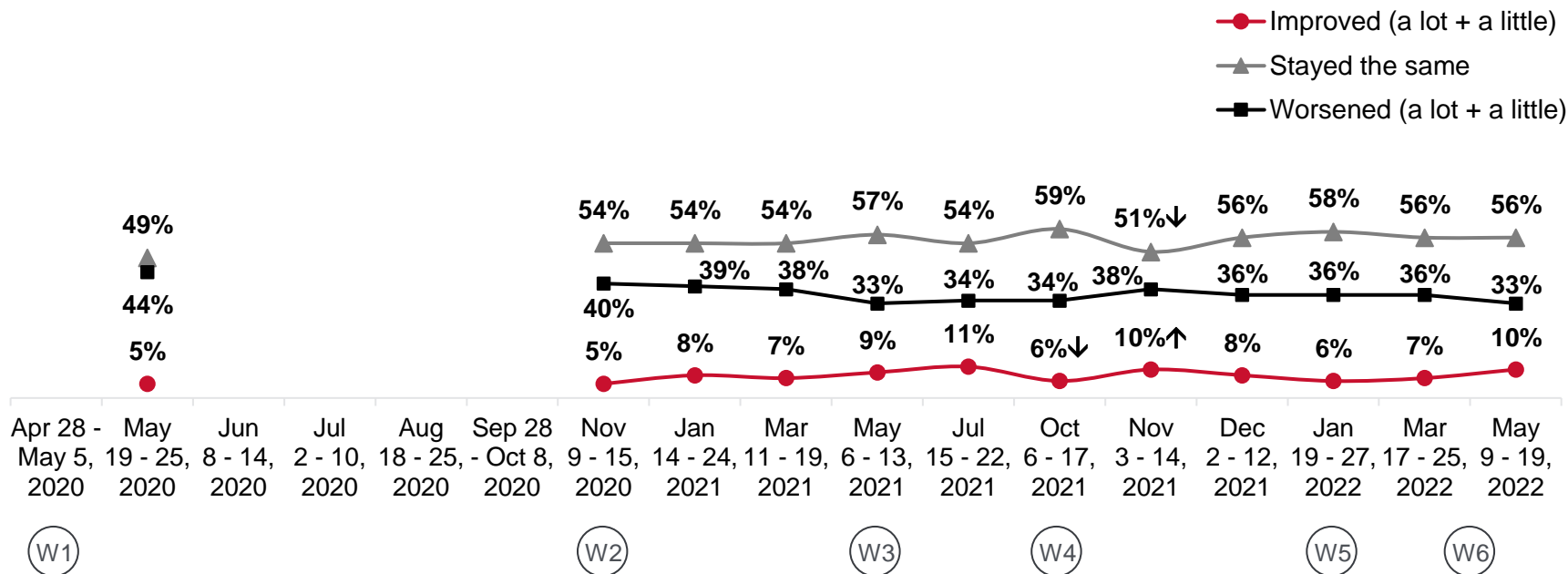

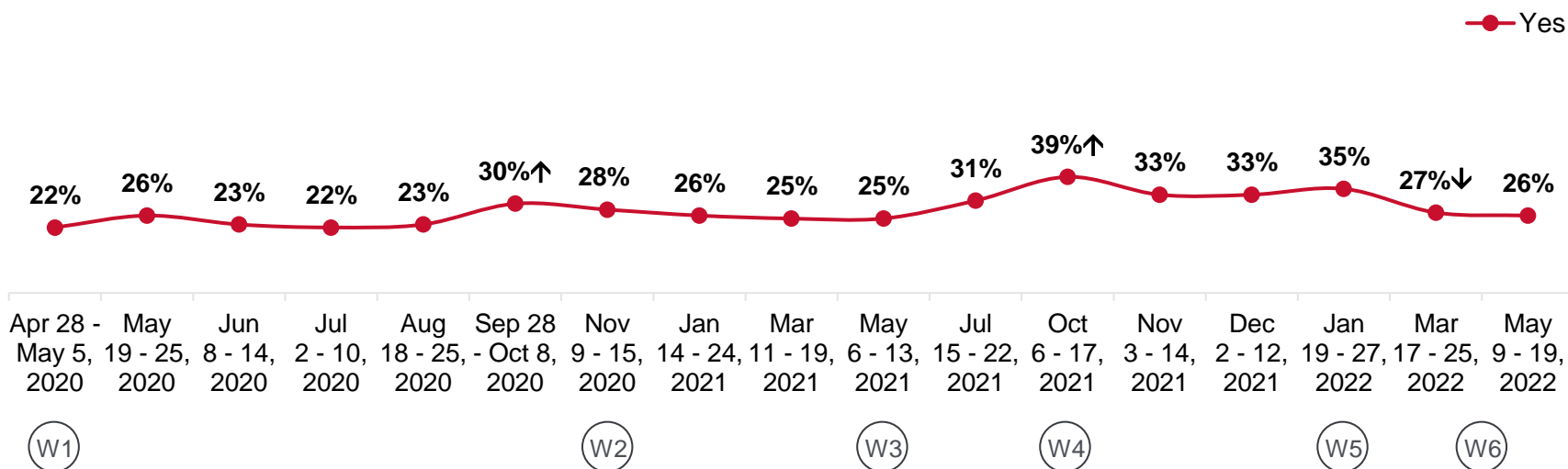

Financial Impacts of the Pandemic

One-quarter (26%) of Calgarians say the pandemic is currently having a negative impact on their capacity to pay bills on time, consistent with results in March. Younger Calgarians are more likely than seniors to say they are experiencing this (35% 18 to 34 vs. 24% 35 to 64 vs. 15% 65 or older). Those with children under the age of 18 in the household are more likely than those without to say the pandemic is having a negative impact on their capacity to pay bills on time (33% vs. 21%, respectively), as are those with a lower household income compared to other Calgarians (52% <\$45,000 vs. 32% \$45,000 to <\$75,000 and 34% \$75,000 to <\$105,000 vs. 10% \$105,000 to <\$135,000 and 14% \$135,000 or more).

Negative Impact on Capacity to Pay Bills on Time



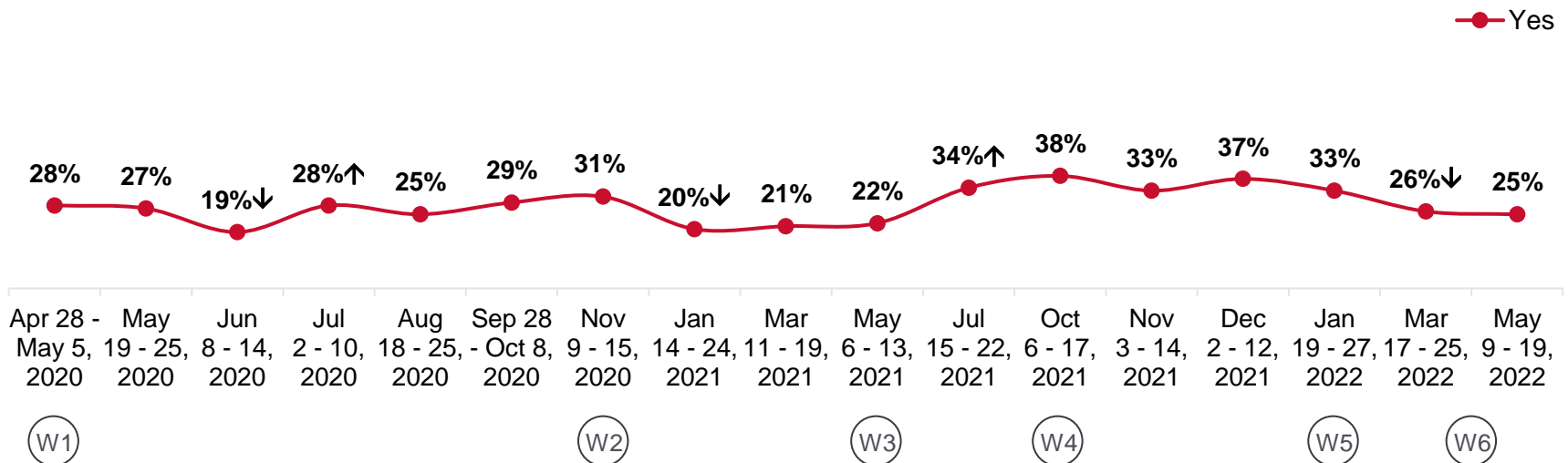
At the moment, has the COVID-19 pandemic had a negative impact on you financially when it comes:

