

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Background & Methodology

Background

To help support City decisions, The City of Calgary surveys citizens about their opinions, preferences, and attitudes. To help in “making life better every day” for Calgarians, The City conducts the Citizen Perspectives Survey at various intervals through the year.

Feedback was required from Calgarians after the 2021 General Election to understand opinions about communication effectiveness and the voting experience, including COVID-19 modifications.

Methodology

The survey was conducted by Leger from October 25 to November 3, 2021 with 500 Calgarians via telephone using random digit dialing (RDD). The survey was conducted using numbers from both landlines (5%) and cell phones (95%) to obtain a random and statistically representative sample of Calgarians. The survey averaged 15 minutes in duration. The margin of error (MOE) for the total sample of n=500 is ± 4.38 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

To ensure the data was gathered from a representative group of Calgarians, sample quotas were set by age, gender, and city quadrant of the general population aged 18 and older. Data were then weighted to the 2016 Civic Census for age and gender.

Detailed Findings





Voting Behaviour – Federal and Municipal



Summary Findings and Key Differences

A majority of Calgarians voted in each of the federal and municipal elections in 2021.

- Three-quarters (76%) voted in the federal election, with half of those (55%) voting in person on election day.
 - Younger adult Calgarians were less likely to vote in the federal election, with 35% of those aged 18-34 saying they did not vote, compared to 21% of those aged 35-64 and 11% of those aged 65 and older.
 - Residents of the Northeast quadrant are less likely to vote in the federal election than those who live in other quadrants (61% in the NE vs. 81% NW, 79% SW, and 76% SE).
 - Longer-term Calgary residents were more likely to vote in the federal election than people who have lived in Calgary for less time (88% of those who have lived in Calgary for 20 years or longer vs. 63% who have lived here for 10-19 years and 55% who have lived here fewer than ten years).
 - Retired Calgarians were more likely to vote in the federal election (93% vs. 76% employed, 53% not employed, and 62% other).
 - Those who voted in the municipal election were more likely to also have voted in the federal election (95% vs. 43% who did not vote in the municipal election).
- Two-thirds (63%) voted in the municipal election, with more than half of those (62%) voting in person on election day.
 - Older Calgarians were more likely to vote in the municipal election (88% of those aged 65+ vs. 68% of 35-64 and 44% 18-34).
 - People who have lived in Calgary for 20 or more years were more likely to vote in the municipal election (76% 20+ years vs. 51% 10-19 years and 39% fewer than 10 years).
 - Calgarians who have a university or post-graduate degree were more likely to vote in the municipal election (75% vs. 55% who have some post-secondary or a college diploma and 45% who have high school or less).
 - Retired Calgarians were more likely to vote in the municipal election (88% vs. 64% employed, 33% not employed, and 41% other).
 - Those who voted in the federal election were more likely to also have voted in the municipal election (79% vs. 14% who did not vote in the federal election).



Summary Findings and Key Differences

Most respondents did not vote in the municipal election by special (mail-in) ballot, and would not be interested in using a special ballot if availability was less restrictive.

- By far, most respondents voted in person, either on election day (62%) or during the advance vote (33%).
 - Calgarians older than 55 were more likely to vote during the advance vote (50% of 55-64 and 46% of 65+ vs. 27% of 35-54, 18% of 25-34, and 19% of 18-24).

When asked for reasons why they didn't vote in the municipal election, most of those who did not vote either weren't eligible or had commitments that prevented them from voting. Some respondents indicated lack of knowledge or lack of interest.


- “Not eligible to vote” was the most frequently-mentioned reason among Calgarians under 65 years old (26% 18-34 and 22% 35-64 vs. 0% 65+), followed by “I was too busy/ I was working” (21% 18-34 and 16% 35-64 vs. 0% 65+).




Federal Election Voting Method

Most respondents voted in the September 2021 Federal Election, with just over half voting in person on September 20th, and about two in five voting in person during advance polling.




Municipal Election Voting Method

About two-thirds of respondents voted in the Calgary General Election in October 2021. Three-in-five of the respondents who voted did so at their designated voting station on October 18th, while one-third voted in the advance vote.




Special Ballot Preferences

Very few survey respondents voted by special ballot. Only one-in-five respondents were interested in voting by special ballot if the criteria for being able to vote by special ballot were less restrictive.



Reasons For Not Voting

Respondents who did not vote generally did not vote because they aren't eligible, or they had other commitments that prevented them from voting. Some respondents indicated lack of knowledge or lack of interest.

Voting Experience

Summary Findings and Key Differences

Overall, most respondents found the voting experience to be safe, accessible, convenient, with reasonable wait times and without crowding.

- Calgarians aged 18-34 were more likely to disagree that voting hours were convenient (11% vs. 2% 35-64 and 0% 65+).

Most Calgarians responded positively to the COVID-19 safety protocols in place at voting stations.

- More women agreed that election workers wearing masks made them more comfortable (92% vs. 82% men).
- Calgarians aged 35-64 were least likely to agree that election workers wearing masks made them more comfortable (82% vs. 95% 18-34 and 94% 65+).
- Men were more likely to disagree that cleaning in between voters made them more comfortable (19% vs. 9% women).
- Men were more likely to disagree that access to hand sanitizer made them more comfortable (15% vs. 7% women).
- More women agreed that having single-use pencils or sanitized pens made them more comfortable (90% vs. 77% men).
- Calgarians aged 35-64 were least likely to agree that having single-use pencils or sanitized pens made them more comfortable (78% vs. 93% 18-34 and 90% 65+).