Financial Impacts of the Pandemic – cont'd

Consistent with results in March, one-quarter (25%) of Calgarians are experiencing a negative impact of the pandemic on their capacity to pay their mortgage or rent. Those 18 to 34 years of age are more likely than seniors (65 or older) to be experiencing this (33% vs. 15%, respectively). Negative Impact on Capacity to Pay Mortgage/Rent



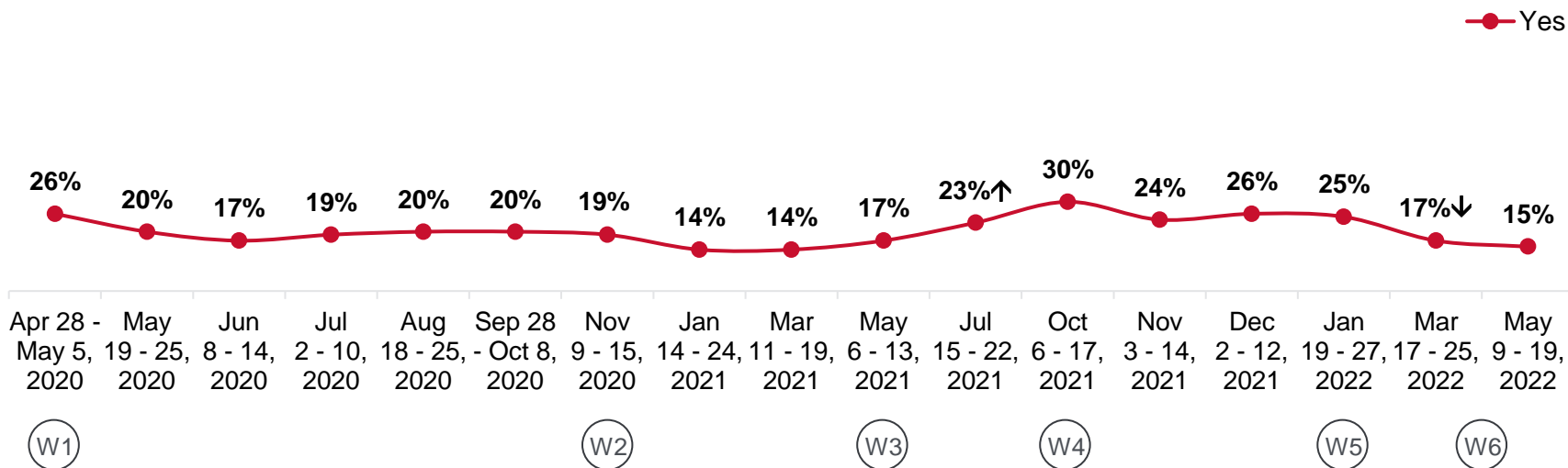

Financial Impacts of the Pandemic – cont'd

More than one-in-ten (15%) Calgarians say the pandemic is having a negative impact on their capacity to pay property taxes, on par with results in March. Those with children under the age of 18 in the household are more likely than those without to be experiencing this (20% vs. 11%, respectively). Calgarians with a lower household income are more likely than those with a higher income to say the pandemic is having a negative impact on their capacity to pay mortgage or rent (32% <\$45,000, 26% \$45,000 to <\$75,000 and 21% \$75,000 to <\$105,000 vs. 2% \$105,000 to <\$135,000 and 6% \$135,000 or more).

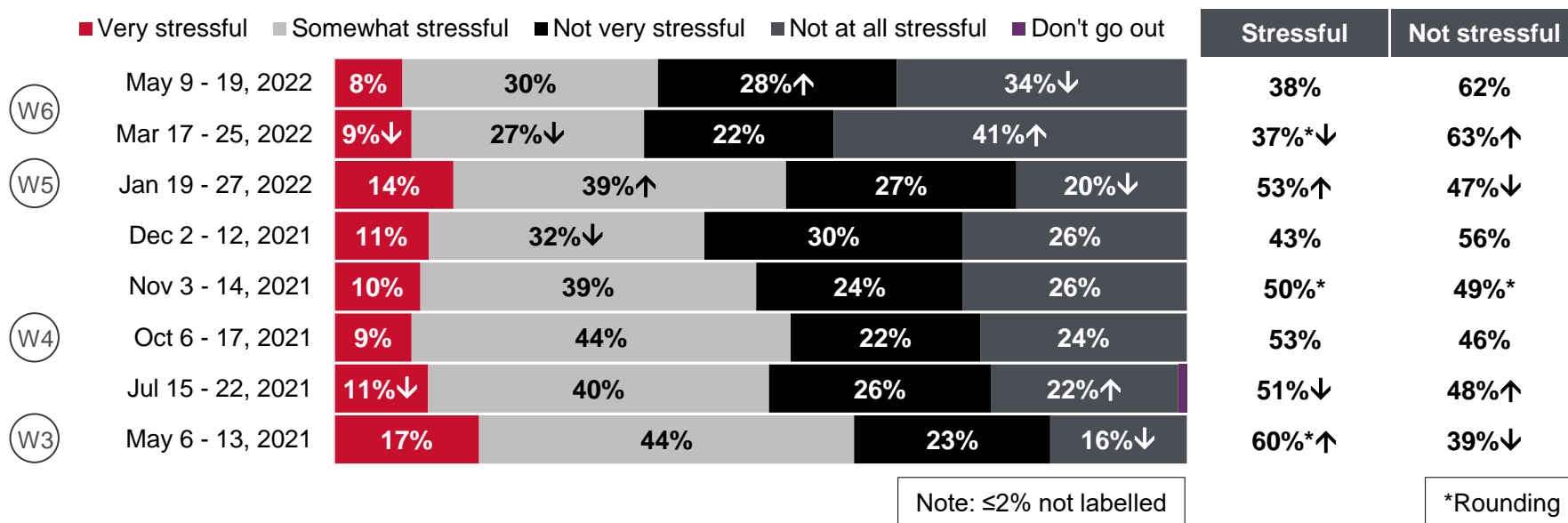

Stress Level When in Public During Pandemic

Consistent with results in March, nearly two-fifths (38%) of Calgarians find it stressful to be in public since the lifting of most of Alberta's pandemic restrictions on March 1, 2022. Females are much more likely than males to say they find it stressful (49% vs. 26%, respectively), mostly due to a difference in ratings of 'somewhat' (40% vs. 20%) rather than 'very' stressful. NW residents are more likely than residents of the SE and NE to say they find it stressful to be in public (47% vs. 34% and 28%, respectively). Those without children under the age of 18 in the household are more likely than those with children in the household to find it stressful to be in public (44% vs. 28%, respectively).

Stress Level When in Public



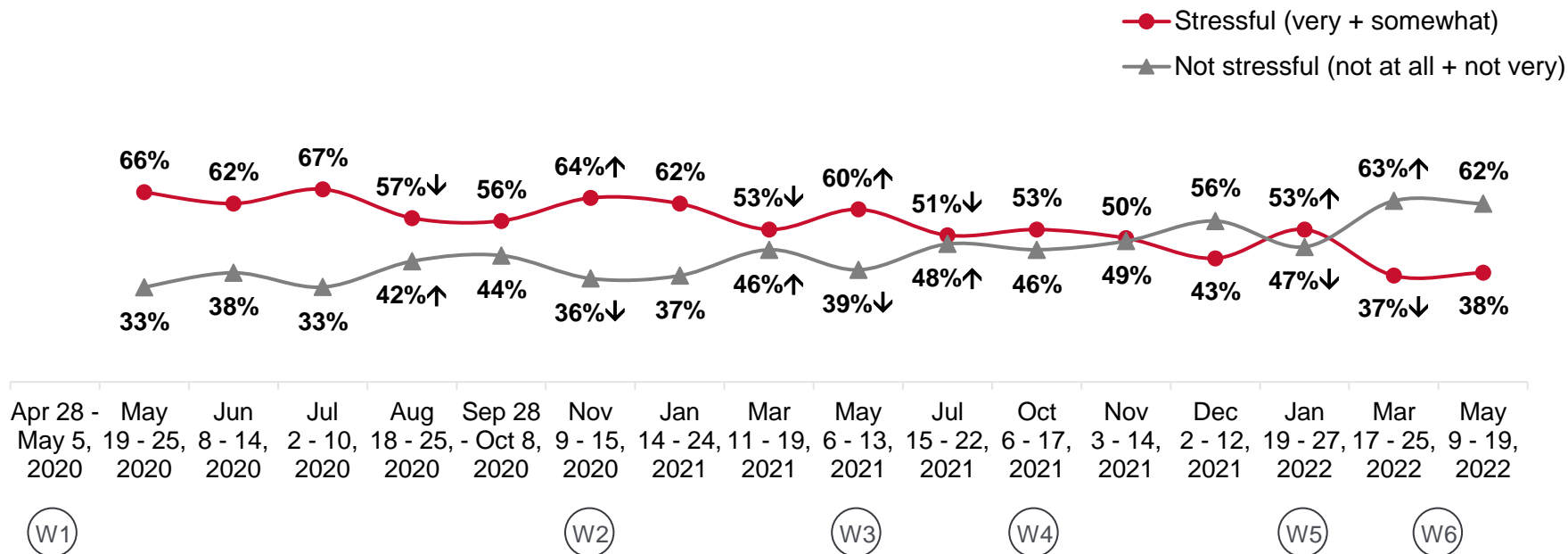

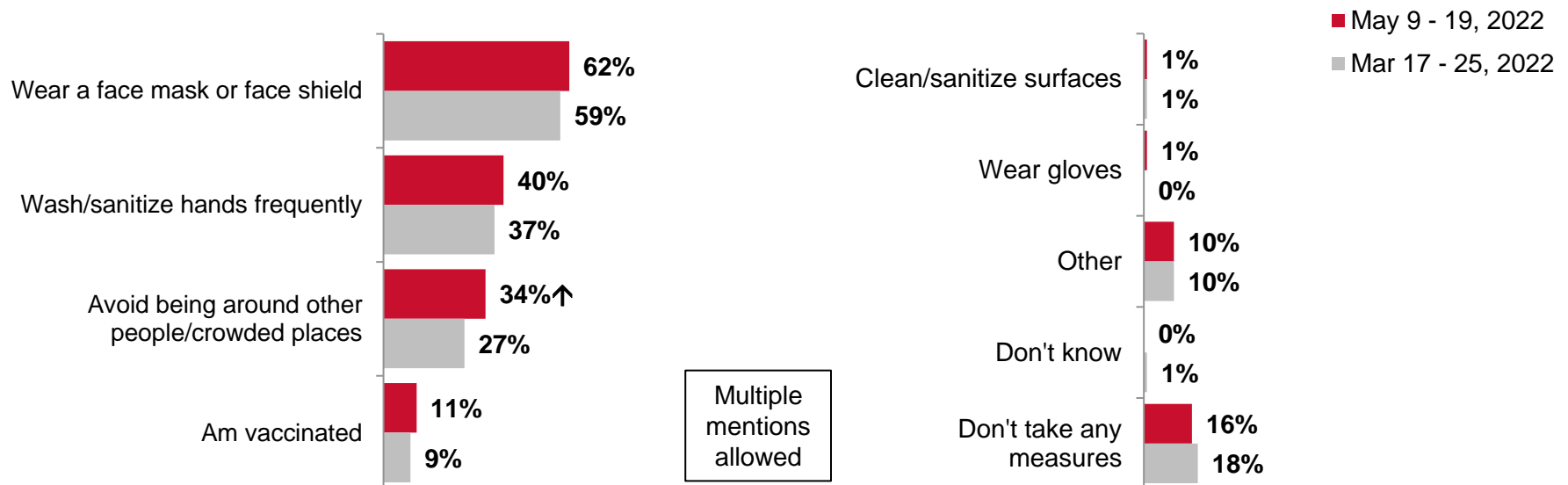


Moving Forward

Measures Used to Protect Against COVID-19

Around three-fifths (62%) of Calgarians say they wear a face mask or shield to protect against COVID-19 and two-fifths (40%) wash and/or sanitize their hands frequently. One-third (34%) avoid being around other people and/or in crowded places, up from 27% in March. Females are more likely than males to wear a face mask/shield (71% vs. 54%, respectively), wash/sanitize their hands frequently (47% vs. 34%), and to avoid being around other people/crowded places (40% vs. 28%). Males are more likely than females to say they don't take any measures to protect against COVID-19 (23% vs. 9%, respectively). Younger Calgarians are more likely than seniors to say they wash/sanitize their hands frequently to protect against COVID-19 (44% 18 to 34 and 43% 35 to 64 vs. 23% 65 or older). NW residents are more likely than residents of the SW and SE to wear a face mask/shield (72% vs. 60% and 52%, respectively). Those with children under the age of 18 in the household are more likely than those without to wash/sanitize their hands frequently (47% vs. 36%, respectively) but less likely to avoid being around other people/crowded places (29% vs. 38%).

Since March 1st, what, if any, measures do you personally use to protect against COVID-19? Please do not include measures you are required to take as part of your job or volunteer work.

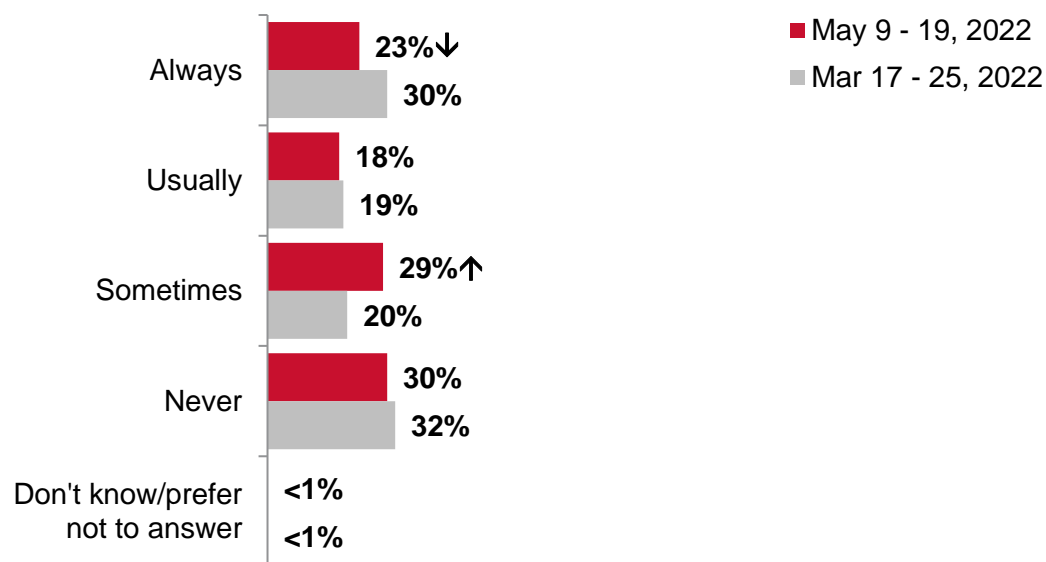

Frequency of Voluntarily Wearing a Face Mask

Around one-quarter (23%) of Calgarians say they always wear a face mask in public where it is not required, down from 30% in March. Three-in-ten (29%) say they sometimes wear a mask where it is not required, up from 20% in March. Calgarians 35 years of age or older are more likely than those 18 to 34 to say they always wear a face mask (26% 35 to 64 and 28% 65 or older vs. 13% 18 to 34). Calgarians with a lower household income are more likely than those with a higher income to say they always wear a face mask where it is not required (33% <\$45,000, 22% \$45,000 to <\$75,000 and 29% \$75,000 to <\$105,000 vs. 6% \$105,000 to <\$135,000). Males are more likely than females to say they never wear a face mask (35% vs. 24%, respectively), as are those 18 to 34 years of age compared to seniors (35% vs. 22% 65 or older). Those who do not live with a senior are more likely than those who do to never wear a face mask where it is not required (32% vs. 17%, respectively).