Summary Findings and Key Differences

In general, changes to voting station operations were well-received by Calgarians.


- Women were more likely to support increasing the number of voting stations (86% vs. 72% of men).
- Long-time Calgarians were more likely to oppose an increase to the number of voting stations (21% of those who have lived in Calgary for 20 or more years vs. 11% of those who have lived here 10-19 years and 9% of those who have lived here fewer than ten years).
- More women supported adding voting stations closer to residences (88% vs. 80% of men).
- Younger Calgarians were more likely to support extending the hours of advance voting (93% of 18-34 vs. 79% for 35 and older).
- Calgarians aged 35-64 were more likely to oppose making October 18th a non-instructional day at Calgary schools (38% vs. 26% 65+ and 19% 18-34).
- Women were more likely to support voting information being provided in languages other than English (91% vs. 83% of men).
- Younger Calgarians supported voting information being provided in languages other than English more than older (96% 18-34 vs. 85% 35-64 and 76% 65+).
- Men were most likely to oppose encouraging voters to complete their voter statements ahead of time (14% vs. 8% women).



Voting Experience

Overall, the voting experience for most respondents was safe, accessible, convenient, and had reasonable wait times and crowding.



COVID-19 Safety Protocols

For most respondents, the COVID-19 safety protocols at voting stations improved comfort, with the most effective protocols being masks on election workers, signage to support distancing, and access to hand sanitizer.




Election Planning Changes

Support for most of the election planning changes was strong, with the most favourable changes being information in accessible formats and languages other than English, adding voting stations closer to residences and extending advance voting hours.

Election Communication Effectiveness

Summary Findings and Key Differences

Overall, Calgarians agreed there was enough election information available, and it was clear, timely, easy to understand, in the proper channels, and in a language they understand.

- More men than women disagreed that information was available in channels they use (20% vs. 13% women).
- Younger adults were more likely to disagree that information was available in channels they use (22% 18-34 vs. 13% 35-64).
- People who have lived in Calgary for 20 years or longer were more likely to agree that information was available in channels they use (84% vs. 69% who've lived in Calgary for 10-19 years and 74% who've lived in Calgary fewer than ten years).
- Calgarians who have university degrees or post-graduate degrees were more likely to agree that information was available in channels they use (84% vs. 75% who have some post-secondary or a college diploma and 71% who have high school or less).

Most respondents found it easy to find information about when, where, and how to vote. Calgarians thought it was slightly more difficult to find out who the candidates were and what additional questions would be on the ballot.

- Older adults were more likely to say it was easy to find out when you could vote (97% 65+ vs. 91% 35-64 and 86% 18-34).
- Men were more likely to say it was difficult to find out where you could vote (13% vs. 6% women).
- Calgarians with some post-secondary education were more likely to say it was easy to find out whether you were eligible to vote (93% who have a university or post-graduate degree and 92% who have some post-secondary or a college diploma, vs. 82% who have high school or less).
- People who have lived in Calgary for 20 years or longer were more likely to say it was easy to find out what ward they were voting in (86% vs. 73% who've lived in Calgary for 10-19 years and 75% who've lived in Calgary fewer than ten years).
- Calgarians who have university degrees or post-graduate degrees were more likely to say it was easy to find out who the candidates were (77% vs. 68% who have some post-secondary or a college diploma and 64% who have high school or less).

Summary Findings and Key Differences

The most-recalled sources of election information were television, direct mail, radio, and social media.


- Women were more likely to mention the election guide, brochure, or voter card sent in the mail (30% vs. 18% men).
- Younger Calgarians were more likely to mention general social media (27% 18-34 vs. 18% 35-64 and 9% 65+) and City social media (10% 18-34 and 8% 35-64 vs. 3% 65+).
 - Younger Calgarians were also less likely to mention television (21% 18-34 vs. 41% 35-64 and 60% 65+).
- Calgarians 65 and older were more likely to mention newspaper (30% vs. 15% 35-64 and 14% 18-34).
- People who have lived in Calgary for 20 years or longer were more likely to mention newspaper (20% vs. 11% who've lived in Calgary for 10-19 years and 12% who've lived in Calgary fewer than ten years).
- Calgarians who did not attend post-secondary education were less likely to mention general social media (10% who have high school or less education vs. 23% who have some post-secondary or a college diploma and 21% who have a university or post-graduate degree), and online advertisements (5% who have high school or less education vs. 13% who have some post-secondary or a college diploma and 13% who have a university or post-graduate degree).
- People who have disabilities or have a household member with a disability were more likely to mention billboards or outdoor advertisements (23% vs. 11% without any disabilities), and less likely to mention calgary.ca (0% vs. 3% without disabilities).



Election Communication Effectiveness

Overall, election communications were very effective with respondents, with strong agreement that language needs were served. Most respondents agree that election communications were easy to understand, clear, available at the right time, on channels that they use, and in sufficient amount.



Ease of Finding Election Information















Age

Number of years lived in Calgary








Number of Eligible Voters in the Household

Number Who Voted in the Household