Frequency of Wearing a Face Covering in Public Where Not Required



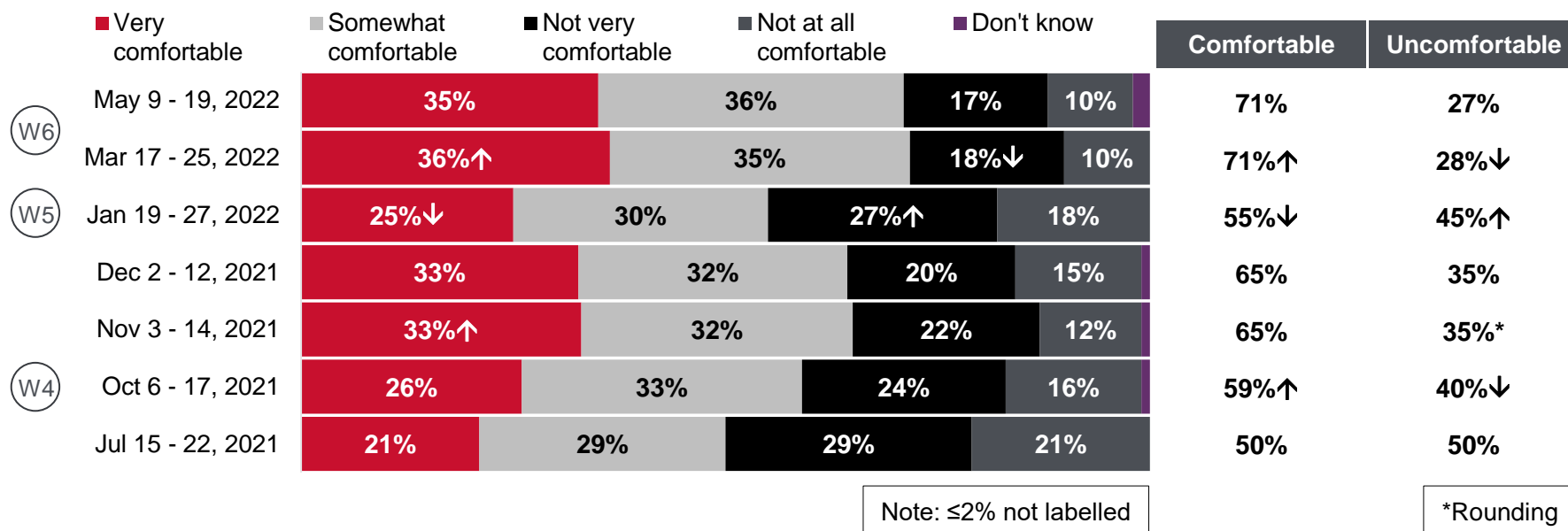
Since March 1st, how often do you wear a face mask in public, not including where it's still required on public transit and in health care settings? Would you say ...?

Comfort Attending Outdoor Events

Seven-in-ten (71%) Calgarians are or would be comfortable attending an outdoor event with a large crowd in the next couple of months, on par with results in March. Younger Calgarians are more likely than seniors to be comfortable with this (81% 18 to 34 vs. 71% 35 to 64 vs. 56% 65 or older). Calgarians with a higher household income are more likely than those with a lower income to be comfortable with this (76% \$75,000 to <\$105,000, 74% \$105,000 to <\$135,000 and 80% \$135,000 or more vs. 54% <\$45,000).

Comfort with Attending an Outdoor Event with a Large Crowd in the Next Couple of Months



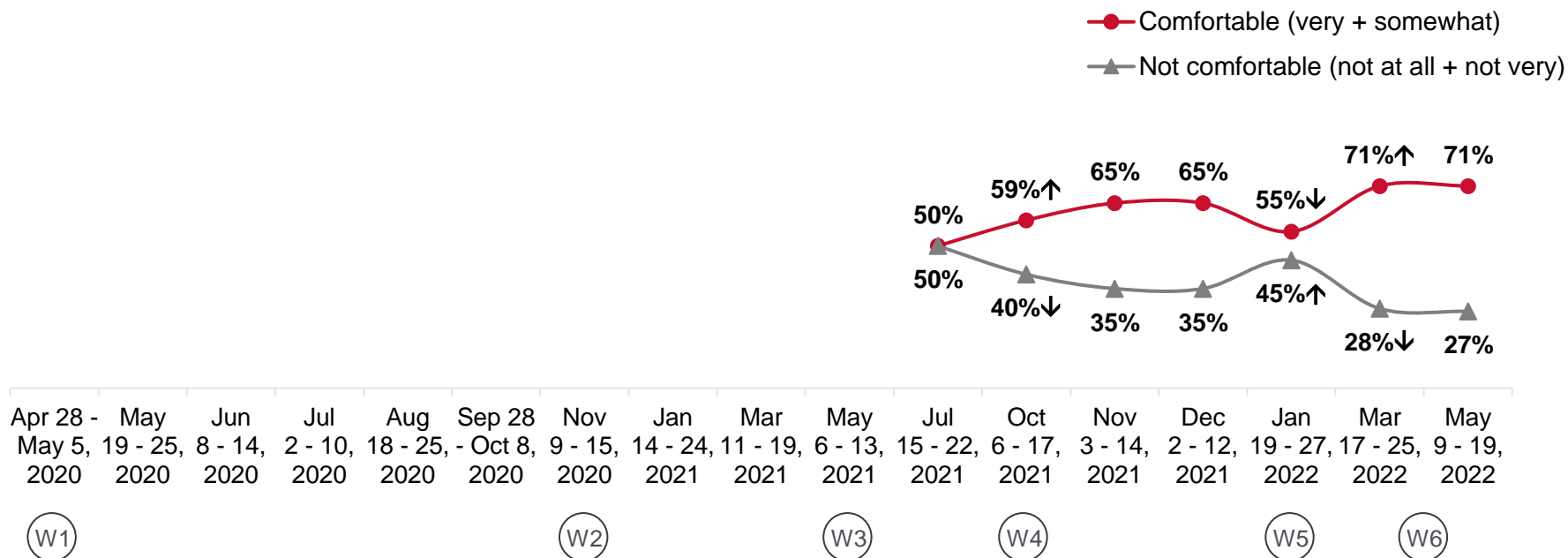

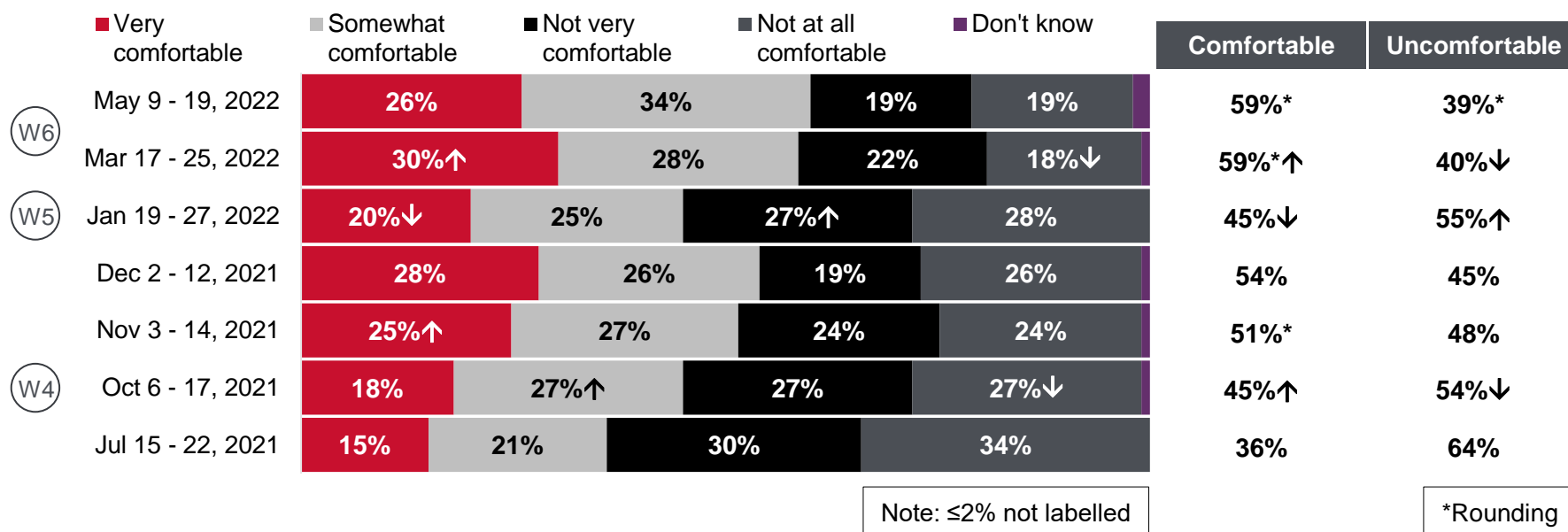

Comfort Attending Indoor Events

Three-fifths (59%) of Calgarians are or would be comfortable attending an indoor event with a large crowd in the next couple of months, consistent with results in March. Males are more likely than females to be comfortable with this (64% vs. 55%, respectively), due to a difference in ratings of 'very' (31% vs. 20%) rather than 'somewhat' comfortable. Those 18 to 34 years of age are more likely than older Calgarians to be comfortable attending an indoor event with a large crowd (69% vs. 57% 35 to 64 and 48% 65 or older).

Beginning Oct 6, 2021: Over the next couple of months, how comfortable are you or would you be attending an inside event that has a large crowd in attendance?

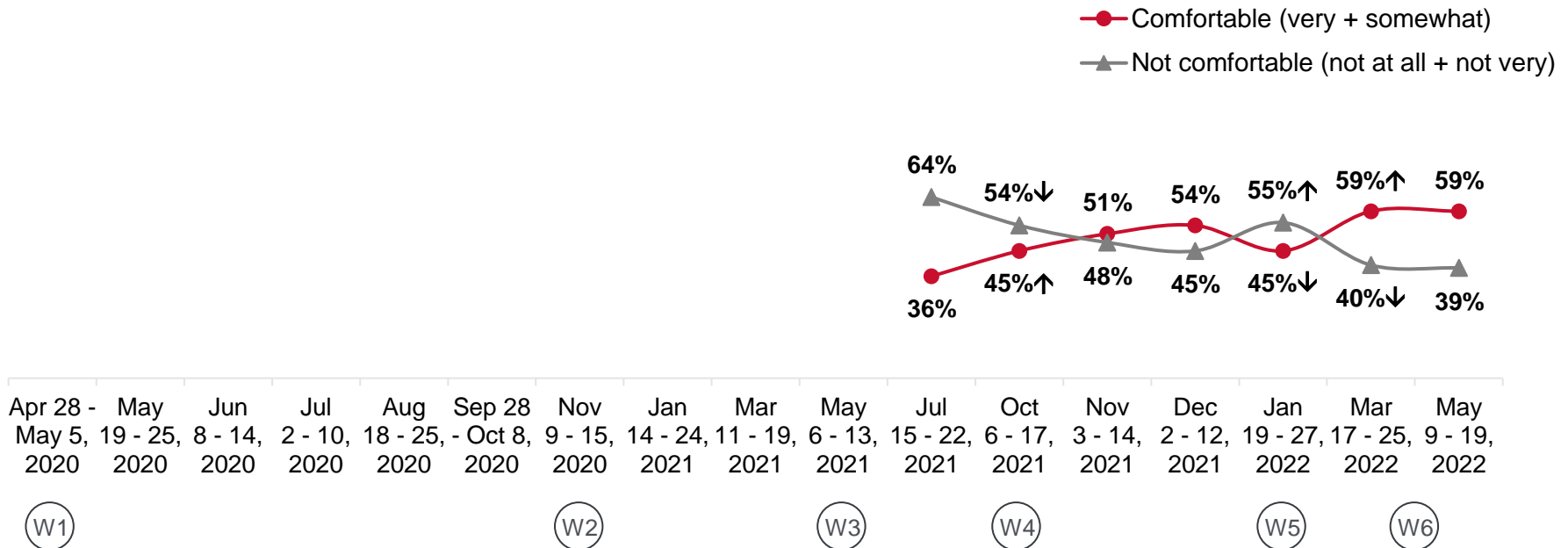

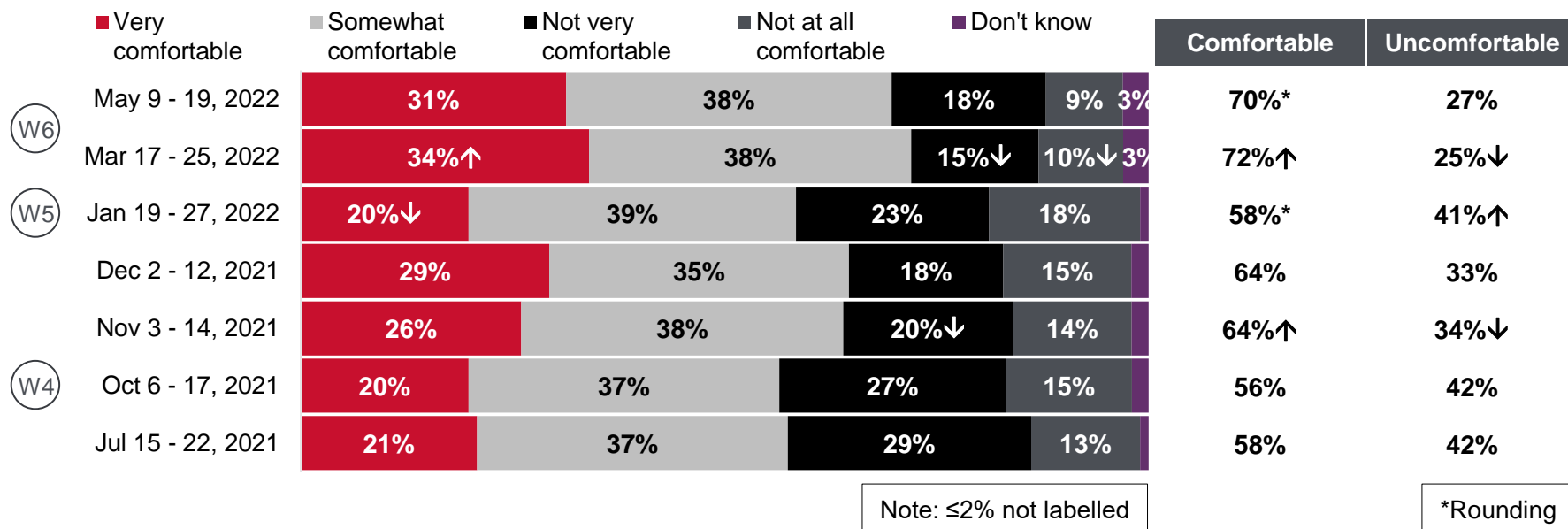

Comfort Attending an Indoor Event such as City In-Person Public Engagement or a Research Focus Group in the Next Three Months

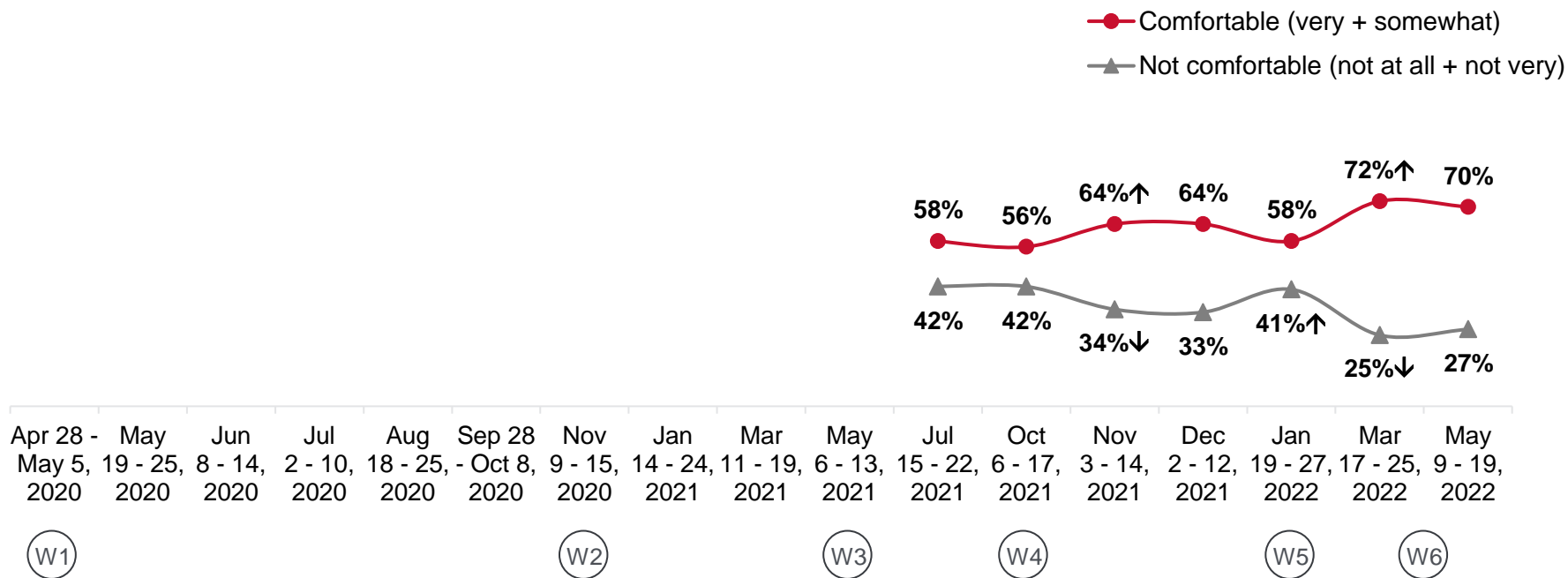


In the next three months, how comfortable are you or would you be attending an inside event like an in-person public engagement event or research focus group about a City project or City issue?

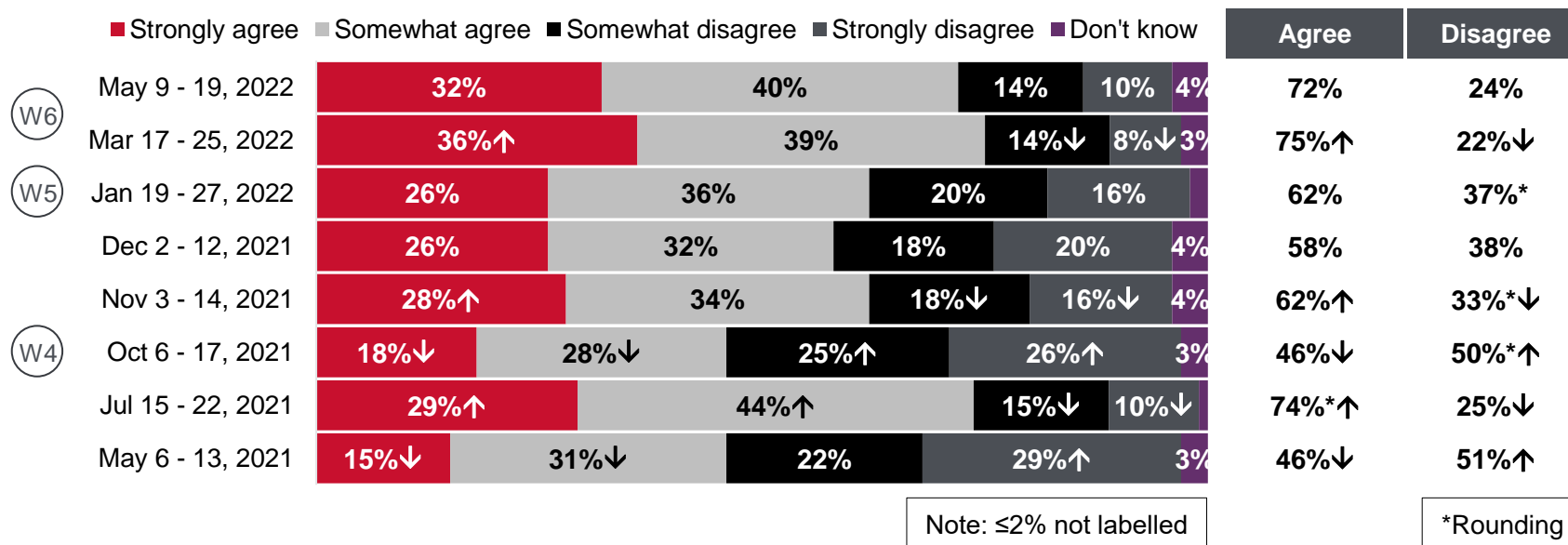

The Worst of the COVID-19 Pandemic is Behind Us

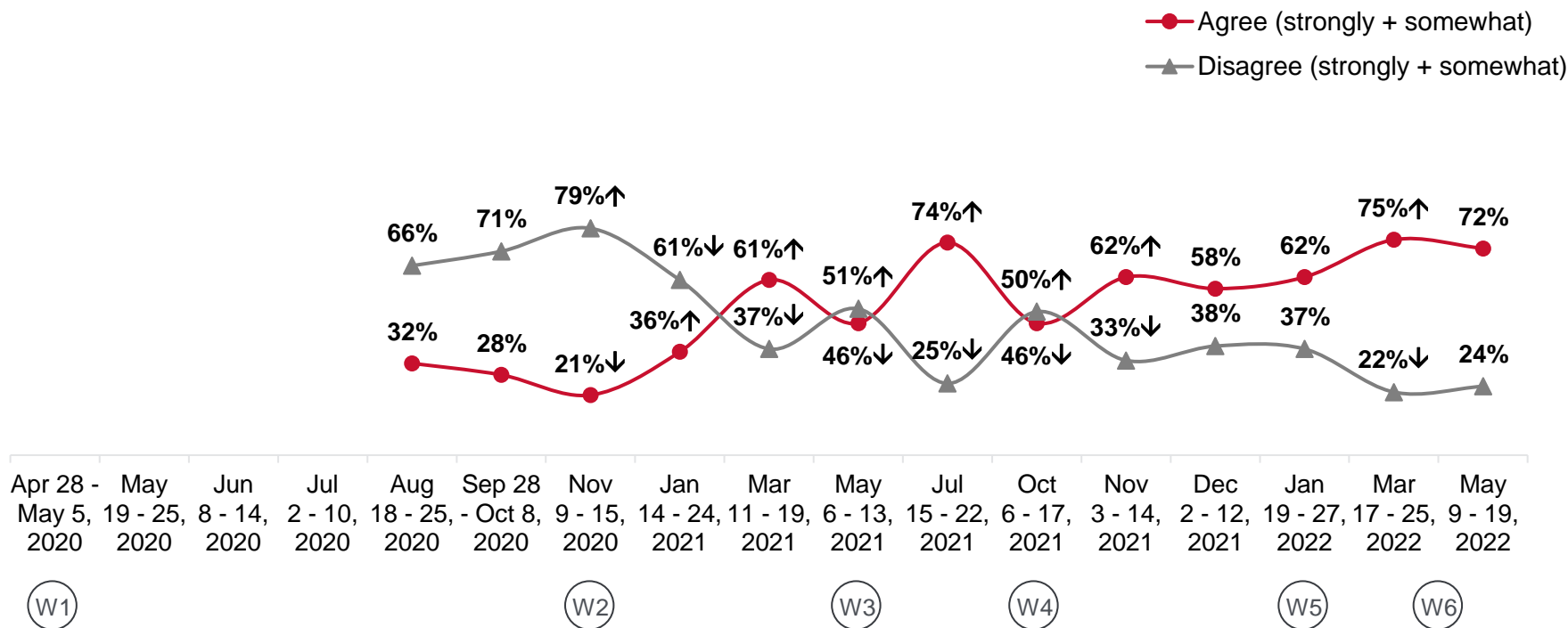

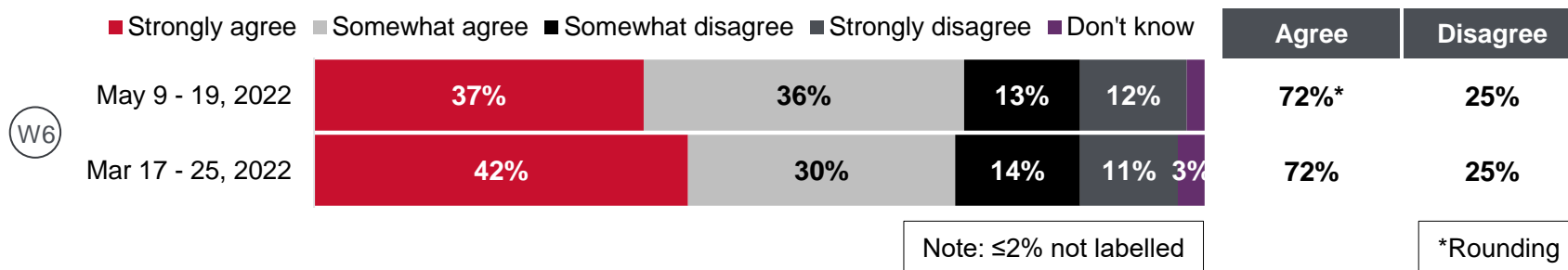

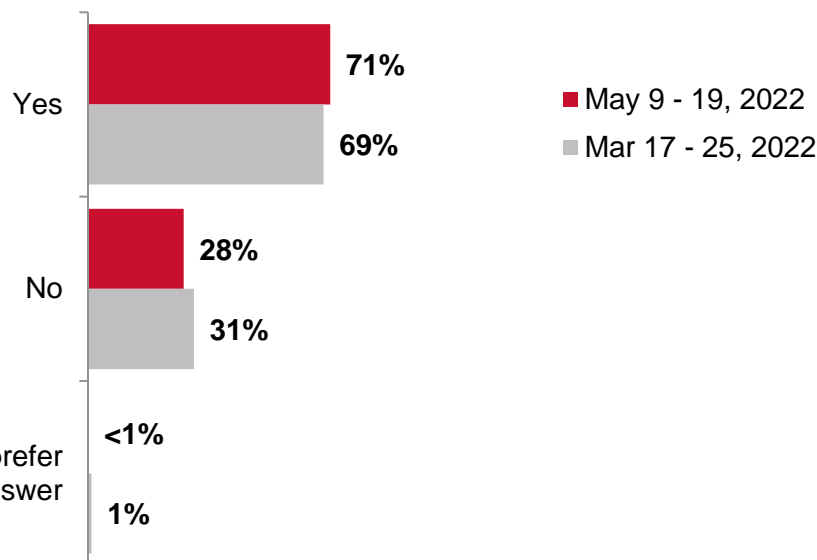

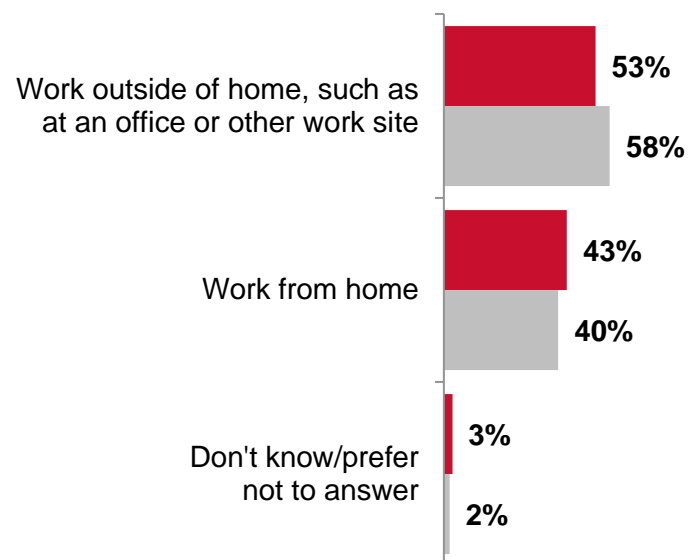
Work from Home vs. Work Site in February 2022

Work from Home vs. Work Site in February 2022



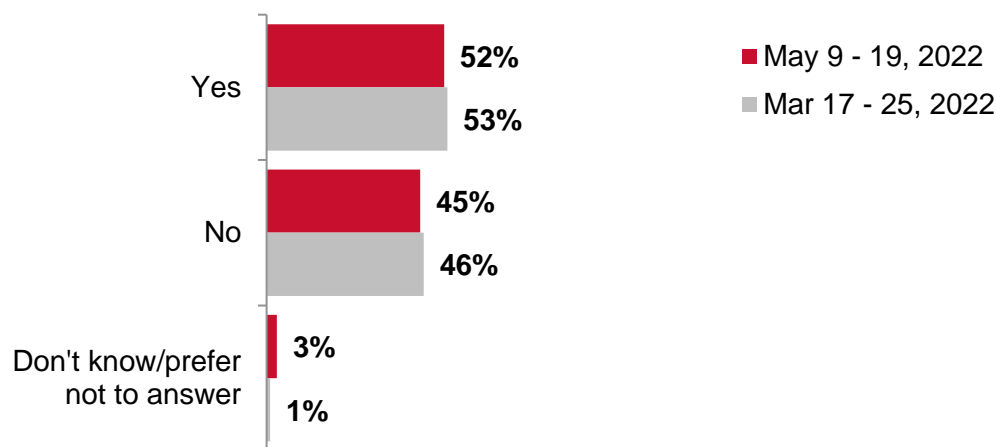

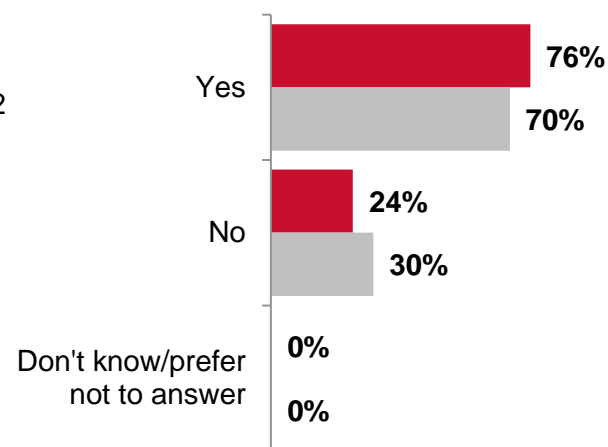
Return to Work Site at Least Part-time

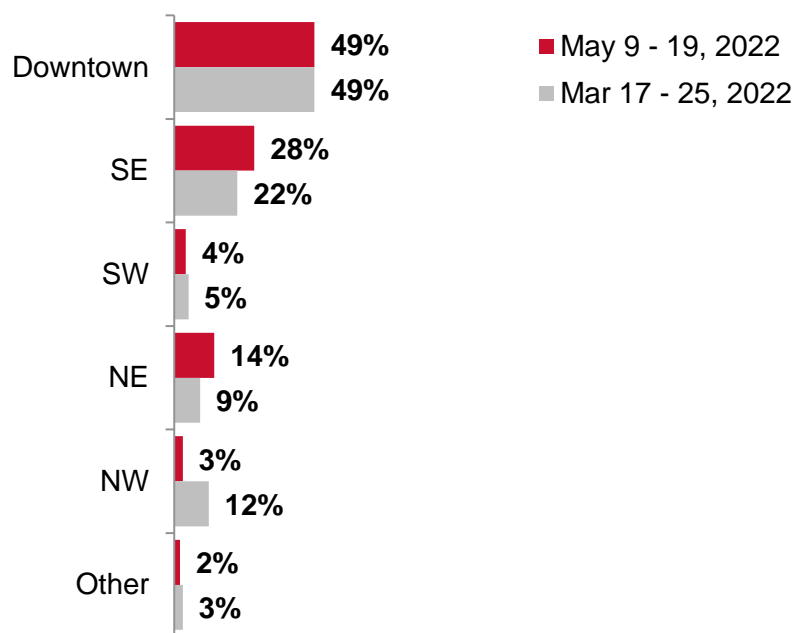

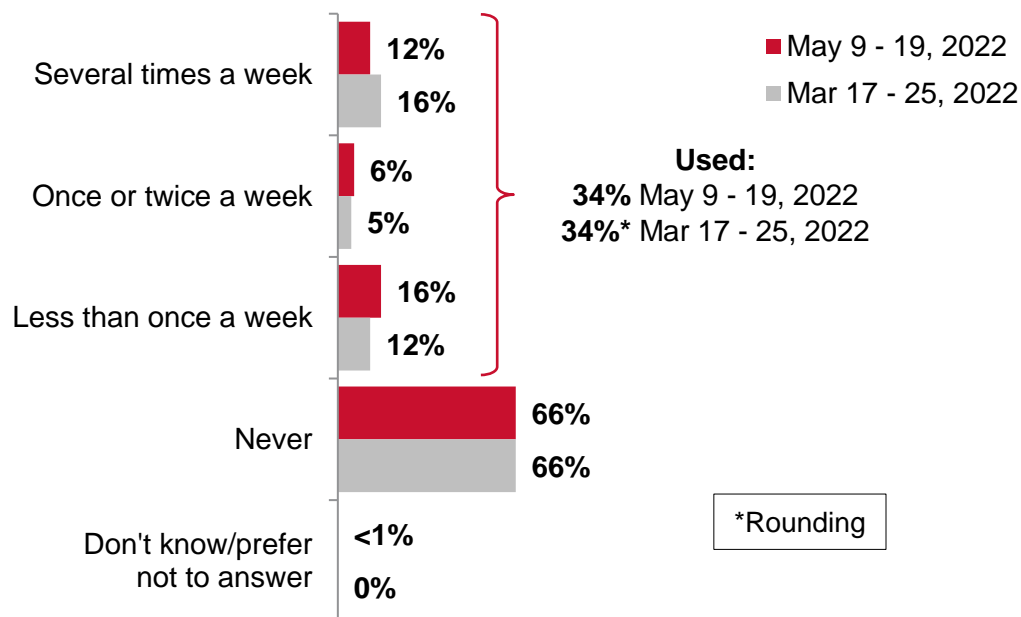

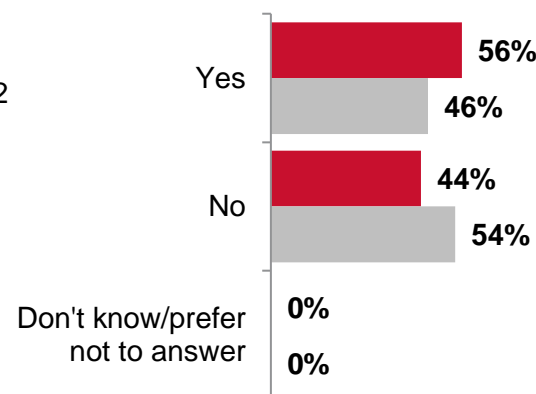
Transit Use Before and During Pandemic

One-third (34%) of Calgarians say that in the months prior to the pandemic, they used Calgary Transit at least occasionally to commute to and from work, school or other activities. 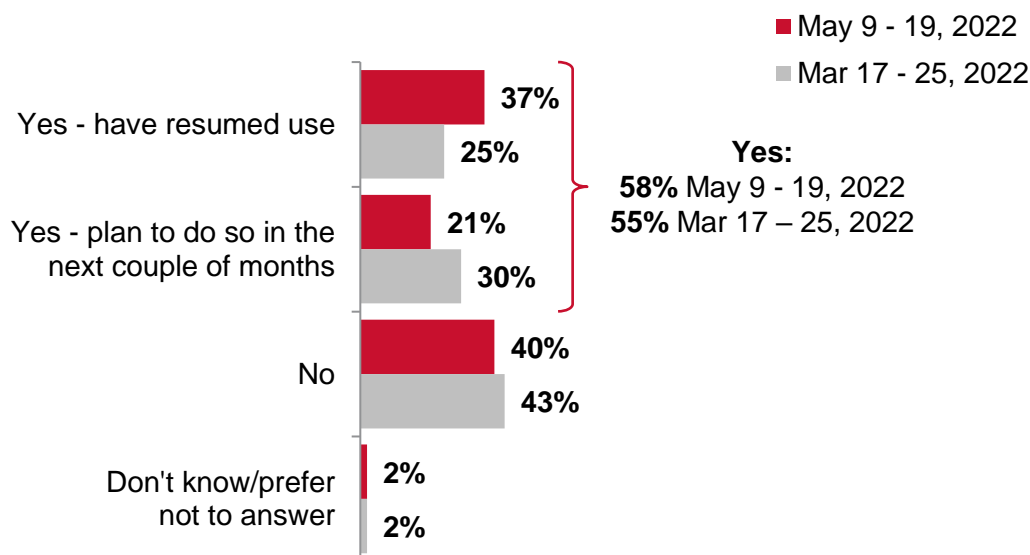

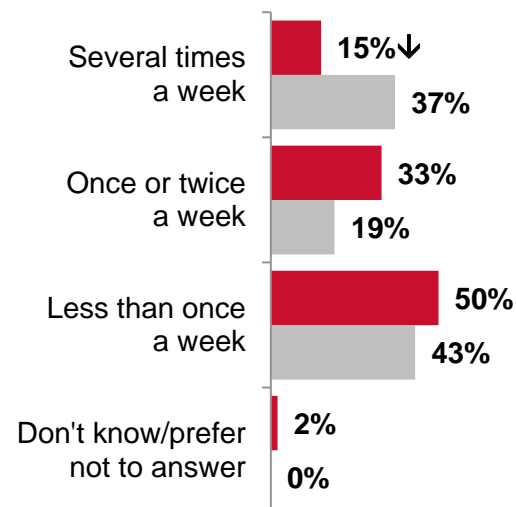
Use/Planned Use of Transit Since March 1, 2022

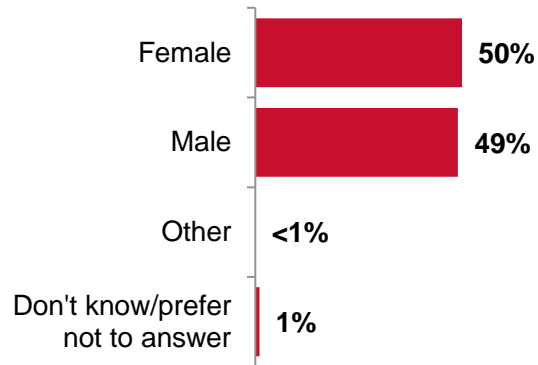

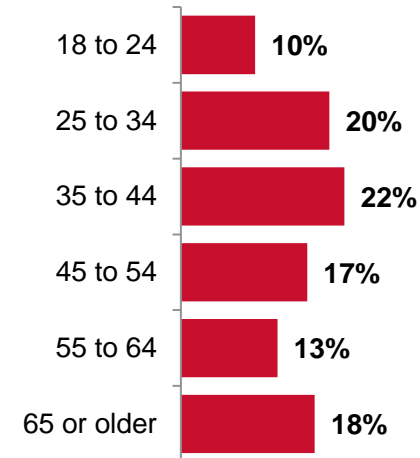

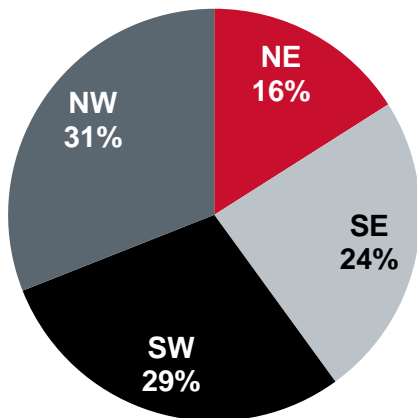

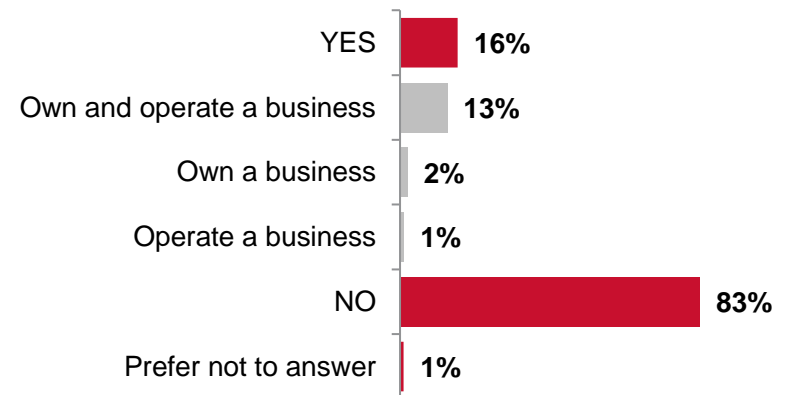

Own and/or Operate a Business in Calgary

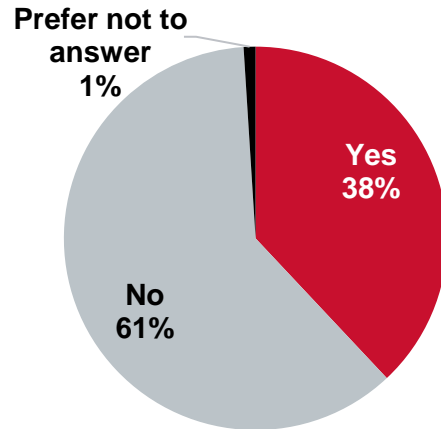

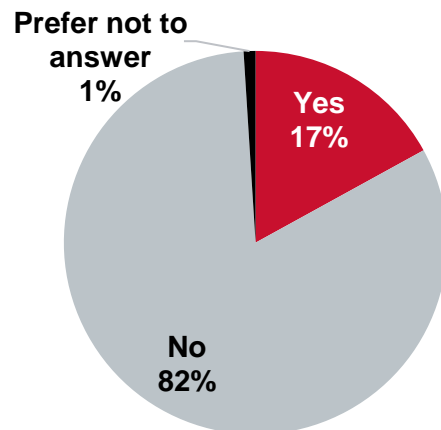

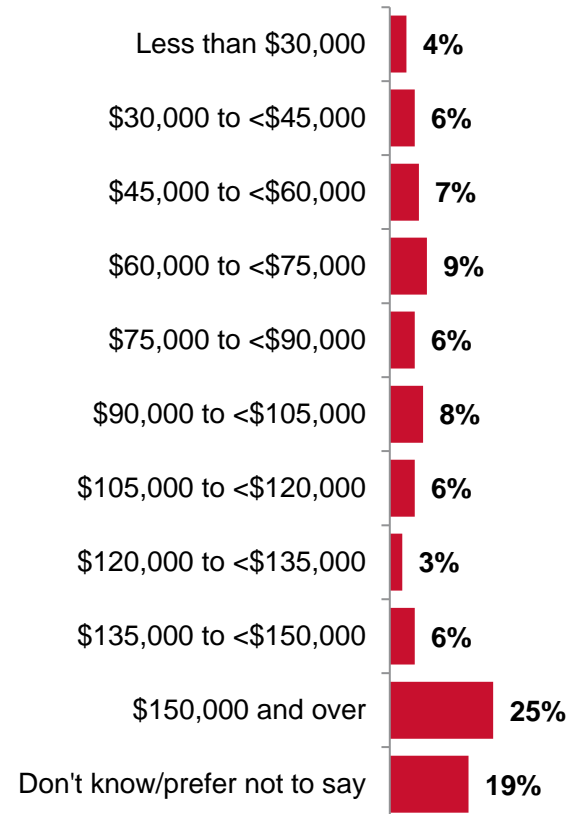
Children Under the Age of 18 in the Household
